Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present to you the Annual Report on the health of the Midhurst Rural District and the work of the Public Health Department during the Year 1951. This is the seventy-eighth report in the series.

The principal vital statistics for the year, together with comparative figures for 1950, are :-

Reference is made in the report to the importance of Diphtheria Immunisation. Adequate facilities are available but the responsibility for taking advantage of these must lie with parents.

Forty-three new houses (Private, Council and Housing Society) were completed during the year, making a total of 373 permanent houses completed since 1945. A further 99 houses were under construction at the 31st Decamber, 1951.

The Harting Drainage Scheme was completed in September, but progress in the making of connections both to this Scheme, and to that in Cocking, continues to be slow.

I would like to express my thanks to the Chairman and Members of the Council for their support and to Mr. Henry and all members of the Staff for their work during the year.

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Section I.

STATISTICS AND SOCIAL CONDITIONS.

The District remains as it has done for many years - an agricultural and residential one.

Other minor industries provide employment and the increasing holiday traffic brings a considerable amount of trade to hotels and cares.

The average age of the population is higher than it is in more populous and industrial districts and nearly half of the deaths recorded in 1951 occurred over the age of 75 years.

It will be noted that during the year there was an excess of births over deaths of 29. The Registrar-General's estimate of the home population of the District at the middle of the year is 16,730, an increase of 250 on the total population for 1950.

The chief causes of death in order of frequency were: -

These four causes accounted for 156 or 76.8% of the total deaths.

Of the total deaths, 146 or 71.9% occurred in persons aged 65 years or over. Of these, 98 or 48% of the total deaths occurred in persons aged 75 years or over, and 33 or 16% occurred in persons aged 85 years or over.

A table on Page 8 shows the age, sex distribution and causes of deaths in 1951.

Maternal Deaths.

One death was registered as directly due to pregnancy and childbearing, giving a maternal mortality rate of 4.21 per 1,000 total live and still births for the District. It is to be noted that this high rate is, in fact, caused by one of the only two maternal deaths occurring in the County during 1951.

The Maternal Mortality Rate for England and Wales is 0.79 per 1,000 births, and 0.5 for both the Urban and Rural Districts of West Sussex.

Hospitals.

General Provision of Health Services (Contd.)

Ambulances.

The Local Health Authorities (the West Sussex County Council and the Surrey County Council) provide an ambulance service with ambulances operating from Midhurst, Petworth and Haslemere. The same Authorities are also responsible for the Hospital Car Service.

Nursing.

General District Nurses, Midwives, Health Visitors and School Nurses, are employed by the West Sussex County Council to serve in the Rural District.

Nursing Homes.

There are six Nursing Homes registered by the West Sussex County Council under Section 187 of the Public Health Ast, 1936. These Homes, all or which are privately maintained, have a total accommodation for 138 patients. One nursing home with a total of 49 beds is used for accommodating aged chronic cases, while the next largest home, with 41 beds, accommodates tuberculosis patients.

Three of the remaining Nursing Homes provide a total of seven maternity beds.

National Assistance Act, 1948.

One burial was carried out during the year under Section 50 of this Act.

No action was necessary under Section 47.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

Water Supply.

Piped water is supplied principally by the Midhurst Rural District Council and the Wey Valley Water Co. These two statutory undertakers provide a supply, in part at least, to 22 of the 26 parishes in the Rural District, 3,226 houses receiving a supply which, with very few exceptions, is available within the dwellings. Piped water is also provided to some 1,176 houses by private estates. Details of the supplies in each of the parishes as at 31st December, 1951, are given in the table at the end of this Section.

Midhurst Rural District Council Water Undertakings.

Cocking, Easebourne, Heyshott, Midhurst, Stedham, West Lavington and Woolbeding.

The total number of houses supplied from this source is 1,114.

Slade Lane Bore Supply, Rogate - to the Parishes of Chithurst, Harting, Iping, Linch, Rogate, Stedham, Terwick, Trotton and Woolbeding.

The total number of houses supplied by this scheme is 585.

Spring Supply, Henley - to the Parishes of Easebourne and Fernburst.

This scheme supplies 32 houses.

Wey Valley Water Company.

During the year this Company replaced an existing 1" service to the Ropes district of Fernhurst by laying 263 yards of 3" cast iron main. The total number of houses supplied by this Company is 1,147.

Sampling.

Seventy-eight samples were taken from the above supplies and submitted for bacteriological examination which resulted in 67 being found satisfactory and II unsatisfactory. Twelve samples were submitted for chemical analysis, all of which were reported upon as being free from contamination with injurious metals. The degrees of hardness (Clark's Scale) were as follows:-

Sanitary Circumstances of the Area (Contd.)

Private Estate Supplies.

The total number of houses now receiving piped water from Estate Undertakings is 1,176. During the year routine sampling of the principal Estate supplies was continued, 133 samples being submitted for examination. Of these, 111 were reported as satisfactory and 22 as unsatisfactory.

