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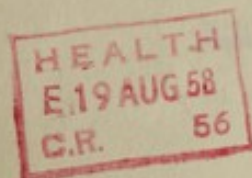

There was no serious epidemic during the year.

We were fortunate in having no confirmed case of Poliomyelitis. During the year a scheme was inaugurated for the vaccination of children in a selected age group and it is hoped that supplies of vaccine will be sufficient to make it possible for a high percentage of the children to receive protection.

Once again it is pleasing to report the absence of Diphtheria and it is now over eleven years since a case was notified.

## Diphtheria Immunisation

Details supplied by the Local Health Authority show that during the year 1957, 170 children under five years of age were immunised against diphtheria and 90 children aged four to fifteen years were given a "booster dose".

A survey has been completed of all food shops, and other premises where food is sold, stored or prepared. Subsequent visits have been made to many of the premises, and as a result of informal action, with the very good co-operation of food traders and others concerned, a number of improvements have been carried out including washing facilities, impervious surfaces, the screening of food exposed for sale, ventilation in food kitchens, and other matters coming within the requirements of the Regulations.

Two premises used as snack bars were found to be quite unsuitable for this purpose, and were voluntarily closed.
