Mr. Chairman, Lady and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present the annual report for the year 1969. Dr. J.V. Loughlin resigned on 2nd March, 1969 and your new Medical Officer of Health Dr. G. McHugh took up his appointment on 20th October, 1969.

The population of the Melton area increased by 190 during 1969. The population at the end of 1968 was 18,250 and by the end of 1969 had increased to 18,440.

The birth rate dropped to 18.4 per thousand population from 19.0. For England and Wales the relevant figures were 16.3 and 16.9. The actual number of births in the Melton district was 340, being 14 less than in 1968.

The illegitimate birth rate (percent of live births) was 3% - a fall from 6.2% in 1968. The figure for England and Wales for 1969 was 8%.

The death rate for 1969 was 11.8 per thousand population. Last year the death rate was 9.4 per thousand population. For England and Wales the figures were both 11.9 per thousand population.

The infant mortality rate dropped to 18 infant deaths per thousand live births, in 1967 this rate was 24.3.

The chief causes of death were cerebro vascular disease, ischaemic heart disease, malignant neoplasms, bronchitis and pneumonia.

Infectious diseases during 1969 totalled 72. The majority of cases was measles which numbered 46 as against 129 in 1968. The measles epidemic continued throughout the year, but the demand for the measles vaccine did not reach the proportions anticipated. There was an increase in the incidence of infective jaundice from 1 in 1968 to 10 in 1969. There was also one case of typhoid fever.

The section on environmental hygiene is full of interest, and was prepared by Mr. Raymond your Chief Public Health Inspector. I am gratefully indebted to Mr. Raymond and to the other members of the Public Health Staff for their continuous interest and enthusiasm with which they worked throughout the year.

May I also say how grateful I am for the interest taken during the year by the members of the Council in the work of the Public Health Department.
