

GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES IN THE AREA.

The particulars furnished in previous Annual Reports are substantially applicable, no special alterations or developments having taken place during the year. This year 1939 witnesses the completion of the Poor Law Institution Infirmary at a cost of £30,000.

Public Health Officers of the Local Authority:-

The Medical Officer of Health acts for the Leicestershire & Rutland Combined Districts in which this District is included. He will be retired on 1st July 1939 when the duties will be taken over by Dr. John Young. The District Surveyor and Water Engineer held the appointment of Sanitary Inspector until 1st May 1938 when Mr. H. Buxton was appointed as a full time Sanitary Inspector, having been selected from eighty applicants.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

Water:-

Further extensions to mains have been made in order to supply new building estates and two mains have been replaced.

In connection with the joint scheme (Melton Mowbray U.D.C. & Melton & Belvoir R.D.C.) the Pumping Station and the Collecting
Tank at Wartnaby have been completed.

The Chlorinating plants are functioning efficiently, three chemical and five bacteriological examinations having all proved satisfactory.

No shortage has occurred during the year.

Drainage & Sewerage: -

Satisfactory, the town being on the whole well sewered.

There are now only seven cesspools in the District. A good sewage effluent has I think been maintained throughout the year.

Closet Accommodation: -

Nearly all the houses are provided with cistern-flushed waterclosets, the numbers of each type of accommodation being approximately as follows:-

Privies 1 Pail-closets 4 Water-closets 3,296

Public Cleansing: -

Most of the houses are provided with movable ashbins.

Refuse is collected by direct-labour and is removed in motorlorries to the Refuse Destructor.

Sanitary Inspection of the Area:-

Details of Sanitary Inspections are included under their relevant headings.

Shops and Offices:-

Two defective sanitary conveniences were rectified.

Camping Sites:-

None in the Area and no licences have been issued. One application was rejected.

Smoke Abatement: -

Two nuisances were abated through greater attention and care in stoking.

Swimming Baths and Pools: -

There is one publicly owned swimming pool which is emptied and cleansed weekly. The water is treated with 'Chloros'. Running water from the Scalford brook passes through a paddling pool for children.

A privately owned swimming bath at the 'Swan's Nest' is supplied with running water from the River Eye.

Eradication of bed bugs:-

One Council house and eight other dwellings were found to be infested. They were fumigated by means of special sulphur lamps and sprayed with 'Zaldecide'.

All houses and contents are now fumigated and sprayed before rehousing the tenants in Council houses.

I would direct attention to the importance of having tenants' belongings treated by Cyanide in special vans on moving from infested, or possibly infested, houses. A Contractor should be employed for this purpose.

Regulated Buildings:-

Two Common Lodging Houses have been reported as being unsatisfactory and a sub-committee has been appointed to consider the provision of a suitable lodging house. It is certainly most desirable that Common Lodging Houses should be owned by the Local Authority.

There are no Offensive Trades in the District.

Schools:-

The sanitary conditions are satisfactory and all have the public water supply.
