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
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

CONTROL AND PREVENTION OF INFECTIOUS DISEASE.

IMMUNISATION.

Immunisation facilities are provided free under the National Health Service Act. 83 children under the age of 5 years received their primary immunisation during the year whilst 64 children received further treatment to maintain their immunity.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA

For the following information I am indebted to Mr. R.W. Turner, Senior Sanitary Inspector, whose work during the year under review it represents.

Water Supply.

Main supplies have been satisfactory. Saddington is now supplied by gravity which has overcome the shortages met in 1954 due to irregular pumping.

Well supplies, being mostly from shallow wells, are usually polluted. Owing to dry weather the quantity and quality were both worse than usual. 23,700 gallons were carted to Husbands Bosworth, Great Easton and Stonton Wyville.

2114 houses with a population of 6780 are served by internal mains water supply whilst a further 121 houses with 360 residents have access to mains water from stand pipes. Wells serve the remaining 1033 houses.

During the year the Knaptoft reservoir was completed and mains were laid in the villages of Mowsley Laughton, Gumley and Husbands Bosworth.

When main laying at Theddingworth is completed the whole of the Western Area will have a mains supply.

Supply to the Eastern Area is still dependent upon and awaiting development of the River Dove Scheme, with the exception of Great Easton, Bringhurst and Drayton which will be supplied from the Mid-Northamptonshire Water Board.

Sewage Disposal.

The disposal works scheme for Theddingworth is almost completed and in view of the expected arrival of mains water schemes are to be prepared for Laughton, Mowsley, Gumley, Great Easton, Bringhurst and Dayton.

There are in the District 3,167 water closets, 201 pail closets and 73 privies. 5 privies and 3 pail closets were converted to the water carriage system during the year.

The 217 cesspools in the District are emptied at three-monthly intervals. 5 cesspools were abolished during the year and 11 new ones constructed.

Refuse Disposal.

House refuse is collected at fortnightly intervals by direct labour and disposed of by crude tipping at Foxton, Husband's Bosworth, Hallaton and Kibworth.

Eradication of Vermin.

3 houses were found to require treatment to eradicate bed bugs. 1 infested property was owned by this Council.

Disinfestation was satisfactorily carried out in every case by stripping and treating with proprietary insecticides applied under pressure. The occupiers were advised of the steps necessary to prevent recurrences.
