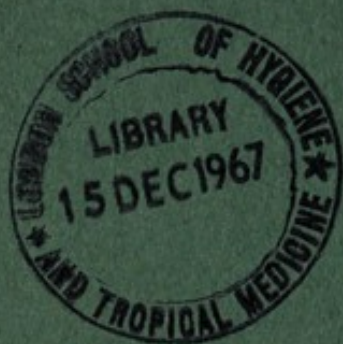

The number of cases of Diphtheria in England and Wales continues to decrease, but parents must still be reminded of the part they must play in this advance by ensuring that all young children are protected by immunisation.

One hundred and thirty-six houses (75 Private, 61 Council) were completed during the year, making a total of 831 permanent houses completed since 1945. A further 36 houses were under construction by the Council at the 31st December, 1955.

When dealing with a small population such as that of this district, a certain random fluctuation from year to year in birth and death rates is to be expected. This is illustrated by the figures for the last ten years shown on Page 9.

In 1949 and 1950, the Registrar-General resumed the pre-war practice of giving for each area a comparability factor for Birth and Death Rates. The purpose of this is to make the rates strictly comparable between different areas in the country. These factors make allowance for the differing age and sex structure of populations in different places. For example, a district like this which is an attractive one for retired people, has a higher crude death rate and a lower crude birth rate than it would have if the population were of the same structure as the average population for England and Wales as a whole. The Corrected Rates are the rates which would be revealed if the actual number of births and deaths in the district had occurred in a standard population.

Of the total deaths recorded during 1955, 199 or 79.9% occurred in persons aged 65 years or over; 145 or 58% in persons aged 75 years or over, and 44 or 17% in persons aged 85 years or over.

These four causes accounted for 213 or 84% of the total deaths.

Deaths (Contd.)

A table at the end of this Section shows the age, sex distribution and causes of death in 1955.

From the above statistics it will be seen that births exceeded deaths by 13, and the Registrar-General's estimate of the population of the district at mid-year 1955, showed an increase of 20 over the 1954 estimate.

Nursing Homes.

At the end of the year there were five Nursing Homes in the district registered by the West Sussex County Council under Section 187 of the Public Health Act, 1936, providing a total accommodation for 102 patients. Section III.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

Water Supply

The Midhurst Rural District Council and the Wey Valley Water Company provide mains water to all Parishes in the District, 4143 properties having a supply within the dwellings with very few exceptions.

Private Estate water is also piped to 982 houses.

Details of the supplies in each of the parishes as at 31st December, 1955, are given in the table at the end of this Section.

MIDHURST RURAL DISTRICT COUNCIL WATER UNDERTAKINGS.

During the year there was an extension of the water main up Gatehouse Lane, Trotton, to supply farms and dwelling houses in this vicinity.

Rotherfield Bore Supply, Easebourne - to the Parishes of Bepton, Cocking, Easebourne, Heyshott, Midhurst, Stedham, West Lavington and Woolbeding.

The number of houses supplied from this source is 1,270.

Slade Lane Bore Supply, Rogate - to the Parishes of Chithurst, Elsted, Harting, Iping, Linsh, Rogate, Stedham, Terwick, Treyford, Trotton and Woolbeding.

This supply is interconnected with the Rotherfield Supply at the Half Moon, Midhurst, and the extra pressure thus obtained has helped in improving the supplies to dwellings in the Cocking and West Lavington areas.

A total of 993 houses are supplied by this scheme.

Lodsworth Bore Supply, Lodsworth - to the Parishes of Easebourne, East Lavington, Graffham, Lodsworth, Lurgashall, North Ambersham, South Ambersham and Tillington.

This source supplies 514 houses.

Spring Supply, Henley - to the Parishes of Easebourne and Fernhurst.

Thirty-two houses are supplied by this scheme.

Water Supply (Contd.)

WEY VALLEY WATER COMPANY.

Water is supplied to the Parishes of Fernhurst, Harting, Iping, Linchmere, Lurgashall, North Ambersham, Rogate and Trotton.

The total number of houses supplied is 1,300.

Main extensions carried out by this Undertaking were as follows :-

In addition, a 300,000 gallon reservoir has been constructed by the Company at Hollycombe in the Parish of Linch. This reservoir is now in use and Fernhurst Village is supplied from here instead of over Fridays Hill, which has greatly improved the supply position in this area.

Rogate Drainage.

The Rogate drainage scheme was completed during the year and substantial progress was made in draining houses to the new sewers. The number connected at Rogate and Terwick is 102.

Harting and Cocking Drainage.

Twenty-one connections were made during the year at Harting and seven at Cocking.

Rivers and Streams.

A scheme for alleviating flooding at Harting has not yet been put into operation due to difficulties with owners through whose land the new channel would run. Negotiations are still in progress, however, and it is hoped that the work will be put in hand in the near future.

Cesspool Emptying Service.

The Council continues to provide a rateborne cesspool emptying service which allows one free emptying at intervals of three months to premises where connection to the main is not

possible. Where house drains can be connected to the sewer, emptyings are only undertaken upon payment of the requisite fee.

