

When dealing with a small population such as that of this District, a certain random fluctuation from year to year in birth and death rates is to be expected. This is illustrated by the figures for the last ten years shown on Page 8.

Of the total deaths recorded during 1957, 201 or 85% occurred in persons aged 65 years or over; 145 or 61.4% in persons aged 75 years or over, and 56 or 23.7% in persons aged 85 years or over.

From the above statistics it will be seen that deaths exceeded births by 25, and the Registrar-General's estimate of the population of the district at mid-year 1957, showed an increase of 10 over the 1956 estimate.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

Water Supply.

The Midhurst Rural District Council and the Wey Valley Water Company provide mains water to all Parishes in the District, 4,432 properties having a supply within the dwellings with very few exceptions.

Private Estate water is also piped to 974 houses.

Details of the supplies in each of the Parishes as at 31st December, 1957, are given in the table at the end of this Section.

MIDHURST RURAL DISTRICT COUNCIL WATER UNDERTAKINGS.

Rotherfield Bore Supply, Easebourne - to the Parishes of Bepton, Cocking, Easebourne, Heyshott, Midhurst, Stedham, West Lavington and Woolbeding,

The number of houses supplied from this source is 1,279.

Slade Lane Bore Supply, Rogate - to the Parishes of Chithurst, Elsted, Harting, Iping, Linch, Rogate, Stedham, Terwick, Treyford, Trotton and Woolbeding.

This supply is interconnected with the Rotherfield supply at the Half Moon, Midhurst, and the extra pressure thus obtained has helped in improving the supplies to dwellings in the Cocking and West Lavington areas.

A total of 1,111 houses are supplied by this Scheme.

Lodsworth Bore Supply, Lodsworth - to the Parishes of Easebourne East Lavington, Graffham, Lodsworth, Lurgashall, North Ambersham South Ambersham and Tillington.

During the year the main was extended to Upper Norwood to supply farms and cottages in that area.

This source supplies 613 houses.

Spring Supply, Henley - to the Parishes of Easebourne and Fernhurst.

Thirty-two houses are supplied by this Scheme.

WEY VALLEY WATER COMPANY.

Water is supplied to the Parishes of Fernhurst, Harting. Iping, Linchmere, Lurgashall, North Ambersham, Rogate and Trotton.

The total number of houses supplied is 1,361.

Section IV.

HOUSING

At the close of 1957, the Council's list of housing applicants showed 335 outstanding cases as compared with 332 cases in 1956.

New houses completed during the year totalled 94 (54 private, 40 Council).

Housing Act, 1936,

Action under Section 11 of this Act was taken in 26 cases, resulting in 6 Undertakings being accepted and 5 Closing Orders and 15 Demolition Orders being made.

Housing Act, 1957.

This Act came into force during the year. Action was taken under Section 16 of the Act which resulted in 5 Demolition Orders being made.

Five houses were demolished during the year.

Housing Act, 1949 - Improvement Grants.

During the year applications were received for the improvement of 67 dwellings. Of these, 56 were approved, 7 were under consideration and 4 were refused.

The number of houses reconditioned during 1957 with the aid of grant was 70. Since the Act came into force the number of houses completed is 175.

Rent Act, 1957.

This Act came into force during the year. Four applications for Certificates of Disrepair were received and undertakings were given by the landlord in each case to carry out the necessary repairs within six months.

During the year, 99 samples of milk taken from distributors were submitted for examination for cleanliness by the Methylene Blue Test, and of these, 93 were reported upon as satisfactory.

Twenty-nine samples of Pasteurised Milk were taken and submitted to the Phosphatase Test, and all of these were satisfactory.

Thirty samples of milk taken from farms whose milk is retailed in the district were submitted for biological examination and reported free from Tubercle Bacilli,

PREVALENCE AND CONTROL OF DISEASES.

The only incident of note during the year was an outbreak of Food Poisoning the details of which are given later in this section. Otherwise, the incidence of infectious disease was very low. Vaccination against Poliomyelitis was carried out on an increasing scale as more supplies of vaccine became available but it is too soon to attempt to judge the effect of vaccination on the incidence of the disease.

