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

One hundred and fourteen houses (Private, Council and Housing Society) were completed during the year, making a total of 593 permanent houses completed since 1945. A further 85 houses were under construction at the 31st December, 1953.

Certain new features are revealed by the figures set out above. The population of the district is older than the average for the country and has been so for many years. This is due to the tendency for retired people to settle in an attractive country district, and for a proportion of younger people to migrate to the towns. Consequently, the birth rate is below average. In previous years, however, the birth rate has nevertheless exceeded the death rate and a "natural increase" has therefore resulted.

There are three establishments in the district, one belonging to the West Sussex County Council and two privately owned, into which old people are admitted from a much larger area. rate in these communities is naturally high and the Registrar-General decided that from the beginning of 1953, deaths occurring in all such institutions should not be transferred to the districts of origin, but recorded in this district. Because of this decision some thirty deaths which would have been transferred to other districts were not so transferred, and what would have been a natural increase of seventeen in the population has been converted into a natural decrease of thirteen, although the birth rate has, in fact, increased. The net change in pepulation, including this figure and an allowance for migration into and out of the district, is an increase of seventy on the total population in 1952.

Of the total deaths recorded, 201 or 81% occurred in persons aged 65 years or over; 139 or 56% in persons aged 75 years or over, and 46 or 18.6% in persons aged 85 years or over.

Section II.

GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA.

Hospitals.

The hospitals providing accommodation and treatment for residents of the District are administered by the South-West Metropolitan Regional Hospital Board through Hospital Management Committees.

Ambulances.

The Local Health Authorities (the West Sussex County Council and the Surrey County Council) provide an ambulance service with ambulances operating from Midhurst, Petworth and Haslemere. The same Authorities are also responsible for the Hospital Car Service.

Home Nursing and Midwifery.

General District Nurses, Midwives, Health Visiters and School Nurses, are employed by the West Sussex County Council to serve in the Rural District.

Treatment Centres and Clinics.

Ante-Natal Clinics - held at Camelsdale, Midhurst, Rake, Northchapel and Petworth. Infant Welfare Centres Infant Weighing Centres held at Heyshott, Rogate and Stedham. School Clinic (Minor Ailments Aural Clinic held at Chichester. Orthopaedic Clinic Speech Therapy Clinic Eye Clinic held at Midhurst Chest Clinic held at Aldingbourne House Sanatorium. Venereal Diseases Clinics held at St. Mary's Hospital,

Chichester.

Nursing Homes.

At the beginning of the year there were six Nursing Homes registered by the West Sussex County Council under Section 187 of the Public Health Act, 1936. These Homes, all of which were privately maintained, had a total accommodation for 152 patients. One nursing home with a total of 51 beds is used for accommodating aged chronic cases. A second home, registered also for chronic cases with 51 beds, was closed in May, 1953.

National Assistance Act. 1948.

(a) Section 47.

An Order under this Section was granted on the 21st May, 1953, in respect of an aged couple who were living in insanitary conditions in a requisitioned house. This was not the first time that such action had had to be taken in their case, orders having been previously granted and renewed during 1948 and 1949.

As on the previous occasion, the man and woman concerned were admitted to the West Sussex County Council Welfare Home at East Preston where they remain, extensions of the original Order having been granted at quarterly intervals up to December, 1953.

(b) Section 50.

No burials were carried out during 1953.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

Water Supply.

Piped water is supplied principally by the Midhurst Rural District Council and the Wey Valley Water Company. These two statutory undertakers provide a supply, in part at least, to 23 out of the 26 Parishes in the Rural District, 3,627 houses receiving a supply which, with very few exceptions, is available within the dwellings. Piped water is also provided to some 1,154 houses by private estates.

Details of the supplies in each of the parishes as at 31st December, 1953, are given in the table at the end of this Section.

MIDHURST RURAL DISTRICT COUNCIL WATER UNDERTAKINGS.

During the year the second stage of the Rogate Water Scheme in the Parishes of Elsted, Harting, Iping, Terwick, Treyford, Trotton and Woolbeding, was practically completed, some 37,468 yards of main having been laid. Approval has also been received to the proposed extension of the Lodsworth Supply Scheme to the Parishes of East Lavington and Graffham.

Rotherfield Bore Supply, Easebourne - to the Parishes of Bepton, Cocking, Easebourne, Heyshett, Midhurst, Stedham, West Lavington and Woolbeding.

The number of houses supplied from this source is 1,242.

Slade Lane Bore Supply, Regate - to the Parishes of Chithurst, Elsted, Harting, Iping, Linch, Rogate, Stedham, Terwick, Trotton and Woolbeding.

A total of 759 houses are supplied by this scheme.

Lodsworth Bore Supply, Lodsworth - to the Parishes of Easebourne, Lodsworth, Lurgashall, South Ambersham and Tillington.

This source supplies 380 houses.

Spring Supply, Henley - to the Parishes of Easebourne and Fernhurst.

Thirty-two houses are supplied by this scheme.

WEY VALLEY WATER COMPANY.

