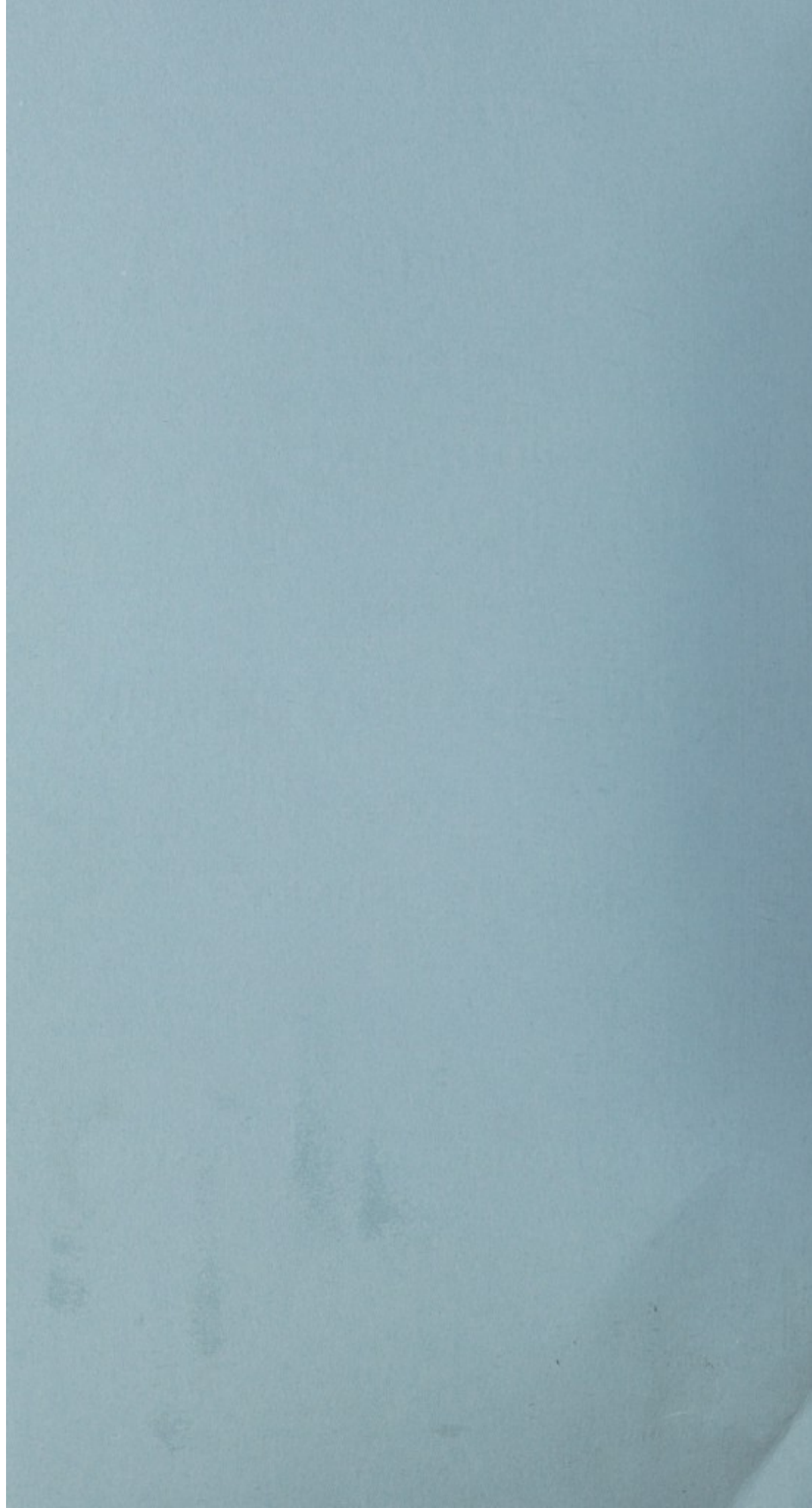

To the Chairman and Members of the Melton
Mowbray Urban District Council.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

It gives me pleasure to present to you my Annual Report on the health of the District for the year 1964. This has been compiled in accordance with the instructions of the Minister of Health.

A review of the statistics for the year reveal a satisfactory state of health in the District and compare favourably with those for England and Wales.

The population has risen by 540 during the year. The Birth Rate continues the trend of the past 10 years and is now 22.5, compared with 18.4 for England and Wales.

I am pleased to report that there were no maternal deaths.

The death rate has remained reasonably stable over the past 10 years. The chief causes of death were cardio-vascular lesions or diseases, cancer, pneumonia and bronchitis. All the lung cancer deaths were males, from the age of 45 years onwards. This is generally, an insidious disease and may take as long as 25 years before manifesting itself. Fore-warned is fore-armed, prevention appears to be a great part of the answer to the problem.

There was a marked reduction in the notification of infectious diseases. Immunisation and vaccination procedures have contributed to this happy position. It is to be hoped that a vaccine against measles will be available in the not too distant future.

Details of the Public Health Inspector's many activities are to be found in the report.

It gives me pleasure to present to you my Annual Report on the health of the District for the year 1984. This has been compiled in accordance with the instructions of the Minister of Health.

A review of the statistics for the year reveals a satisfactory state of health in the District and compares favourably with those for England and Wales.

The population has risen by 10 during the year. The birth rate continues the trend of the past 10 years and is now 23.5, compared with 18.4 for England and Wales.

I am pleased to report that there were no maternal deaths.

The death rate has remained reasonably stable over the past 10 years. The chief causes of death were cardiovascular diseases or diseases, cancer, pneumonia and bronchitis. All the lung cancer deaths were males, from the age of 45 years onwards. This is generally an infectious disease and may take as long as 25 years before manifesting itself. Fore-warned is fore-armed, prevention appears to be a great part of the answer to the problem.

There was a marked reduction in the notification of infectious diseases. Immunisation and vaccination programmes have contributed to this happy position. It is to be hoped that a vaccine against measles will be available in the not too distant future.

WATER SUPPLY

The water undertaking is under the control of the City of Leicester, and the supply has been satisfactory as regards quantity and quality.

Eight samples of mains water supplies taken for bacteriological examination were reported as satisfactory.

There is no indication of any tendency to plumbo-solvent action in the piped supplies.

Except for a small number of isolated premises the dwellinghouses have an internal mains water supply.

SEWERAGE AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL

The sewer system within the area is satisfactory and can be expanded as when required.

The sewage disposal works are at present working to maximum capacity, and a large expansion scheme has been prepared which will shortly be submitted to the Ministry for loan sanction.

Great masses of mains water supply taken for bacteriological examination were reported as satisfactory. There is no indication of any tendency to diminish-velocity action in the pipes supplied. Except for a small number of isolated premises the dwellings have no internal water supply.

The sewer system within the city is satisfactory and can be extended as may be required. The average annual works are at present working to capacity, and a large extension scheme has been prepared which will shortly be submitted to the Ministry for sanction.
