REPORT AND HISTORY OF TYPHOID FEVER

The character of the epidemic was continued and a satisfactory prognosis of the public opinion continues to be optimistic against typhoid, whereas cough, poliomyelitis and tuberculosis.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA

Water Supply.

Since the transfer of the local Water Undertaking to the Leicester Water Board in 1962, no samples of raw water before treatment have been taken by this Authority. 3 samples of the local supply were examined bacteriologically and found to be sterile. Supplies were satisfactory, in quantity as well as quality, no shortages being experienced during the year.

4,457 of the occupied houses have internal mains water supply, 2 others have external standpipes and 2 private wells.

The 2 wells in use were sampled and the waters found to be bacteriologically satisfactory.

There were no major extensions of public supplies, minor extensions being made to private housing estates.

Sewerage & Sewage Disposal.

Only minor extensions were made to the sewers for private housing development.

A start was made during 1964 on the Contract for construction of two additional percolating filters at the Sewage Disposal Works.

All except 10 of the houses in the District are connected to the sewerage system.

Public Cleansing.

This service is administered by the Engineer & Surveyor. House refuse is collected by direct labour on a weekly basis and is disposed of by controlled tipping.

The same labour force also collects 220 bins of trade refuse from 140 properties weekly. A charge is made of £2.5.0. per bin per annum for this service. The trade refuse scheme is operated by the Health Department, as is also the Council's dustbin scheme. For a charge of 6/- per annum this latter scheme offers the ratepayer an alternative to the purchase of his own house refuse bin. At the end of the year 2270 Council dustbins were in use at 2,140 properties.

Infestations by rodents are treated free at dwelling houses; business & agricultural premises are charged for the service. Council properties are inspected regularly & treated as required.

Swimming Baths.

52 inspections were made of the Public Swimming Baths and attention paid to the operation of plant, routine tests and maintenance of a good swimming water throughout the year. 8 samples were taken for bacteriological examination and all were satisfactory. Repairs were carried out to the chlorination plant and alkali pump.