Generally speaking, these Estate Supplies are unsatisfactory.

The mains are too small and adverse bacteriological reports have been received in respect of the raw waters.

The number of houses supplied by each Undertaking varies from.

Individual Private Supplies.

Fifty samples of water taken from wells and other sources supplying houses in various parts of the district were submitted for bacteriological examination. Of these, 44 were found to be unsatisfactory and 6 satisfactory.

Dreinage and Sewerage.

During the year the Harting Drainage Scheme was completed and the work of draining dwellings to the new sewers commenced at the beginning of October. Having regard to the time of year, fair progress was made in the drainage of the dwellings to the new sewers. It is hoped that work will be greatly accelerated during the coming summer although the cost of the work is very high as most of the new drainage has to be cut through rock.

Cocking Drainage.

Further progress was made in draining houses at Cooking to the sewer but expense and, in some cases, licensing difficulties, have caused delay.

Rogate Drainage.

This Scheme was due to commence in July 1952, but on instructions from the Ministry the commencing date has had to be postponed.

Midhurst Sewage Disposal Works.

During the year this Sewage Disposal Works was improved by the removal of the existing contact beds and the installation of sprinkling filters.

The whole of the refuse is deposited on tips situated at Upperton, Fernhurst, West Harting and Pitsham.

Cesspool Emptying Service.

The Council's cesspool emptying vehicle was again very hard pressed to cope with the work of cesspool emptying and at certain periods another cesspool emptier had to be hired. When the houses at Harting and Cocking are all connected to the new sewers, it is hoped that the demand for this vehicle will be much lessened.

Pail Closet Emptying Service.

The free pail closet emptying service at Harting was continued, the work being carried out by direct labour by the Council's communicle, a special attachment being incorporated in the cesspool emptier for this purpose. This work will, of course, cease when all the dwellings at Harting are drained to the sewers.

Shops Ast, 1950.

During the year 70 visits were made to shops and offices. As a result of action taken sanitary accommodation was improved at six premises.

Smoke Abatement.

No action was necessary in this connection.

Factories Act, 1937.

A total of 151 inspections of establishments coming within the scope of the Factories Ast, 1937, were made during 1951, there being 71 premises on the register. Fifty-two of these visits were made to premises having mechanical power and 99 to premises not so provided.

Eradication of Bed Bugs.

One dwelling was found to be infested during the year and was treated by blow lamp, Gammexane and fumigation.

Prevention of Damage by Pests Act, 1949.

During the year 720 infestations were dealt with and some 4,690 rats were destroyed. The Council's sewers were also treated but these were found to be free from rats.

Mosquitoes.

No action was called for.

Rag Flock and Other Filling Materials Act, 1951.

There are no premises in the district at which Rag Flock is used or sold.

Schools.

With the opening of the new modern Secondary School at Midhurst, four Primary Schools in the district were closed. Of the thirteen Primary Schools remaining, the sanitary arrangements at Easebourne School were modernised, new drainage to the sewers and sanitary conveniences provided at Cocking School, and new drainage and water-borns sanitation was also provided at Stedham School.

Legal Proceedings.

It was necessary during the year to serve two Statutory Notices under Section 93 of the Public Health Ast, 1936, regarding the abatement of nuisances. These were in respect of housing defects.

Altogether, five Statutory Notices for the previous year and two served during 1951 were complied with, Court proceedings being instituted in two cases when the Justices made the necessary Orders with costs.

HOUSING.

During the year 14 Council Houses were completed and 8 by the Midhurst Rural Housing Society, while 21 were built by private enterprise. At the end of the year there were 521 live applications for Council houses.

Housing Acts, 1936 and 1949.

Application for grant towards the cost of improving houses were only received in respect of two cases. In one case the cost was excessive and the application was refused. As has been previously mentioned there are some 3,000 sub-standard houses in this Rural District but owing to the uneconomic rents received owners are finding it very difficult to keep their properties in a proper state of repair. It was proposed to take action in a number of cases under Section 11 of the Housing Act, 1936, but the Council did not proceed owing to re-housing difficulties and the fact that the tenants in the existing cottages, who were paying very small rents, could not afford to pay the comparatively high rents of the new Council dwellings. There can be no doubt that if action were taken under Section 11 a large number of houses would be condemned. Many of them should be saved but owners cannot be expected to repair and improve their properties unless they can see some return for the money spent. It is to be hoped that this matter will receive the attention of Parliament in the near future.

During the year a new model dairy was erected and completed at Bepton Road, Midhurst. The dairy is equipped with all the latest appliances and all milk received from producers in the vicinity is pasteurised.

During the year 143 samples of milk taken from distributors were submitted for examination for cleanliness by the Methylene Blue Test and of these, 119 samples or 83% were reported upon as satisfactory.

