*Population.*—The estimated population, 34,800, is 1,030 greater than the estimate for 1946.

Birth Rate.—22.2 per 1,000 is higher than in 1946, and also higher than that for England and Wales.

Death Rate.—10.0 per 1,000, is much lower than that of England and Wales, viz., 12.0.

Infantile Mortality.—39 per 1,000 births is lower than that for 1946, and the figure for England and Wales in 1947, viz., 41. Conditions obtaining prior to birth would appear to be the greatest contribution to this figure.

Statistics for the past few years and also those for England and Wales in 1947 are given in Table II.

## C. SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE DISTRICT.

WATER (i) The supply has been generally satisfactory, except at Chadwick End (Balsall Parish), Corley Moor and Four Oaks (Berkswell and Meriden parishes), and in these three cases schemes for mains extensions have been approved.

26 samples of water were submitted for chemical analysis and 5 for bacteriological examination. Nine were of good quality, 11 unsatisfactory and 11 condemned.

(ii) No examinations of piped supplies were made.

(iii) Contamination of piped supplies was not experienced.

(iv) Wells were dealt with by cleansing and re-sampling and in 12 cases by connecting to mains.

(v) Particulars of piped supplies throughout the district are given in the Inspector's report herewith.

#### D. HOUSING.

Progress in the provision of houses during the year was excellent. At the time of the special housing report (October, 1946) the Council had 366 houses, consisting of 276 existing in 1939, 10 agricultural cottages built 1944, and 80 temporary bungalows built since the war.

The five-year programme adopted after consideration of the 1946 housing report, was for 646 houses, and of these 153 had been completed by the end of the year under review, making a total of 519 houses. The provision of council houses before the war was insufficient for the needs of the district, but the Council are now to be congratulated on an adequate post-war programme and on the energy with which the construction of houses has been pushed forward in face of innumerable difficulties.

## E. INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD.

Foodstuffs condemned were 2 cows, 2 pigs, 1 calf, 218 eggs, 413 meat pies, 210 lbs. beef, 23 lbs. bacon, 25 lbs. prunes and 119 tins of various foods.

Fresh registrations under section 14 of the Food and Drugs Act, 1938, were for ice cream 6, fish and chips 1, and cooked meats 1.

Scarlet Fever.—48 cases were notified, rather below the average for the past eight years. Of these 12 were notified from Arley, 9 from Coleshill, 8 from Castle Bromwich and 5 from Marston Green.

*Diphtheria.*—Of the 10 cases, 5 were in adults. In 3 cases there was a history of immunisation. There were no deaths.

Reference to Table III. will give the age distribution of the cases notified during 1947. Diphtheria Immunisation.—Immunisation has continued during the year, and in all at the end of 1947, 4,384 children had been treated in the schools and 2,807 either privately or at Infant Welfare Centres, giving a grand total up to December 31st, 1947, of 7,191.

Acute Poliomyelitis.—7 cases were notified, two adult males and 5 females, of whom one was an adult. It is interesting to note that one was the child of the adult female, and was taken ill some ten days before the mother.

Some of these figures (for example choked and defective drains; roofs defective) are higher than previously, and I think occupiers are complaining more freely than they used to. This may be because we have now so many amongst us who have previously lived in towns and another reason is the desire to draw attention to unsatisfactory conditions, in connection with applications for council houses.

Proceedings were taken in one case of housing defects and defective drainage and the work was then done.

#### RIVERS POLLUTION PREVENTION.

Routine samples were continued of effluents of small disposal works and a fair standard of maintenance secured.

In October the river Blythe received a toxic discharge (cyanide) for the second time and, later, a prosecution by the Solihull Council in respect of a trade effluent was successful.

#### SQUATTERS.

and the Council accepted responsibility for the first three (only) on this list.

#### WATER SUPPLIES.

Small mains extensions were made at Fivefield Lane, Keresley, Hodgetts Lane, Berkswell, Corley Ash and Eastern Green, Allesley.

#### SMOKE ABATEMENT.

Arising out of attendance by representatives at the Edinburgh conference the Council have decided to make use of 3 deposit gauges and 9 lead-peroxide gauges for measurement of atmospheric pollution in the district, with particular reference, of course, to the two large electric power stations at Hams Hall, Lea Marston.

#### GENERAL.

These reports, for economy of printing and lack of time for much considered writing, are kept to the minimum statement of work done and events which have occurred, but I cannot close this last report to be issued in the name of Dr. Gibbons Ward without a few words.
