





RODENT CONTROL.

After pre-bait testing two maintenance treatments were carried out during the year to destroy Rats in those main Sewers found to be infested, with very satisfactory results.

Minor rat infestations at the Destructor Works, Salvage Depot, Sewage Disposal Works and Cattle Market have been dealt with, also minor rats or mice infestations which were reported or discovered at one business, and 34 private, premises.

Action under Statutory Powers during the Year.

Proceedings under the Housing Acts and Public Health

Housing Act, 1936, Part IV - Overcrowding.

Complete details of all overcrowding in the District cannot be given, but from the information supplied by over 600 applicants for Council Houses, there are many cases of overcrowding, and the position is still difficult.

During the year 67 applicants have been granted tenancies of Council Houses and in addition seven Council House exchanges or transfers have been made. The total number of persons rehoused was 298.

In addition to conditions of overcrowding, there are a number of houses in the Town where the structural and general conditions are unsatisfactory, and it is desirable that at the earliest opportunity consideration should be given to the demolition of these dwellings and the re-housing of the tenants, in which case it will be necessary to have available houses of such suitable types and at such rents as will meet the needs of these cases.
