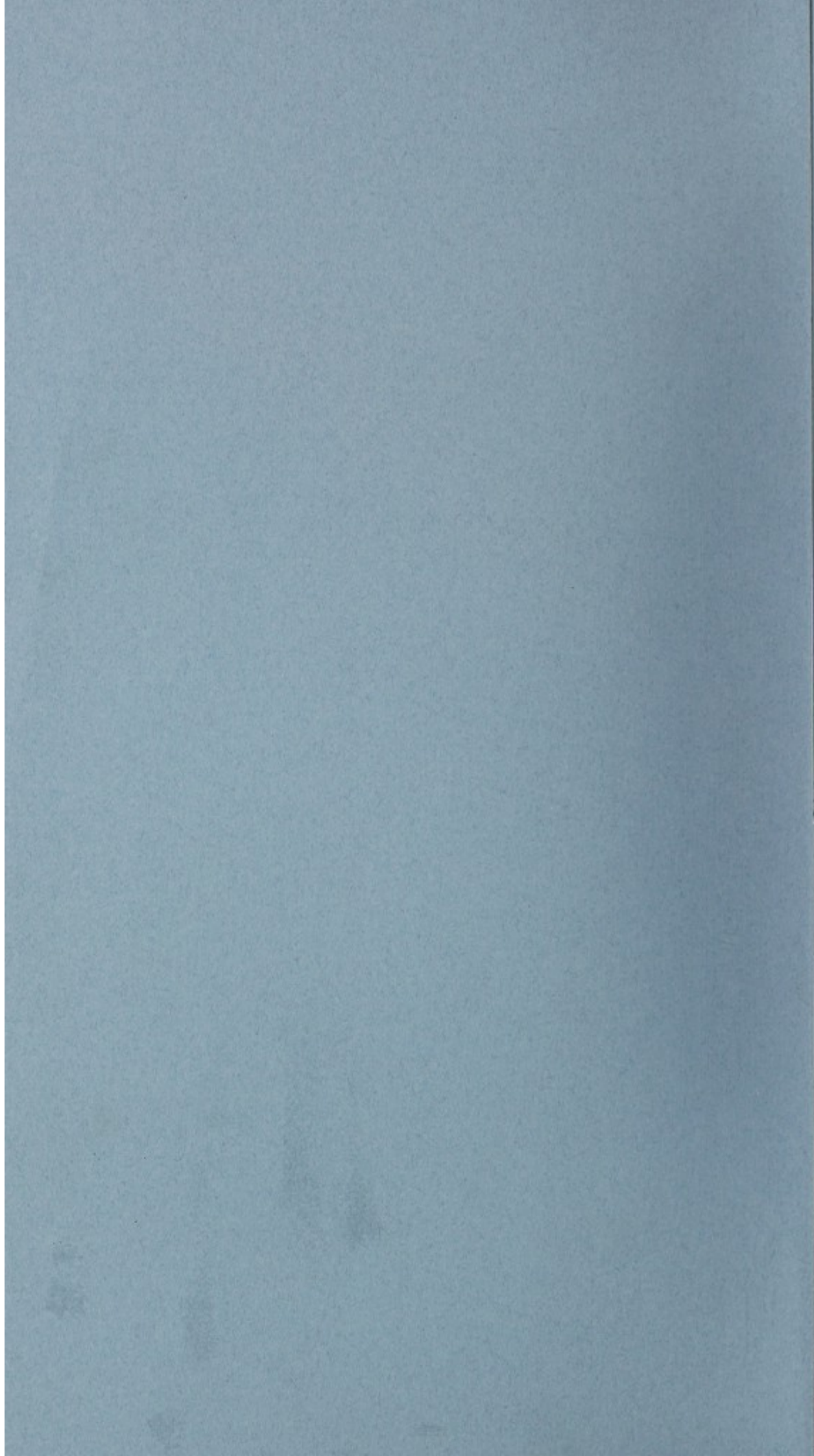

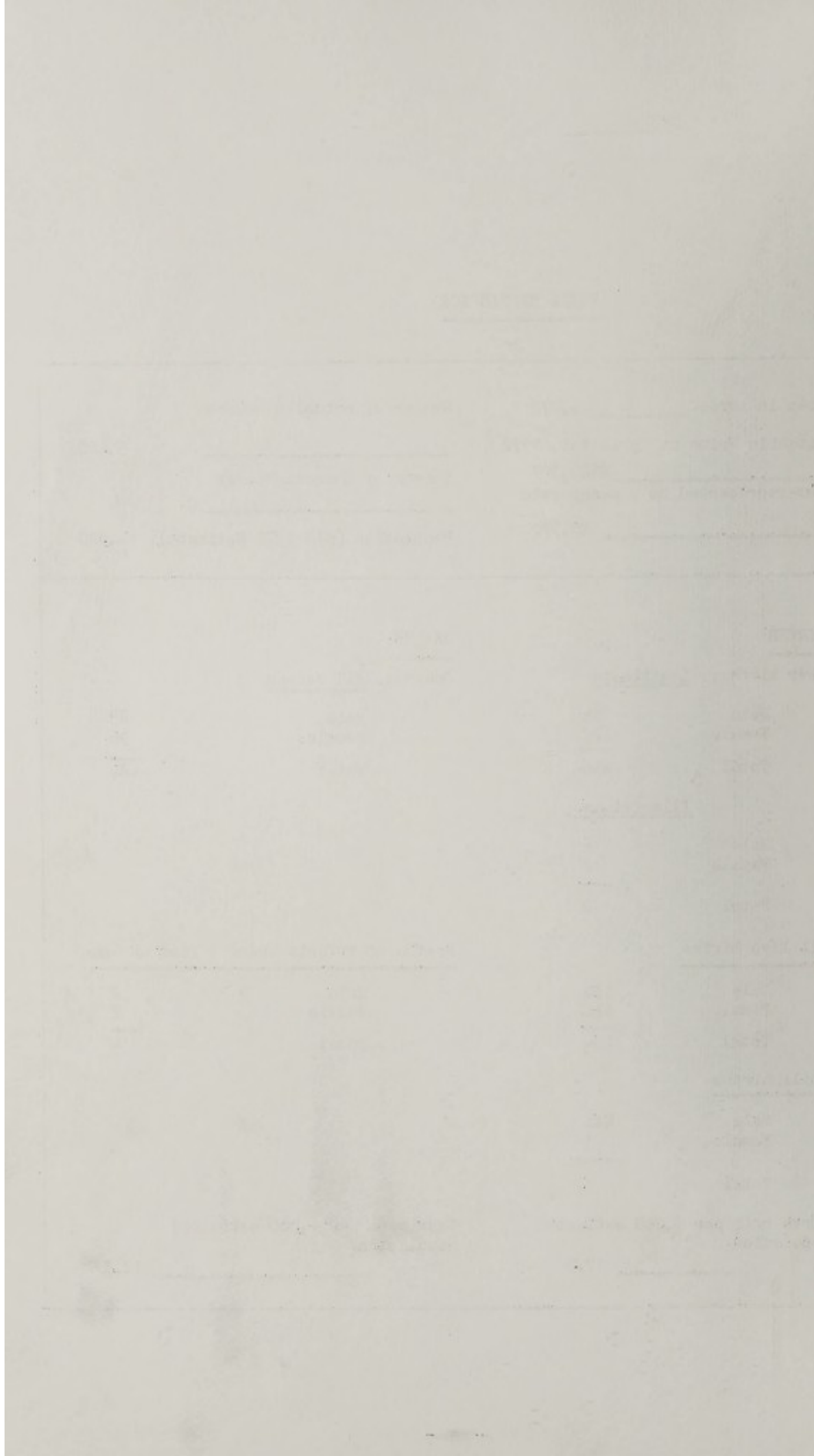

The water supply continues to be satisfactory in quality and quantity. Nine samples of drinking water were taken from the mains supply for bacteriological examination. All were satisfactory.

There is one occupied house in the district dependent on a shallow well for its domestic water supply. This water was also sampled and found to be bacteriologically satisfactory.

Only minor extensions were made during the year to water services, for the purposes of new development.

Sewerage and Sewage Disposal

The only extensions to public sewers were minor ones for new housing development. At present no scheme is in hand for extensions or alterations at the Sewage Disposal Works.

Public Cleansing

This service is administered by the Engineer and Surveyor. House refuse is collected by direct labour and disposed of by controlled tipping. The controlled tip is outside the District and is shared with a neighbouring Authority.

The trade refuse collection scheme is administered by the Health Department. A weekly collection is made of trade refuse equivalent to 340 bins from 144 business premises. This is charged for at the rate of £3 per bin per annum. A certain amount of bulk refuse is collected from certain factories on a cost-recovery basis.

Nineteen inspections were made of these premises and informal action taken to ensure that progress was continued by the Company in taking steps to reduce level of smell emission.

Prevention of Damage by Pests Act, 1949.

Routine inspection of the District is carried out by the Rodent Officer and his assistant. 1,528 visits and inspections were made in survey and treatment of rodent infestations. 305 infestations were dealt with. Rodent infestations on domestic premises are treated free, a charge being made for work done at business or agricultural premises. Regular inspections and treatments as required are carried out at all Council properties. A number of permanent baiting points are installed around the urban area.

Swimming Baths.

Inspections of the Public Swimming Baths were made and regular spot checks carried out on the swimming water. 4 samples which were submitted to the Public Health Laboratory for bacteriological examination were sterile.

Caravan Sites and Control of Development Act, 1960.

There are 3 licences operative in respect of single caravan sites, and 1 licence for a site for 40 residential caravans. No new licences were issued this year.

Noise Abatement Act, 1960.

Nine complaints were received in respect of noise from seven premises; six industrial, one commercial and two domestic. All were investigated and two cases of industrial noise nuisance confirmed. These were remedied informally.
