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

Immediate investigations were made and tests carried out, and as a result it was found that the child's grandfather was a chronic carrier of this disease. Necessary advice and treatment was given, and no further cases occurred.

Poliomyelitis. No case of this disease was reported during the year.

<u>Diphtheria</u>, Once again it is pleasing to report the absence of diphtheria, and it is now over thirteen years since a case was notified.

Details supplied by the Local Health Authority show that during the year 1959, 206 children under five years of age were immunised against diphtheria and 85 children aged four to fifteen years were given a "booster dose".