Cancer.

Deaths attributed to Cancer during the year numbered 40 (20 males, 20 females) - 41 deaths in 1956.

The Cancer Death Rate is 2.35 per 1,000 of the estimated home population - 2.41 in 1956. Corresponding rates for the Administrative County and the Urban and Rural Districts are 2.37, 2.53 and 2.14 respectively.

Diphtheria.

(a) Notifications.

No eases of Diphtheria were notified during 1957, nor were any deaths registered as due to this cause.

(b) Immunisation.

During 1957, 16 children of school age and 192 children under 5 years of age received a complete course of injections. In addition, 85 children received "follow-up" injections.

Food Poisoning.

At a nursing home caring for old people a woman patient died early in February of acute enteritis. A Laboratory report received after her death showed the presence of Salmonella Typhimurium and a second patient who fell ill about the same time and recovered was also shown to be similarly infected. Investigations, started when these two cases were notified, revealed that in November 1956 an old lady of 84 was admitted, developed diarrhoea about a week later and died after four days of illness. While she was ill a second patient developed similar symptoms and recovered. No specimens from either case were examined.

A month later (just after Christmas 1956) one of the nursing staff and her small daughter had attacks of diarrhoea which lasted about two days but both recovered. It was some six weeks later that the next two cases occurred; these were notified and the

Food Poisoning (Contd.)

investigation which revealed the foregoing events, began.

Three of the nursing staff (including the one who was ill in December) were found to be symptomless carriers of Salmonella Typhimurium and ten of the patients also showed positive cultures of the same organism. Admissions to the nursing home were suspended when the investigation started and were not resumed until the middle of April when negative specimens had been obtained from all those affected.

The outbreak which had lasted from November to April had caused two deaths (one known to be due to Salmonella Typhimurium and one presumed in retrospect to have been so caused) and had infected a further 10 out of 27 patients and 3 of the staff.

Tetracyclin was administered to the affected members of the staff but in spite of two courses of treatment one of them remained positive for over a month and it seems doubtful whether the drug did in fact expedite the termination of the carrier state.

No new cases or carriers occurred after the staff were alerted to the danger of cross infection and this fact in a small community of susceptible old people is greatly to their credit.

Dysentery

Three cases of Sonne Dysentery were notified.

Pneumonia.

Ten cases of Pneumonia were notified (5 in 1956)

Notifications of this disease bear little relationship to its incidence however. There were also 10 deaths registered as due to Pneumonia, but none referred to the notifications received.

Poliomyelitis.

Two cases, both non-paralytic, were notified during the year. (2 in 1956)

Increasing supplies of vaccine enabled the Scheme for vaccination against Poliomyelitis to be extended. The public are now somewhat confused by the different types of American and British Vaccine which are being offered and by the safety tests to which these various vaccines have been submitted. Experience in America and Canada, where many millions of vaccinations have been carried out without incident, shows that no parent need hesitate to have their children vaccinated with whichever vaccine, British or American, is available.

It is early yet for any conclusive judgment to be published in this Country as to the efficacy of Poliomyelitis Vaccination in preventing the disease in any individual. There are, however, good indications even at this early stage that the number of cases occurring in children vaccinated is much less than occurs in the unvaccinated.

Scarlet Fever.

Three cases of Scarlet Fever were notified. (2 cases in 1956)

Tuberculosis.

Four cases were added to the register (2 primary notifications and 2 cases moving into the district as transfers from other areas). All were pulmonary cases. In 1956, six pulmonary cases were added to the register.

Cases removed from the register in 1957 totalled 8, one pulmonary and one non-pulmonary case having recovered, and 4 cases on leaving the district. Two deaths from this disease were recorded (2 in 1956)

Tuberculosis (Contd.)

The death rate from Pulmonary Tuberculosis for the year is 0.11 per 1,000 of the home population (0.05 in 1956). The death rate for the Administrative County and for the Urban and Rural Districts is 0.08, 0.06 and 0.10 respectively.
