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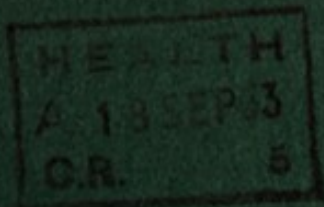

I have the honour to present to you the Annual Report on the health of the Midhurst Rural District and the work of the Public Health Department during the Year 1952. This is the seventy-ninth report in the series.

In Section VI of the report figures are quoted which show the dramatic reduction in the number of cases of Diphtheria and of deaths from the disease since 1944 in England and Wales. This advance can only be maintained if parents take full advantage of the facilities provided for immunisation of young children.

One hundred and six new houses (Private, Council and Housing Society) were completed during the year, making a total of 479 permanent houses completed since 1945. A further 88 houses were under construction at the 31st December, 1952.

I would like to express my thanks to the Chairman and Members of the Council for their support and to Mr. Henry and all members of the Staff for their work during the year.

Section I.

STATISTICS AND SOCIAL CONDITIONS.

The District remains as it has done for many years - an agricultural and residential one.

Other minor industries provide employment and the increasing holiday traffic brings a considerable amount of trade to hotels and cafes.

The average age of the population is higher than it is in more populous and industrial districts and more than half of the deaths recorded in 1952 occurred over the age of 75 years.

It will be noted that during the year there was an excess of births over deaths of 4. The Registrar General's estimate of the home population of the District at the middle of the year is 16,750, an increase of 20 on the total population for 1951.

These four causes accounted for 169 or 82% of the total deaths.

Of the total deaths, 156 or 75.7% occurred in persons aged 65 years or over, and of these, 115 or 55.8% of the total deaths occurred in persons aged 75 years or over.

GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA.

Hospitals.

Ambulances.

The Local Health Authorities (the West Sussex County Council and the Surrey County Council) provide an ambulance service with ambulances operating from Midhurst, Petworth and Haslemere. The same Authorities are also responsible for the Hospital Car Service.

Nursing Homes.

There are six Nursing Homes registered by the West Sussex County Council under Section 187 of the Public Health Act, 1936. These Homes, all of which are privately maintained, have a total accommodation for 152 patients. One nursing home with a total of 51 beds is used for accommodating aged chronic cases. A second home, now registered also for chronic cases with 51 beds, was used for Tuberculous patients until November, 1952.

Three of the remaining nursing homes provide a total of seven maternity beds.

SECTION III.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

Water Supply.

Piped water is supplied principally by the Midhurst Rural District Council and the Wey Valley Water Company. These two statutory undertakers provide a supply, in part at least, to 22 out of the 26 Parishes in the Rural District, 3,412 houses receiving a supply which, with very few exceptions, is available within the dwellings. Piped water is also provided to some 1,156 houses by private estates.

Details of the supplies in each of the parishes as at 31st December, 1952, are given in the table at the end of this Section.

MIDHURST RURAL DISTRICT COUNCIL WATER UNDERTAKINGS.

Rotherfield Bore Supply, Easebourne - to the Parishes of Bepton, Cocking, Easebourne, Heyshott, Midhurst, Stedham, West Lavington and Woolbeding.

The total number of houses supplied from this source is 1,186.

Slade Lane Bore Supply, Rogate - to the Parishes of Chithurst, Iping, Linch, Rogate, Stedham, Terwick, Trotton and Woolbeding.

The total number of houses supplied by this scheme is 645.

At the end of the year a large main extension scheme was put in hand to serve dwellings and farms at Chithurst, Elsted, Iping, Trotton and West Harting.

Lodsworth Bore Supply, Lodsworth - to the Parishes of Easebourne, Lodsworth, Lurgashall, South Ambersham and Tillington.

The total number of houses supplied by this scheme is 364.

Spring Supply, Henley - to the Parishes of Easebourne and Fernhurst.

This scheme supplies 32 houses.

WEY VALLEY WATER COMPANY.

