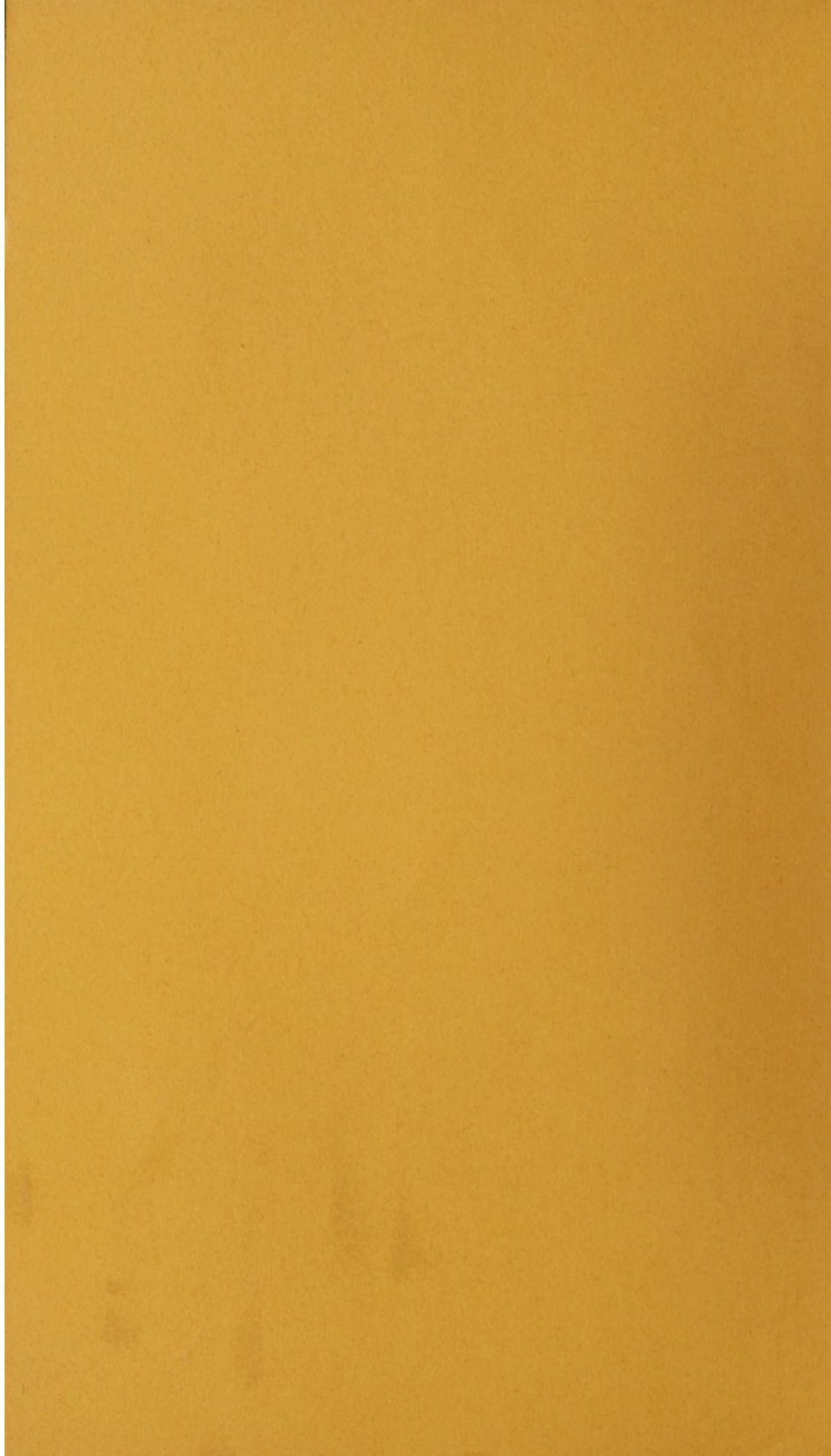

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SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

Water Supply.

The water supply of the district continues to be satisfactory in quality and quantity. There were no shortages during 1968. Five samples were taken for bacteriological examination and found to be sterile.

One occupied house in the district is still dependent on a private well for its water supply. This water was also tested and found to be satisfactory.

There were no major extensions of public water supplies during the year, but work was commenced on the building of a new service reservoir.

Sewerage and Sewage Disposal.

There were no extensions to sewers other than normal minor extensions to meet housing development needs in 1968 and at present there is no scheme in hand for extension or alteration of Sewage Disposal Works.

Public Cleansing.

House refuse is collected by direct labour and disposed of by controlled tipping. This service is administered by the Engineer & Surveyor.

The Health Department operates the trade refuse collection scheme. A yearly charge of £3. is made for the weekly collection of one dustbin, or its equivalent, of trade refuse. This service provides collection of refuse from 290 bins at 155 trade premises. Also bulk refuse is collected regularly from two textile factories and as required from other trade premises on a cost-recovery basis.

Dustbins for the storage of house refuse are supplied by the Department at an annual hire charge of 6/- per bin. At the end of 1968, 2,839 Council dustbins were in use at 2,642 private properties.

WATER SUPPLY OF THE AREA

Water Supply.

The water supply of the district continues to be satisfactory in quality and quantity. There were no shortages during 1968. Five samples were taken for bacteriological examination and found to be sterile.

One occupied house in the district is still dependent on a private well for its water supply. This water was also tested and found to be satisfactory.

There were no major extensions of public water supplies during the year, but work was continued on the building of a new service reservoir.

Sanitation and Sewage Disposal.

There were no extensions to sewers other than normal minor extensions to meet housing development needs in 1968 and at present there is no scope in hand for extension or alteration of sewage disposal works.

Public Cleansing.

House refuse is collected by district labour and disposed of by controlled tipping. This service is administered by the Engineer & Surveyor.

The Health Department operates the refuse refuse collection scheme. A weekly charge of £5. is made for the weekly collection of one household, or the equivalent, of refuse. The service provides collection of refuse from 250 bins as 155 refuse points. Also bulk refuse is collected regularly from two textile factories and as required from other trade premises on a cost-recovery basis. Refuse for the storage of house refuse are supplied by the Department at an annual hire charge of £4 per bin. At the end of 1968, 2,859 Council houses were in use at 1,642 private properties.

Six inspections were made of these premises which were found to be satisfactory.

Prevention of Damage by Pests Act, 1949.

Routine inspection of the District is carried out by the Rodent Officer and his assistant, as other Health Department duties permit. 2,575 visits and inspections were made in survey and treatment of rodent infestations. 226 infestations were dealt with. Rodent infestations on domestic premises are treated free, a charge being made for work done at business or agricultural premises. Regular inspections and treatments as required are carried out at all Council properties.

Swimming Baths.

31 inspections of the Public Swimming Baths were made. Plant and premises are inspected, and tests carried out of the swimming water. 8 samples were examined bacteriologically and found to be satisfactory.

Caravan Sites and Control of Development Act, 1960.

There are 4 licences operative in respect of single caravan sites, and 1 licence for a site for 40 residential caravans. No new licences were issued this year.

Living vans were removed from unlicensed sites on 4 occasions.

Noise Abatement Act, 1960.

Informal action to reduce industrial noise at one factory produced a measure of success, but owing to the proximity of the plant to residential property, has not completely eliminated the annoyance to neighbours. After informal action, work was in progress at another factory at the end of the year on installation of silencers, which the specialist manufacturers were confident would abate the nuisance. Nuisance from a third factory was abated after an approach to the Company, by remounting machines on insulating pads. Other complaints of noise nuisance were investigated but not substantiated.