Water is supplied to the Parishes of Fernhurst, Iping, Linchmere, Lurgashall, North Ambersham, Rogate and Trotton. The total number of houses supplied is 1,189.

Main extensions were carried out by this Company to the Rake Housing Site from their Liss Supply - 320 yards of 4" and 76 yards of 3" main being laid.

Drainage and Sewerage (Contd.)

Good progress was made with the provision of water closets and drainage to the new sewers at Harting, while at Cocking, a further 21 houses were connected.

Rogate Drainage.

A starting date for this scheme has now been received from the Ministry, and at the time of writing this report, tenders were out for the carrying out of the necessary works.

Drainage - Bell Vale, North Ambersham,

An extension of the Northern Fernhurst sewer was carried out at Bell Vale and six houses where nuisances from cesspool and septic tank drainage existed were connected thereto.

Rivers and Streams.

Flooding from Harting Brook continued to give trouble, and although the question of alleviation received the attention of the Committee during the year, no definite propesals have yet been forthcoming for dealing with the matter.

Public Cleansing (Contd.)

Cesspool Emptying Service.

The Council's cesspool emptying vehicle was again hard pressed to cope with the number of requests for cesspools to be emptied. Some 685 emptyings were carried out during the year.

Pail Closet Emptying Service.

The free pail closet emptying service to houses on the line of the new sewers at Harting was discontinued except in a few cases where it was impractical for the occupants to dispose of closet contents.

Shops Act. 1950.

During the year 38 visits were made to shops and offices, and as a result of action taken water closet accommodation was provided at three shops.

Smoke Abatement.

No action was necessary in this respect.

Factories Act, 1937.

There are 70 establishments situated in the district coming within the scope of the Factories Act, 1937, of which 41 are provided with mechanical power.

During the year, 110 inspections of factory premises were made, and the following list summarises the various defects found and remedied:

Prevention of Damage by Pests Act, 1949.

During the year 899 infestations were dealt with and some 4,948 rats were destroyed.

The Council's sewers were also treated.

No action was necessary.

Rag Flock and Other Filling Materials Act, 1951.

There are no premises in the district at which Rag Flock is used or sold.

Schools.

There are 13 Primary Schools in the district of which 11 have waterborne sanitation. The drainage disposal plant at one school was overhauled and covered to prevent trouble from smell.

At the Elsted District (Controlled) School, separate sanitary accommodation was provided for the staff.

Twenty visits were made to school premises.

No schools were closed during 1953 on account of infectious or other diseases.

Section IV.

HOUSING

One hundred and fourteen houses (51 Private, 57 Council and 6 Housing Society) were completed during 1953.

At the end of the year there were 466 applications outstanding on the Council's re-housing list.

Housing Acts, 1936 and 1949.

Action was taken in five cases under Section 11 of the Housing Act, 1936, which resulted in two of the dwellings being condemned, one closed, and the other two the subject of undertakings that they would be made fit within a period of nine months.

Applications for grant under the Housing Act, 1949, were received in respect of eleven dwellings, all of which were approved, and reconditioning work is now in hand or about to begin.

The new legislation now before Parliment dealing with rent increases, the repair and reconditioning of unfit dwellings, and the abolition of slum dwellings, will necessitate a five year programme being drawn up for dealing with these unfit houses. The Rural Housing Survey completed in 1948 will prove invaluable in formulating this programme.

The big problem will be to get work done as the building labour situation in this district is still difficult. In addition, there is the question of the provision of new dwellings for the purpose of rehousing the occupiers of those houses already condemned and those likely to be condemned. Many of the tenants of these unfit dwellings have no desire to move and would prefer to remain where they are as they cannot afford the comparatively high rents of Council houses.

Of the three retail dairies in the district, two possess pasteurising plants.

During the year, 103 samples of milk taken from distributors were submitted for examination for cleanliness by the Methylene Blue Test, and of these, 94 were reported upon as satisfactory.

Twenty-four samples of Pasteurised milk were taken and submitted to the Phosphatase Test, all of which were reported upon as satisfactory. Forty-five samples of milk taken from farms whose milk is retailed in the district were submitted for biological examination and reported free from Tubercle Bacilli.

Meat and Other Foods.

No regular slaughtering of animals, other than cottagers' pigs for home consumption, has been carried out in any of the slaughterhouses in the district, all of which have remained closed by virtue of the Livestock (Restriction of Slaughtering) Order, 1940. All meat for sale in the area continues to be slaughtered elsewhere, supplies for consumption being delivered from Chichester, Petersfield and Worthing, to the retail butchers in the area.

PREVALENCE AND CONTROL OF DISEASES.

Details of the incidence of different diseases are given separately below. A few cases of Measles had occurred in the district before the end of 1952, but the cutbreak reached its peak in February and March of 1953, and cases continued to appear until the end of August.

The winter increase in Poliomyelitis which was noted in last year's report continued with three cases in the first quarter of 1953, but no further cases occurred until July.

In 1944, there were 934 deaths from Diphtheria in England and Wales, in 1948 there were 156 deaths, and in 1953 there were 24 deaths. Over the same period the number of cases of Diphtheria notified has fallen from over 23,000 in 1944 to 240 in 1953.