Mest and Other Foods.

No regular slaughtering of animals, other than cottagers' pigs for home consumption, has been carried out in any of the slaughterhouses in the district, all of which have remained closed by virtue of the Livestock (Restriction of Slaughtering) Order, 1940. All meat for sale in the district continues to be slaughtered elsewhere, supplies for consumption being delivered from Chichester and Worthing to a central depot at Midhurst for distribution to retail butchers.

PREVALENCE AND CONTROL OF DESEASES.

Cases or Paratyphoid and Typhoid fevers occurred in the district and details or these are given below. Measles and Whooping Cough figures were high but no deaths resulted from either disease.

The success of the Diphtheria Immunisation Campaign shown by the remarkable reduction in the incidence and mortality of Diphtheria throughout the Country since 1941 seems to have led to a certain complacency. Young children are not being protected against Diphtheria in sufficient numbers to ensure the continued rarity of the disease. The public generally and parents in particular must realise that only by continuous protection of all children under one year can Diphtheria be kept at bay. No one who has ever seen a case of Diphtheria would willingly deny protection to any child.

All parents or young children who have not been immunised should arrange for it to be done by their family doctor or by application to the nearest clinic, district nurse or health visitor.

Cancer.

The number of deaths attributed to Cancer during the year was 33 (13 males, 20 females), an increase of 6 when compared with the year 1950. The Cancer Death Rate for the year is 1.97 per 1,000 or the estimated home population, compared with a rate of 1.63 for the previous year. Corresponding rates for the Administrative County and the Urban and Rural Districts are 2.57, 2.82 and 2.28 respectively.

Diphtheria.

- (a) Notifications. No cases of Diphtheria were notified during 1951, nor were any deaths registered as due to this cause.
- (b) Supply of Diphtheria Anti-Toxin. Anti-toxin is obtainable by medical practitioners for the treatment of suspected cases and contacts from the Royal West Sussex Hospital and St. Richard's Hospital, Chichester, and from the Isolation Hospital at Worthing.
- (c) Immunisation. During 1951, 35 children of school age and 180 children under 5 years of age received a complete course of injections. In addition, 192 children received 'follow-up' injections.

Enteric Fevers.

Four cases of Paratyphoid Fever were notified in August and September while similar cases were occurring in the neighbouring Urban and Rural Districts of Petersfield. The outbreak was traced to a shop in Petersfield but no conclusive evidence could be found as to how the infection which had spread from this shop had originated. One employee living in the Midhurst Rural District was found to be a carrier of the disease, but whether she was the originator of the epidemic, or one of the victims of it, could not be proved. The cases were isolated, contacts investigated and no secondary cases occurred.

One case of Typhoid Fever was diagnosed during August in an elderly man who was in hospital in Chichester under investigation for another condition. There were no other associated cases and no evidence of infection among his home contacts. If his infection was a recent one no evidence of its origin could be found and there remained the possibility that he had been a carrier of long standing. This case does not appear as a notification in the Rural District as it was notified to the City of Chichester from the hospital.

Erysipelas.

Two cases of this disease were notified during the year as compared with four in the previous year. One case was admitted to Isolation Hospital.

Measles

Notified cases or measles totalled 123 in 1951, compared with 45 in 1950.

Cases first appeared in November, 1950, and continued through the first eight months of 1951. None were notified after the end of August.

Pneumonia.

During the year 5 cases of Acute Primary Pneumonia and 1 case of Influenzal Pneumonia were notified. These figures compare with 5 cases and 3 cases respectively during the previous year. Deaths registered during 1951 as due to all forms of Pneumonia totalled 9, as compared with 11 for the year 1950.

Poliomyelitis.

Two cases of Poliomyelitis were notified during the year and in addition, three more cases were diagnosed after admission to hospital outside the district. Of the five cases altogether, two were non-paralytic and three showed some paralysis; one case proved fatal.

Scarlet Fever.

Four cases of Scarlet Fever were notified during 1951 as compared with 22 in the previous year. Of the notifications received, three occurred during the first quarter of the year.

Spirochaetal Jaundice.

One case of this disease was reported and subsequently proved fatal. Rat destruction work was carried out at the premises concerned after the case had occurred. No further cases were reported in the district.

Tuberculosis

Thirteen cases of Pulmonary Tuberculosis and 2 cases of Non-Pulmonary Tuberculosis were added to the notification register during the year as compared with 13 Pulmonary cases during 1950.

Six deaths (male) from Pulmonary Tuberculosis were recorded during the year, an increase of 1 compared with the previous year. No deaths were recorded as due to other forms of Tuberculosis.

The death rate from Pulmonary Tuberculosis for the year is 0.35 per 1,000 of the home population as compared with a rate of 0.30 for the previous year. The death rate from Pulmonary Tuberculosis for the Urban and Rural Districts of West Sussex for the year under review is 0.20.
