Population.—This is slightly lower than the Registrar-General's figure for last year (9,972).

Birth Rate.—This is also slightly lower than last year, but is still higher than the average for England and Wales.

Death Rate.—Almost the same as last year and slightly above the average.

Infant Mortality Rate.—This has shown an increase since last year and is above the average for the country. There were five deaths from Premature Birth.

Puerperal Fever.—There were no deaths from puerperal causes, but one case of puerperal pyrexia was notified.

- Day Nursery.—The Day Nursery has functioned efficiently during the year. The accommodation is still for 48 children and the average attendance was 40.
- Social Centre—for evacuated women was closed in December, owing to the return of the evacuees to their homes.
- Ambulance Facilities.—Ambulance Services for infectious cases to the isolation hospitals are provided by the County Council. Otherwise all ambulance facilities are provided by the local branch of the St. John's Ambulance Brigade in a very efficient and prompt way. The personnel of the Brigade give their services voluntarily.
- Home Nursing.—One district nurse-midwife is employed by the local hospital (subsidised by your Council). No other home nursing is provided.
- Centres and Clinics.—The Scabies Clinic is still available, but there have been no applications for treatment since last May. There are no other treatment clinics. Ante natal clinics are held weekly in the Maternity Block at the Hospital, and by the district nurse in the M. & C.W. building. The M. & C.W.

Clinic is in charge of the Health Visitor and a voluntary staff of ladies from the town. There are sessions once a week, and a doctor is in attendance at alternate sessions. A full time Health Visitor is employed by the Council. She pays regular visits to all children under 5 years of age. Your Health Visitor resigned in September, and her position was temporarily and very efficiently filled by Mrs. Turner, who, although she had retired from active service, willingly came forward and averted a difficult situation, and who deserves every thanks.

Hospitals.—The voluntary hospital which is subsidised by the local authority has a capacity for approximately 18 beds and has a maternity block of 15 beds. The Public Assistance Infirmary has 50 beds. Both hospitals have had considerable difficulty in providing sufficient nursing staff.

Diphtheria Immunisation.—The Council provides free immunisation for all children,—for those under 5 years at the M. & C.W. Centre. With the help of the teachers and school nurse the older children are immunised in the schools. The great majority of the children in the town have been immunised.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

Water.—Early in the War period, arrangements were made whereby the Public Baths filtration and chlorination plant could be switched over to purifying River Welland water for public supply. During the year under review, the shortage caused by War population increase and the continued drought made it necessary to augment the supply by this means in the first four months of the year, and again from September to the end of 1945. A full twenty-four hours per day supply has been maintained all through the year.

Bacteriological examinations of the water going into the piped supply were made with the following results:—

The two samples of river water classed as unsatisfactory, were only designated "doubtful." There were no chemical analyses, and the waters were not liable to have plumbosolvent action.

The quality of the supply was good throughout the year, and no instances of contamination occurred.

A scheme for additional works to double the existing quantity was deposited with the Ministry of Health in December and awaits the holding of a Public Inquiry.

Two samples from private wells were examined. One well was found to be polluted and was closed, and the piped supply has been substituted.

A copy of the bacteriological report of the Leicestershire County Council, dated 27th July, 1945 regarding the last sample from the town main, is appended:—

"No evidence of coliform organisms in 10 c.c's. Plate count sterile."

Drainage and Sewerage.—There has been a small extension to accommodate a scheme for the erection of 100 houses on the Bowden Fields Estate.

The Council have directed their Engineer to report upon the question of a relief trunk sewer and additional sewage disposal works.

Closet Accommodation.—Five additional water closets have been provided, and the total in the district now numbers approximately 4,135. About twenty properties are situated beyond the reach of the sewerage system, and are provided with sanitary conveniences of the conservancy type.

Public Cleansing.—All houses in the district are provided with dustbins, although a considerable number of bins are in urgent need of replacement. A system is in operation whereby the foreman refuse collector notifies the Health Department of instances where bins are worn out, and the owner of the premises concerned is informed. In this way, despite the shortage of supply, 93 houses were provided with new dustbins. House refuse and salvage material are collected, as far as possible, weekly throughout the area, and during the year a total of 2,600 tons was received at the Destructor Depot, of which the following quantities were salvaged:—

Rats and Mice Destruction :-

The arrangement with the adjoining Rural District Council for the joint employment of a full time Rats Officer ceased on March 31st, and the Council appointed their Disinfecting Officer to carry out these duties in conjunction with his disinfection work, etc. This officer had previously attended the Ministry of Food's Course of Instruction on Rodent Destruction and had occasionally assisted the Rats Officer.

The whole of the sewerage system received two treatments during the year. In the first treatment 349 manholes were pre-baited with damp sausage rusk, and "takes" of pre-bait were recorded in 59 manholes. The latter were then poison baited by adding Zinc Phosphide to the bait base, and 45 takes of poison were recorded. In the second treatment, the manholes where takes of pre-bait took place in the first treatment, were again baited and on this occasion bread mash was used. "Takes" were recorded in 13 manholes and these were poison baited by adding Barium Carbonate to the bait base, and resulted in 5 takes of poison. The Technical Branch of the Infestation Division of the Ministry of Food stated that the estimated kill as a result of these two treatments was 526 rats.

Swimming Bath :-

The Council's covered pool was in use for swimming purposes during the summer months. The establishment is equipped with a Paterson filtering chlorinating and aerating plant, which has operated satisfactorily. Daily tests for chlorine content have been made by the Baths Manager, and one sample for bacteriological examination was collected and the report was satisfactory.

HOUSING.

No new houses have been erected during the year.

Preparations have commenced for the erection of twenty-seven "Spooner" type temporary pre-fabricated houses on the Victoria Road Site by H.M. Office of Works.

The Council's application for the adaption of the buildings of a prisoners of war camp for urgent temporary housing purposes, did not receive the necessary sanction of the Ministry concerned.

The construction of roads, sewers, etc. on the Bowden Fields Estate is nearing completion in readiness for the first and second years' instalments comprising 100 houses.

The present demand for houses is indicated by the fact that there are 420 applications on the Council's waiting list, and a considerable proportion consists of families living in rooms.

The repair of sanitary defects and maintenance repair work of dwelling houses continue to present many difficulties owing to shortage of labour and in the supply of materials and consequently many houses are in urgent need of renovation.

Records are being prepared of cases of overcrowding with a view to their alleviation as soon as circumstances permit. In the meantime, the conversion of a few houses for accommodating additional families has assisted to a limited extent.

With regard to the five unsatisfactory samples, all failed in the Methylene blue test and one "Pasteurised" sample also failed to pass the phosphatase test. Two of the "Pasteurised" samples were of milk received from outside the district. In each case the retailer concerned was notified of the result of the sample and local premises and plant were inspected and the co-operation of the retailer was sought with a view to improvement. Repeat samples in all instances proved to be satisfactory.

All registered premises were inspected periodically and six items of improvement in structural conditions or cleanly methods were recorded. A large proportion of the milk retailed in the district is now included under one or other of the special designations, and only one complaint of souring milk was received during the year.

Meat and Other Foods :-

There is one Regional Slaughter-house in the district, and this serves the town and the adjoining rural area. The premises are owned by the Council, and are under the control of the Ministry of Food. During the year, 6,759 animals were slaughtered in this establishment, and all of the carcases and organs were inspected before release for sale. The total weight of meat condemned as unfit for human food was 17 tons 1 cwt. 1 qr. One licence to slaughter was renewed.
