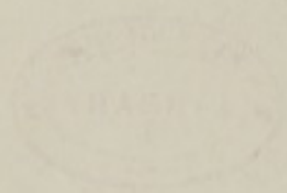

Owing to the additional duties of the past year, chiefly connected with Air Raid Precautions, routine work has had to be curtailed, and it has not been possible to deal with the houses in the area which are unfit for habitation, but necessary repairs are receiving attention.

May we express the earnest desire that when we next present our Report, Great Britain may once more be a free and democratic country at peace.

### (vi) CAMPING SITES

### (vii) REGULATED BUILDINGS.

Common Lodging Houses. There are two common lodging houses in the area and nineteen inspections have been made.

The consideration of the provision of a suitable lodging house has been postponed and the registrations were renewed for a further period of twelve months.

Tents, Vans, etc. Four inspections were made, and a van and shed were removed following visits to the occupiers of the land.

Offensive Trades. There are no offensive trades in the area.

### (viii) ERADICATION OF BED BUGS

Two Council Houses and ten privately owned houses were found to be infested, but generally the infestation could not be regarded as severe.

Twelve houses were disinfected during the year.

The contents of fifteen houses were treated before rehousing the tenants in Council Houses, and occasional visits made to the houses occupied by tenants of former infested property.







(ix) SCHOOLS

The sanitary conditions are satisfactory and all have the public water supply.

One School was disinfected for infectious disease.

(x) SWIMMING BATHS AND POOLS OPEN TO THE PUBLIC

- (a) Publicly owned. There is one children's Swimming Pool owned by the Town Estate, and 1 Paddling Pool owned by the Urban District Council.

The water for the Swimming Pool is treated with "Chloros" and the pool is emptied and cleansed weekly.

Running water from the Sealford Brook passes through the Paddling Pool.

- (b) Privately owned. There is one privately owned open air swimming pool which is supplied with running water from the Rive Eye.