Water is supplied to the Parishes of Fernhurst, Linchmere, North Ambersham, Iping, Lurgashall, Rogate and Trotton. The total number of houses supplied is 1,164.

No main extensions were carried out during the year.

Water Supply (Contd.)

Sampling - Statutory Water Undertakings.

Eighty-seven samples submitted for bacteriological examination resulted in 81 being satisfactory and 6 unsatisfactory.

Four samples submitted for chemical analysis were reported upon as satisfactory.

Private Estate Supplies.

The total number of houses now receiving a piped water supply from private undertakings is 1,156. During the year routine sampling of the principal estate supplies was continued, 124 samples being submitted for examination. Of these, 105 were reported as satisfactory and 19 as unsatisfactory.

The number of houses supplied by each undertaking varies from 2 to 188.

Individual Private Supplies.

Forty-four samples of water taken from Wells and other sources supplying houses in various parts of the district were submitted for bacteriological examination. Of these, 35 were found to be unsatisfactory and 9 satisfactory.

Drainage and Sewerage (Contd.)

Some progress with the provision of water closets and drainage to the new sewers at Harting was made during the year, while at Cocking a further 12 houses were drained to the sewers.

Rogate Drainage.

The starting date for this scheme has not yet been fixed although strong representations have been made by the Council to the Ministry.

Drainage - Bell Vale, North Ambersham.

At Bell Vale in the Parish of North Ambersham, further trouble was experienced with nuisances from cesspool and septic tank drainage, and a contract has been awarded for an extension of the sewer in this area.

Rivers and Streams.

Flooding due to obstruction of the Harting Brook continued to occur during periods of wet weather, but since the end of the year proposals have been put forward for work to be carried out which may alleviate recurring trouble.

Public Cleansing (Contd.)

The whole of the refuse is deposited on the Tip at Midhurst Common.

Cesspool Emptying Service.

The Council's cesspool emptying vehicle was again hard pressed to cope with the number of requests received for cesspools to be emptied. Some 659 cesspools were cleared during the year.

Pail Closet Emptying Service.

The free pail closet emptying service at Harting was continued, but it has now been decided that this work will cease in respect of those houses on the line of the new sewers on the 30th June, 1953.

Shops Act, 1950.

During the year 41 visits were made to shops and offices. As a result of action taken sanitary accommodation was improved at three premises.

Smoke Abatement.

No action was necessary in this respect.

Factories Act, 1937.

There are 70 establishments situate in the district coming within the scope of the Factories Act, 1937, of which 42 are provided with mechanical power. During the year, 102 inspections of factory premises were made, and the following list summarises the various defects found and remedied :

Swimming Baths and Pools.

There are no public swimming baths or pools in the district.

Camping Sites.

In addition, the Camping Club of Great Britain has a site of some 22 acres near The Potteries, East Lavington, such land being used solely by campers with tents.

Eradication of Bed Bugs.

No action was necessary in this respect.

Prevention of Damage by Pests Act, 1949.

During the year 878 infestations were dealt with and some 4,910 rats were destroyed.

The Council's sewers were also treated, but these were found to be free from rats.

Mosquitoes.

No action was called for.

Rag Flock and Other Filling Materials Act, 1951.

There are no premises in the district at which Rag Flock is used or sold.

Schools.

There are 13 Primary Schools in the district of which 11 have waterborne sanitation. During the year modern sanitation was installed at Rogate C.E. (Controlled) School and connected to the sewer. Total accommodation provided consisted of 6 water closets and urinal, 6 basins, together with separate water closet and basin for staff.

Thirty visits were made to school premises.

Section IV.

HOUSING.

Of the three retail dairies in the district, two possess pasteurising plants.

During the year 103 samples of milk taken from distributors were submitted for examination for cleanliness by the Methylene Blue Test, and of these, 98 were reported upon as satisfactory.

Twenty-one samples of Pasteurised milk were also taken and submitted to the Phosphatase Test, and of these, 17 were reported upon as satisfactory and 4 unsatisfactory.

