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## ANNUAL REPORT

Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen,

We have the honour of presenting our Second Annual Report respecting the Health and Sanitary conditions of your District for the year ending 31st December, 1940.

In accordance with the suggestion of the Ministry of Health the Report has been made as brief and concise as possible.

Owing to the present emergency certain routine work has had to be curtailed, but other duties, particularly those relating to meat and food inspection, have been considerably increased. The Regional Slaughterhouse established at the Cattle Market in January supplies meat for a large area, including the Melton Urban and Rural Districts and practically the whole of the County of Rutland, with a population of over 49,000.

The numbers of cases of infectious diseases are slightly higher than for last year, but it is pleasing to note that there has been no serious epidemic during the year, and the vital statistics show that the health of the town is very satisfactory. It is hoped that a scheme for the immunisation of children against diphtheria will be commenced shortly.

May we express the earnest desire that before we present our next Annual Report "war work" may be changed to "peace work"; "evacuation" to "re-habitation"; and A.R.P. will mean A Reconstruction in Peace.

dustbins.

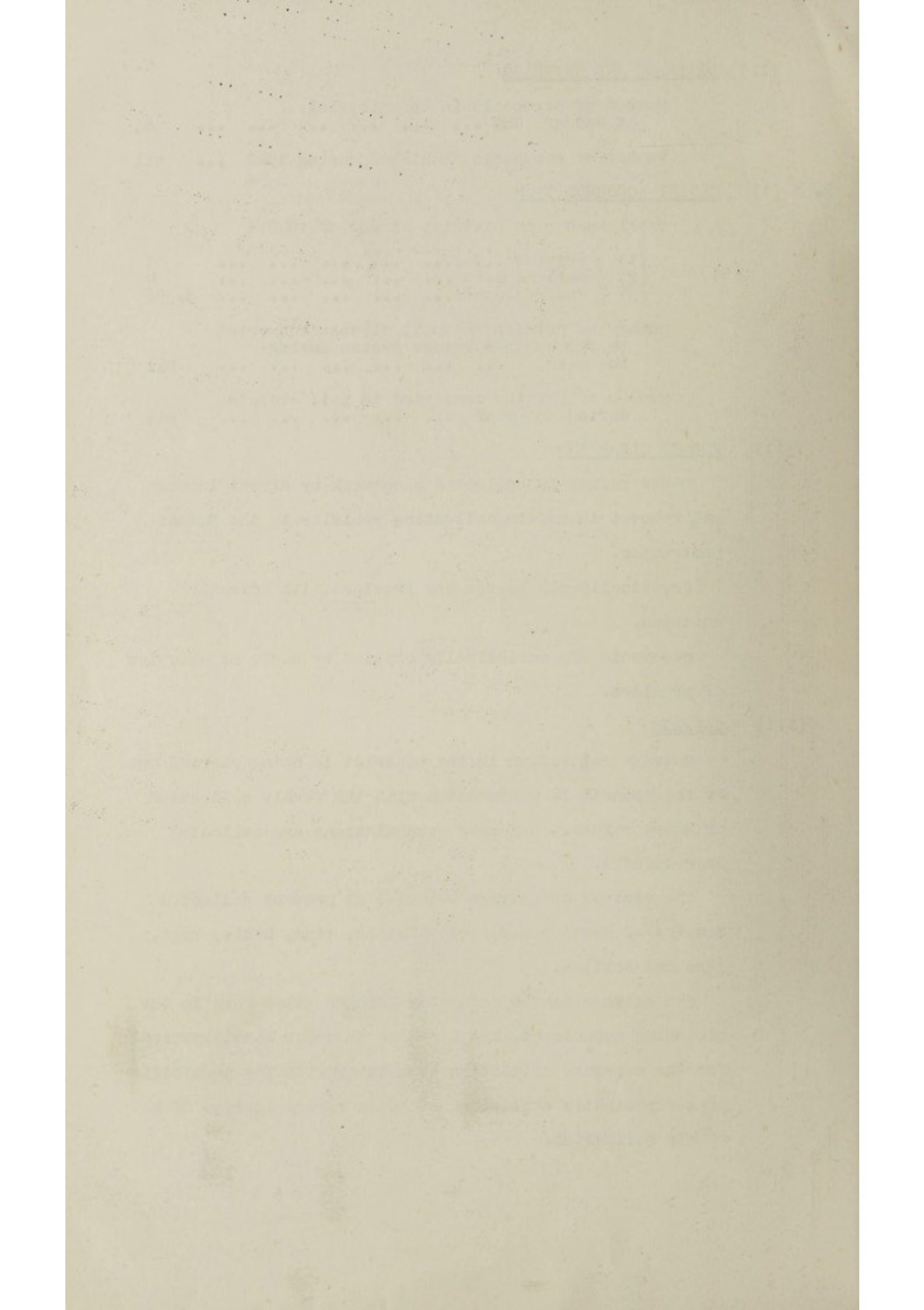
Cesspools are periodically emptied by owner or occupier

The classes of salvage material at present collected  
consist of waste paper, scrap metals, tins, bones, rags,  
jars and bottles.

The salvage scheme naturally imposes extra work in the  
cleansing department, but a scheme is under consideration  
for the separate collection of salvage with the possibility  
of a fortnightly collection of house refuse instead of a  
weekly collection.

The water for the swimming pool is treated with "chlorox" and the pool is emptied and cleansed weekly, running water from Scalford Brook passes through the paddling pool.

- (b) privately owned                      There is one privately owned open air swimming pool which is supplied with running water from the River Eye.



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## H O U S I N G

The housing inspections made have been chiefly concerned with the necessary repairs to houses, and no demolition orders have been made.

Owing to the increasing numbers of evacuees, official and unofficial, there are no doubt a number of cases where the "permitted number" has been exceeded, but accurate records of this overcrowding cannot be kept, and in view of the present shortage of housing accommodation the position as regards the overcrowding generally cannot be improved.
