C. SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE DISTRICT.

SANITARY INSPECTION OF THE DISTRICT.—Table I. gives a summary of inspections.

WATER. (1) 54 samples of water were submitted for chemical analysis to the Anaylst, and eight for bacteriological examination. 20 were of good quality, 12 unsatisfactory, and 30 condemned. No complaints were made as to quantity, except in respect of private piped supplies and odd wells. (ii) One chemical analysis only of main supply was made, and that was passed.

(iii) Contamination of Pipes Supplies. No comment is called for.

(iv) Wells were dealt with by cleansing and re-sampling, and in 6 cases town water laid on.

(v) Houses with supplies from public mains (a) direct to houses, number 6,328, and (b) by means of standpipes, about 100.

D. HOUSING.

The Council in April adopted the Standard of Fitness for working-class houses which had been prepared by the Warwickshire Rural Housing Advisory Committee, and the Survey asked for by the Minister was in progress during the year. The general situation has deteriorated during the year, as service men have begun to return to their homes and separate accommodation is required by the newly created families.

E. INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD.

Foodstuffs condemned included 1 pig, 3 sheep, 606lbsfish, 49 dozen eggs, 48lbs. bacon, and 45lbs. cheese.

Premises were visited during the year, and registration and satisfactory conditions enforced under Section 14 of the Food and Drugs Act, 1938, in relation to fish frying, making of ice-cream, sausage and cooked meats.

Diphtheria Immunisation.—Immunisation has continued during the year, and in all at the end of 1945 4,258 children had been treated in the schools and 1,917 either privately or at Infant Welfare Centres, giving a grand total up to December 31st, 1945, of 6,175.
