Existing Water Supplies

There is a piped water supply to the whole of 25 parishes, but in 2 parishes part only is provided.

Stand pipes are not provided, the services being laid to consumer's premises.

There is no indication of any tendency to Plumbo Solvency in the piped supplies.

During the year schemes to connect supplies to the major part of the District from the River Dove were completed. There were no shortages, and Hosepipes were not banned as in previous years.

Drainage and Sewerage

During the year the Ministry approved tenders for the construction of Sewers and Sewage Disposal Works at Wymondham and Bottesford, the total cost of these schemes amounts to approximately £164,000.

The Wymondham Scheme commenced in April and is due for completion by September, 1961.

The Bottesford Scheme commenced in July and is due for completion by July, 1962.

The Ministry held a local investigation into a scheme for Sewers and Sewage Disposal Works at Harby and Hose and whilst the Minister accepted the need for a scheme to serve these 2 villages, it was necessary in view of the Council's policy to admit Farm Wastes to the System, to re-design the Sewage Disposal Works.

Water Supply

There is a piped water supply to the whole of 111 houses, but in 111 houses part only is provided. Stand pipes are provided, the services being laid to consumer's premises. There is no indication of any tendency to increase delivery in the piped supplies. During the year reference to contract supplies to the major part of the District from the River Dore were established. There were no shortages, and supplies were not limited in any previous year.

Reservoirs and Dams

During the year the Ministry awarded tenders for the construction of Reservoir and Dam at Boreas and Boreas Reservoir. The total cost of these schemes amounts to approximately £1,000,000. The Reservoir Boreas was completed in April and is for completion by September, 1951. The Reservoir Boreas commenced in July and is due for completion by July, 1951. The Ministry held a local investigation into a scheme for Boreas and Boreas Reservoir at Boreas and Boreas and asked the Ministry to provide the land for a scheme to serve these 2 villages. It was necessary in view of the Council's policy to raise the water to the level of the Reservoir the Boreas Reservoir. It was necessary to re-locate the Boreas Reservoir.

Drainage and Sewerage - continued

Schemes to serve Asfordby, Frisby, Kirby Bellars and Saxelby, also Redmile, Barkestone and Plungar are under consideration and it is anticipated that "Local Investigations" will be made next year.

The Council has considered Schemes to serve other villages, and as soon as financial considerations permit these will be submitted to the Ministry for approval.

Public Cleansing

During the year your Surveyor has re-organised the Public Cleansing Service and introduced a "Set Work" system which has improved the collection. Household refuse is now collected every 7 working days except at Asfordby where the collection is made fortnightly. A scheme to collect refuse from Asfordby every 7 working days is under consideration.

Nightsoil is collected weekly from 58 villages and 3 part villages. In the remaining 4 villages and 3 part villages no collection is made because these have a mains water supply and an efficient Sewage Disposal Works available.

A fleet of modern vehicles is maintained comprising :-

- 2 - S.D. 16/18 cu.yd. Refuse Collectors, with Fore and Aft Tipping Bodies
- 2 - S.D. Combined Nightsoil and Cesspool emptiers. 800 - gall. capacity. (Both purchased during the Year).
- 1 - S.D. Refuse Collector for Salvage Work.

Household refuse is disposed of by controlled tipping and no difficulty has been experienced. The levelling is carried out by means of a blade etc., attached to a tractor. The system has been found satisfactory.

The disposal of nightsoil is to farms, when it is ploughed into the land as manure. There is at present no difficulty in disposal, and in view of the amount of ploughed land it is not anticipated that this will create a problem for the next year or two.

The present system of conversion is by voluntary methods and has resulted in the conversion of 310 pail closets and privies to water closets during the year.

The scheme which the Council operates for the payment of a grant towards the voluntary conversion of pail closets to water closets appears to be operating very well.

The Council is continuing to empty house cesspools on request from the occupiers at a standard charge of 10/- per dwelling. Cesspools at Trade premises are emptied at a charge of 10/- per hour. There is, however, no collection of the contents of privy middens within the area.

Some of the other villages, Kirby Hall and
Saxby, also belong to the same group and will
be included in the "Local Inves-
tigation" which will be made next year.
The Council has considered schemes to serve other villages
and as soon as financial arrangements permit these will
be submitted to the Ministry for approval.

During the year your Surveyor has re-organized the
Public Cleaning Service and introduced a "800" system
which has improved the collection. However, the
system is not collected every 7 working days except at
Saxby where the collection is made fortnightly.
A scheme to collect refuse from Saxby every 7 working
days is under consideration.

Wastage is collected weekly from 25 villages and
3 parishes. In the remaining 4 villages and 2 parishes
no collection is made because there have a main
sewer supply and an efficient sewage disposal plant avail-
able.

A fleet of refuse vehicles is maintained comprising :-
2 - 6 D. 10/15 c.c. Refuse Collectors, with 4 tons and
4 1/2 tipping bodies

2 - 6 D. Combined Nightsoil and Gaspool engines.
: 600 - c.c. capacity. (Both purchased during the
Year).

1 - 6 D. Refuse Collector for Saxby town.

Wastage refuse is disposed of by controlled tipping
and no difficulty has been experienced. The tipping is
carried out by means of a blade and, attached to a tractor
The system has been found satisfactory.

The disposal of nightsoil is to lawn, after it is
ploughed into the land as manure. There is no problem
no difficulty in disposal, and in view of the amount of
ploughed land it is not anticipated that this will create
a problem for the next year or two.

The present system of collection is by voluntary action
and has resulted in the collection of 510 galls of refuse and
refuse to water closets during the year.

The scheme which the Council operates for the payment
of a grant towards the voluntary collection of all refuse
to water closets appears to be operating very well.

The Council is continuing to do its best to encourage
householders to use the standard charge of 10/- per
gallon of refuse. There is, however, no collection
of the contents of large bins within the area.

By the end of the year 282 dwellings had been dealt with under the Housing Acts in pursuance of the Council's Five Year Slum Clearance programme which on the 1st of November 1955, stood at 302 houses to be demolished; a figure which might be found to have been overstated.

Some delay was experienced in obtaining Ministerial approval for rebuilding and in the purchase of suitable sites, but towards the middle of the year work forged ahead and it is hoped that in the near future all the families living in condemned houses will very soon be rehoused and the slum clearance programme completed.

Provision of New Houses during the year

Forty-nine new houses were completed and occupied at the end of 1960. Twelve of these were erected by the Council, thirty-seven by private enterprise. There were about 231 applicants on the Council Housing List at the end of the year and 71 new applications were received during 1960.