During the year, 851 cesspools were emptied, and with the single vehicle in use, the assistance of an outside contractor had to be called upon.

Shops Act, 1950.

Fifty-five visits were made to shops and offices.

Informal action was taken in four cases in connection with insufficient sanitary accommodation.

Smoke Abatement

No action was necessary in this respect.

Factories Act, 1937.

There are 68 establishments situated in the district coming within the scope of the Factories Act, 1937, of which 42 are provided with mechanical power.

Prevention of Damage by Pests Act, 1949.

Section IV.

HOUSING

At the close of 1955, the Council's list of housing applicants showed 326 outstanding cases as compared with 379 cases in 1954.

Of the three retail dairies in the district, two possess pasteurising plants.

During the year, 129 samples of milk taken from distributors were submitted for examination for cleanliness by the Methylene Blue Test, and of these, 103 were reported upon as satisfactory.

Twenty-eight samples of Pasteurised Milk were taken and submitted to the Phosphatase Test, and of these, twenty-seven were satisfactory.

Twenty-eight samples of milk taken from farms whose milk is retailed in the district were submitted for biological examination and reported free from Tubercle Bacilli.

One sample of Sterilised Milk was taken for turbidity test and found satisfactory.

Meat and Other Foods

Most of the meat consumed in the district is slaughtered elsewhere, supplies being delivered mainly from Chichester, Petersfield, Haslemere and London.

Section VI.

PREVALENCE AND CONTROL OF DISEASES

Measles was prevalent during the first half of the year, 98 of the 113 cases occurring before the end of June. Otherwise there were few cases of infectious disease.

There has been no case of Poliomyelitis since 1953, and none of Diphtheria for ten years. It is still necessary, nevertheless, to remind parents that Diphtheria has not been eliminated from this country and will continue to be a danger until three-quarters of the children born are protected by immunisation. At present less than forty per cent are being protected.

Cancer.

Deaths attributed to Cancer during the year numbered 45 (23 males, 22 females) - 43 deaths in 1954.

The Cancer Death Rate is 2.65 per 1,000 of the estimated home population - 2.53 for 1954. Corresponding rates for the Administrative County and the Urban and Rural Districts are 2.4., 2.7 and 2.1 respectively.

Diphtheria.

(a) Notifications. No cases of Diphtheria were notified during 1955, nor were any deaths registered as due to this cause.

(b) Diphtheria Anti-Toxin is obtainable by medical practitioners for the treatment of suspected cases and contacts from the Royal West Sussex Hospital and St. Richard's Hospital, Chichester, and from the Isolation Hospital at Worthing.

Diphtheria (Contd.)

(c) Immunisation. During 1955, 46 children of school age and 159 children under 5 years of age received a complete course of injections. In addition, 249 children received "follow-up" injections. As there were 262 children born in the district during the year it is clear that the proportion of children protected in the first year of life falls far below the ideal of 75%.

Enteric Fevers.

(a) Typhoid Fever.

Two cases were notified, children of a family who had moved into the district from the Isle of Wight five days before the first child fell ill. It was clear that the infection must have originated before the family moved. Both children made good recoveries, but the origin of the infection was never traced. No secondary cases occurred either in this district or in the Isle of Wight.

(b) Para Typhoid Fever.

One case was notified - one of a series in various parts of the country in which infection was traced to a town in Northern Italy which had been visited in the course of a conducted tour.

The patient made a complete recovery.

Gastro Enteritis.

Six cases of Gastro Enteritis due to B. Coli Type 0111 occurred in a residential nursery which takes small children mainly from the London area. From the history of the illness there could be little doubt that the child who first fell ill was infected before arriving at the Nursery. The outbreak however, necessitated closing the Nursery to further admissions for two months and the examination of the staff for possible 'carriers'. No 'carriers' were found and no further cases occurred.

(Gastro Enteritis is not officially notifiable so the details are not included in the table on Page 35.

Measles.

One hundred and thirteen cases of Measles were notified, 38 in the first quarter of the year, and 60 in the second. This was the expected biennial outbreak but it was small compared with the 306 cases notified in 1953. (There was only one case in 1954).

Pneumonia.

Nineteen cases of Pneumonia were notified (8 in 1954).

Notifications of this disease bear little relationship to its incidence however. There were 12 deaths from Pneumonia, 11 of them over the age of 75 years, and of these 6 were over 85 years.

Scarlet Fever.

One case of Scarlet Fever was notified (3 cases in 1954).

Tuberculosis.

Fifteen cases were added to the register (5 primary notifications and 10 cases moving into the district as transfers from other areas). Of these, 14 were pulmonary and 1 non-pulmonary. In 1954, cases added to the register were 7 pulmonary and 1 non-pulmonary.

Cases removed from the register in 1955 totalled 5 (1 pulmonary case having recovered and 3 cases on leaving the district). One death from pulmonary tuberculosis was recorded (1 in 1954).

The death rate from this disease for the year is 0.05 per 1,000 of the home population (0.05 in 1954). The death rates from Pulmonary Tuberculosis for the Urban and Rural Districts of West Sussex were 0.11 and 0.09 respectively.
