INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

The Town has been during the year practically free from infectious diseases except pneumonia; only one case of Scarlet Fever was notified and that was at the College.

The case of Enteric Fever was in a patient who had very recently returned from abroad and had just landed off a ship ; it was in no way connected with the Borough.

Two cases of suspected diphtheria were admitted to Hospital but both these proved not to be this disease.

Practically all the cases of pneumonia arose before May and seven of these were treated in the Isolation Hospital thus proving the usefulness of this institution.

- (a) **Existing schemes.** The original Borough is sewered except for a few outlying houses.
- (b) New schemes. During 1938 the following added areas will be sewered :--- "Barnfield," "Preshute end of George Land including the Church Fields Estate" and "Manton." The Savernake Hospital sewage will be diverted to a new "high level" sewer thus obviating present pumping of this sewage. Addititions are proposed to the disposal work.
- (c) General state. Existing sewers and works are generally satisfactory. A new relief sewer will be constructed during 1938 to prevent flooding of the "Kennet Place" sewer in times of storm. Proper sludge drying beds are being constructed at the disposal works.

Rivers. Any action taken to prevent pollution.

No complaints regarding river pollution were received in 1937. When the Manton Main Drainage is completed, the existing septic tank discharge into the stream will be dismantled.
