#### C. SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE DISTRICT.

Sanitary Inspection of the District.—Table I. gives a summary of inspections.

1. (i) Water.—22 samples of water were submitted to the Analyst, whose results showed that 9 were of good quality.

#### D. HOUSING.

Full particulars have been compiled and are being kept for Record purposes.

A survey of housing requirements was made during the year, including details of the new houses needed for each parish.

#### (b) Housing Conditions.

General Observations.—The position has by no means improved, and conditions exist which the Council would not have tolerated in previous years.

Fitness of Houses.—No representations were made during the year.

Unhealthy Areas.—No representations were made in respect of Clearance Areas.

#### E. INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD.

(a) Milk Supply.—The year was one of considerable activity in supervision of milk production, based on the samples taken under the Milk Testing and Advisory Scheme, which was given wholehearted support. Over 400 samples were taken, and it was possible to show a very considerable improvement in the quality of the milk, as shown by sample results, before the end of the year.

These inspections included visits at milking time, which are inclined to reveal much more than simple building inspections. A few cowshed floors were relaid, cooler places improved, etc.

1,531 inspections of cowsheds were made, and 51 of dairymen's premises.

Diphtheria Immunisation.—Immunisation has continued during the year, and in all at the end of 1943 4,094 children had been treated in the schools and 950 either privately or at Infant Welfare Centres, giving a grand total up to December 31st, 1943, of 5,044.