Meat and Other Foods.

No regular slaughtering of animals, other than cottagers' pigs for home consumption, has been carried out in any of the slaughterhouses in the district, all of which have remained closed by virtue of the Livestock (Restriction of Slaughtering) Order, 1940. All meat for sale in the area continues to be slaughtered elsewhere, supplies for consumption being delivered from Chichester and Worthing to a central depot at Midhurst for distribution to retail butchers.

Section VI.

PREVALENCE AND CONTROL OF DISEASES

Five cases of Poliomyelitis were notified during the year, but otherwise the incidence of infectious disease was small.

In 1944, there were 934 deaths from Diphtheria in England and Wales, in 1948 there were 156 deaths, and in 1952 there were 31 deaths. Over the same period the number of cases of Diphtheria notified has fallen from over 23,000 in 1944, to less than 400 in 1952.

There has been no case in this district since 1945, but this dramatic success of immunisation must not be allowed to result in a reduction of the numbers of children immunised year by year. To ensure continuing success not less than 75 per cent of babies should be immunised before their first birthday, but in 1952 only 31 per cent of the babies under one in the first half of the year were immunised. For every baby protected two are left unprotected and the responsibility for this lies squarely on the parents.

Cancer.

The number of deaths attributed to Cancer during the year was 34 (19 males, 15 females) - 33 deaths in 1951.

The Cancer Death Rate for the year is 2.02 per 1,000 of the estimated home population - 1.97 for 1951. Corresponding rates for the Administrative County and the Urban and Rural Districts are 2.45., 2.78 and 2.09 respectively.

Chicken Pox.

This disease is not notifiable, consequently cases become known to the Department only when absences from school result. Thirty-one cases of Chicken Pox were recorded in this way in 1952, 17 occurring at the Harting Primary School and 14 at Fernhurst County Primary School.

Diphtheria

(a) Notifications.

No cases of Diphtheria were notified during 1952, nor were any deaths registered as due to this cause.

(b) Diphtheria Anti-Toxin. Anti-toxin is obtainable by medical practitioners for the treatment of suspected cases and contacts from the Royal West Sussex Hospital and St. Richard's Hospital, Chichester, and from the Isolation Hospital at Worthing.

(c) Immunisation.

During 1952, 41 children of school age and 143 children under 5 years of age received a complete course of injections. In addition, 160 children received 'follow-up' injections.

Erysipelas.

One case of this disease was notified during the year (2 cases in 1951.)

Measles.

Cases notified were 10 (123 in 1951). Five of these were in December and were the first cases of a considerable outbreak which by the end of March, 1953, had resulted in a further 244 notifications.

In 1952 there were no complicated cases which necessitated admission to hospital.

Pneumonia.

Six cases of Acute Primary Pneumonia were notified (a total of 8 cases in 1951.)

Deaths registered during 1952 as due to all forms of Pneumonia totalled 3, as compared with 9 for the year 1951.

Poliomyelitis.

Five cases of paralytic poliomyelitis were notified during the year (3 paralytic and 2 non-paralytic cases during 1951).

No deaths were registered as due to this cause.

Puerperal Pyrexia.

One case was notified (nil in 1951).

Scarlet Fever.

Ten cases of Scarlet Fever were notified during 1952 (4 cases in the previous year). Nine of these cases occurred during the last quarter of the year.

Tuberculosis.

Fifteen cases of Pulmonary Tuberculosis and 5 cases of Non-Pulmonary Tuberculosis were added to the notification register during the year (13 Pulmonary and 2 Non-Pulmonary cases in 1951).

Three deaths from all forms of Tuberculosis were recorded (1 pulmonary, 2 Non-Pulmonary), a decrease of 3 when compared with the previous year.

The death rate from Pulmonary Tuberculosis for the year is 0.05 per 1,000 of the home population (0.35 in 1951). The death rates from Pulmonary Tuberculosis for the Urban and Rural Districts of West Sussex for the year under review were 0.20 and 0.13 respectively.
