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



### Hospital Provision.

Smallpox-Racefield Hospital, Chadderton.

Accommodation allotted—3 beds; as Racefield Hospital is in use by the Lancashire County Council for T.B. cases, accommodation is available at Ashton-under-Lyne Smallpox Hospital by arrangement.

During the year application was made to the Ministry of Health, and approved, for an order under Section 6 Public Health Act, 1936, to constitute the Authorities of Middleton, Chadderton, Royton, Crompton and Failsworth into a new Board for the purpose of making accommodation for infectious diseases, (including smallpox), under areas 11 and 12 of the County Scheme.

Other Infectious Diseases are at present accommodated at Marland Fever Hospital, by agreement with Rochdale County Borough.

Average stay in hospital during the year of diphtheria cases has been thirty-one days. Type, mild on the whole, one severe.

Scarlet Fever average stay-31 days. Type, mild.

### Immunisation of Diphtheria.

The scheme to provide an Immunisation Clinic has been deferred owing to war conditions. At present the General Practitioners are provided with A.P.T. and T.A.F. serum and the service is free to parents. The response of parents is disappointing; only 13 cases being recorded during the year.

### Diphtheria Anti-toxin.

About 10% of the cases were myopic, these have been followed up at intervals of six or twelve months to ensure careful correction of this progressive condition."

#### PHYSICAL TRAINING.

Two Physical Training Organisers (1 male and 1 female) for the combined areas—Middleton, Chadderton, Radcliffe and Farnworth were approved in the Board of Education letter of 30th August, 1939 and commenced duty on the 4th September, 1939, devoting an equal time to the schools in each area. (Vide Minute 2804/1939).

#### SCHOOL FEEDING.

#### Free Meals.

The report submitted last year applies with one amendment the Feeding Centre for Mid-day Dinners has been moved to Providence School owing to the Assembly Hall being used for National Service. The School is suitable and roomy with kitchen and lavatory accommodation.

98 children have received Mid-day Meals during the financial year (1st April, 1938 to 31st March, 1939) and 11,810 free meals were provided.

The standard and variety of the meals are similar to those reported previously.

#### Morning Milk.

The milk supplied is pasteurized in \(\frac{1}{3}\)-pint bottles. With the milk, Parkin/Bread and Butter/Raisin Biscuit is supplied in rotation.

#### SCHOOL BATHS.

The New Public Baths give satisfactory and much improved facilities for the school children.

36,273 attendances by school children were made during the year.

351 sessions for swimming lessons were held with an attendance of 9,447.

This work has been curtailed as the Baths were taken over for National Service in September.

#### Voluntary Help.

- The Mayor's Holiday Camp Fund Committee sent 100 children to Rossall (Cinderella Fund) Convalescent Home for one week.
- The Middleton Poor Children's Aid Society sent 74 children to Lytham for two weeks.
- 25 children were sent to the Children's Sanatorium, Southport for three weeks, 15 to the Stelfox Cot and 10 to the Jubilee Cot.
- The Middleton Auxiliary of the Cripple Children's Help Society admitted 6 children to the Convalescent Farm, Mellor, Derbyshire.
- The N.S.P.C.C. dealt with 16 cases, affecting 29 boys and 19 girls.
- The Mayor's Clog Fund provided 132 new pairs of Clogs and 46 pairs were repaired.

#### EXCEPTIONAL CHILDREN.

#### 1. Blind.

One child, a boy aged 8 is still under the care of a Manchester Specialist, as reported last year.

#### 2. Partially Sighted.

One boy, aged 12 attends the Oldham Blind School. One girl aged 11, attends the ordinary school—severe myopia. One

girl, aged 10-totally blind Right Eye, congenital retinal defect. Left eye normal.

#### 3. Deaf.

Totally deaf-none returned.

#### 4. Partially Deaf.

There are 3 boys attending the ordinary schools—cases of Otitis Media and 1 girl a case of congenital occlusion of the meatus.

#### 5. Mentally Defective.

There is a total of 11 children—7 boys and 4 girls. The ages of the boys—7, 8, 10, 12, 15, 15, 11; and of the girls—9, 9, 12, 15.

Of these 2 boys and 2 girls are attending the ordinary schools.

1 girl attends a special school.

Not at school-3 boys.

Left school and working-1 boy and 1 girl.

One boy, aged 11 years, Certified M.D. by another authority, is in a Remand Home.

There are 3 combined cases—

Boy, aged 15-Imbecile and Rickets-at Home.

Boy, aged 12—Feebleminded and Epilepsy—at School.

Boy, aged 10-Feebleminded and Epilepsy-at Home.

In the case of both boys at home, they have been notified to the Mental Deficiency Committee. Institutional treatment has been offered but not accepted by the parents.

#### 6. Epileptic.

There are 4 boys, aged 6, 10, 10, 12. One boy aged 12 (Feebleminded and Epileptic) is attending school; 1 boy aged 10 is in an Institution; 2 boys aged 6 and 10 are at home. The boy aged 10 is one of the combined cases (Epilepsy and Feebleminded).

One girl aged 8, a quiescent case is at school.