No case of Diphtheria has been notified in the district for eight years, but this happy result of immunisation cannot be regarded as a permanent victory over the disease. Diphtheria infection is still present in the country and less than a third of the babies born are protected before their first birthday. There is thus a growing population of children who have never been infected because they have not been exposed to infection. Their parents can thank the parents of inoculated children for this escape, but unless the proportion of inoculated babies increases, the balance will eventually be upset and epidemics of Diphtheria will once again become a feature of public health experience. Every parent of yauge children should realise the contribution they can make to the general good by having their children inoculated in the first year of life.

Overseas Travel - Inoculations,

As an increasing number of people are going abroad it is important that the international regulations governing protective inoculations in different countries, particularly those in the tropics, should be understood.

Different countries have different requirements about protection against such diseases as Smallpox, Cholera and Vellow Fever, but in a 'Notice to Travellers' issued by the Ministry of Health, the following paragraph appears:-

"Apart from any requirement by a particular country, all persons going abroad are advised to be effectively vaccinated against enteric (typhoid) fever and paratyphoid fever and, if they are going to those parts of the Far East where cholera is endemic, to be vaccinated against that disease also".

Prevalence and Control of Diseases,

Overseas Travel - Inoculations (Contd.)

International dertificates of vaccination are required in certain countries as evidence of successful protection against Smallpox, Cholera and Yellow Fever. Certificates for Smallpox and Cholera inoculations have to be countersigned and bear an official stamp of the District Council after the certificate has been signed by the doctor carrying out the vaccination.

Yellow Fever inoculations are only carried out at certain specified centres of which the nearest are:

LONDON - Hospital for Tropical Diseases, 4, St. Paneras Way, N.W.1.

SOUTHAMPTON - Reyal South Hants Hespital,
Pathological Laboratory,
Exmoor Road, Southampton.

Cancer.

The number of deaths attributed to Cancer during the year was 28 (14 males, 14 females) - 34 deaths in 1952.

The Cancer Death Rate for the year is 1.66 per 1,000 of the estimated home population - 2.02 for 1952. Corresponding rates for the Administrative County and the Urban and Rural Districts are 2.48., 2.81 and 2.13 respectively.

Chicken Pox.

This disease is not notifiable, consequently cases become known to the Department only when absences from school result. Three cases only were recorded in this way during 1953 (31 in 1952) and were admitted to Isolation Hospital.

Diphtheria.

- (a) Notifications. No cases of Diphtheria were notified during 1953, nor were any deaths registered as due to this cause.
- (b) <u>Diphtheria Anti-Toxin</u>. Anti-toxin is obtainable by medical practitioners for the treatment of suspected cases and contacts from the Royal West Sussex Hospital and St. Richard's Hospital, Chichester, and from the Isolation Hespital at Worthing.

Diphtheria (Contd.)

(c) Immunisation. During 1953, 9 children of school age and 134 children under 5 years of age received a complete course of injections. In addition, 111 children received 'follow-up' injections.

Dysentery.

Three cases were notified (none in 1952). One patient was admitted to Isolation Hospital.

Food Poisoning.

Two notifications were received (none in 1952). The cases occurred in one household and resulted in one patient being admitted to Isolation Hospital.

Measles.

A total of 306 cases were notified (10 in 1952). This was the biennial winter epidemic which had already started with five cases in December, 1952. Two hundred and forty-four cases occurred in the first quarter of 1953, and a further 47 by the end of June; the remaining 15 cases were notified before the end of August.

Details of the 306 notified cases are set out on page 30.

Pneumonia.

Thirteen cases of Pneumonia were notified (6 cases in 1952)

Deaths registered during 1953 as due to all forms of Pneumonia totalled 12 (3 deaths in 1952).

These figures - 13 notifications and 12 deaths - might at first sight give a completely wrong impression of the mortality rate in this group. In fact, however, none of the 13 cases notified had a fatal issue, and none of the 12 cases in which death was certified as due; to Pneumonia had been notified before death.

The usefulness of notification as at present carried out is therefore questionable.

Poliomyelitis.

Six cases were notified (5 in 1952). Two were nonparalytic and four paralytic cases.

No deaths were registered as due to this cause.

Scarlet Fever.

Six cases of Scarlet Fever were notified during 1953 (10 cases in the previous year.)

Three cases were admitted to Isolation Hospital.

Tuberculosis.

Ten cases of Pulmonary Tuberculosis and 1 case of Non-Pulmonary Tuberculosis were added to the notification register during the year (15 Pulmonary and 5 Non-Pulmonary cases in 1952).

Four deaths from Pulmonary Tuberculosis were recorded (1 Pulmonary and 2 Non-Pulmonary deaths in 1952).

Tuberculosis (Contd.)

The death rate from this disease for the year is 0.23 per 1,000 of the home population (0.05 in 1952.) The death rates from Pulmonary Tuberculosis for the Urban and Rural Districts of West Sussex for the year under review were 0.06 and 0.10 respectively.
