

#### INTRODUCTION.

In 1962, a Member of the Government said that the population of England and Wales would increase by  $5\frac{1}{2}$  millions in twenty years. Recently in 1963, the present Minister of Housing and Local Government stated that this estimate has already proved to be too small; it is now predicted that between 1961 and 1981 there will be an increase of over 7 millions. Moreover, this growth of population is expected to continue at an increasing rate until the year 2,000 at least, with the growth during the last twenty years of the century likely to exceed  $9\frac{1}{2}$  millions. There are 47 million people in England and Wales today; by the turn of the century there will be 64 million, and they will all need somewhere to live.

3½ millions of the increase by 1981 will be in the South East of England and it seems unlikely that an attractive district like Midhurst will escape a proportion of this increase. In 1950 the housing waiting list in this district numbered 534; this figure fell gradually to 290 in 1958, but since then it has risen gradually to 394. There is evidently no slackening in the demand for Council houses.

The Registrar-General's detailed report on the 1961 Census has not yet been published for Sussex so that the age structure of the population at the present time must still be calculated from the 1951 Census and from the trends revealed then. The Council has, however, made a significant contribution towards meeting the needs of old people by the opening during 1962 of Egmont House, a block of flatlets providing "independent housing under supervision" for a small number of old people. This type of accommodation has proved popular wherever it has been built and although with central heating, constant hot water, and other facilities, it is relatively expensive to build and to run, such expenditure must be seen in relation to the cost of hospital beds and welfare homes. Both of the latter will be spared by encouraging and enabling old people to maintain their independence, so that less fit old people will need institutional care.

In time, welfare homes will become more and more concerned with the care of partially disabled old people, while the fit and nearly fit will remain a housing rather than a welfare problem.

### Section I

### STATISTICS AND SOCIAL CONDITIONS.

The District is an agricultural and residential one occupying the North-Western corner of West Sussex. The Counties of Hampshire and Surrey lie to the West and North respectively, Chichester Rural District to the South, and Petworth to the East.

Apart from agriculture, there are other minor industries providing employment, and holiday traffic brings a considerable amount of trade to hotels and cafes.

When dealing with a small population such as that of this District, a certain random fluctuation from year to year in birth and death rates is to be expected. This is illustrated by the figures for the last ten years shown on Page 10.

Of the total deaths recorded during 1962, 249 or 83% occurred in persons aged 65 years or over; 197 or 66% in persons aged 75 years or over, and 82 or 27% in persons aged 85 years or over.

### SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA

### Water Supply

The North West Sussex Water Board supplies the southern half of the district and the Wey Valley Water Company the northern part. These two Water Undertakers provide main water to all parishes in the district, 5,044 properties having a supply within the dwellings with very few exceptions.

Private Estates supply water to 858 houses.

Details of the supplies in each of the Parishes as at 31st December, 1962, are given in the table at the end of this Section.

### NORTH WEST SUSSEX WATER BOARD UNDERTAKERS

Rotherfield Bore Supply, Easebourne - to the Parishes of Bepton, Cocking, Easebourne, Heyshott, Midhurst, Stedham, West Lavington and Woolbeding.

During the year, the Board laid 570 yards of 4" asbestos cement main and 40 yards of 3" asbestos cement main at Oakhurst, Midhurst, for supplying a private housing estate being developed, and 185 yards of 3" cast iron main at Sandrock, Petersfield Road, Midhurst, in connection with Council housing estate development.

The number of houses supplied from this source is 1,456.

Slade Lane Bore Supply, Rogate - to the Parishes of Chithurst, Elsted, Harting, Iping, Linch, Rogate, Stedham, Treyford, Trotton, and Woolbeding.

During the year 465 yards of 4" asbestos cement main was laid in Chithurst Lane, 460 yards of 4" asbestos cement main to Lambourne Cottage, Milland, 235 yards of 3" asbestos cement main and 270 yards of 4" asbestos cement main to South Acre Private Housing Estate, Harting.

1,270 houses are supplied by this scheme.

Lodsworth Bore Supply, Lodsworth - to the Parishes of Easebourne, East Lavington, Graffham, Lodsworth, Lurgashall, North Ambersham, South Ambersham and Tillington.

During the year 150 yards of 3" asbestos cement main was laid at Little River, Tillington.

This source supplies 696 houses.

All the above three sources of supply are inter-connected.

### Water Supply (contd.)

The laying of other new water mains by the North West Sussex Water Board in the Parishes of Cocking, Heyshott and Bepton was not completed during the year but the work was finished during 1963, and the Cowdray Estate Private Supply to the above mentioned Parishes is no longer connected.

### WEY VALLEY WATER COMPANY.

Water is supplied to the Parishes of Fernhurst, Harting, Iping, Linchmere, North Ambersham, Rogate and Trotton.

During the year 1,614 yards of 4" asbestos cement and spun iron main was laid in the Harting Combe area of Rogate, and 868 yards of 3" spun iron main at Linchmere March.

The total number of houses supplied is 1,580.

This work is carried out by the Council's own vehicle and where required four free emptyings a year are given. During the year 922 cesspools were emptied giving a total of 1,229 loads.

### Section IV

#### HOUSING

At the close of 1962, the Council's list of housing applicants showed 394 outstanding cases as compared with 391 in 1961.

106 new houses were completed during the year. (82 private and 24 Council houses).

In addition Egmont House at Easebourne was completed. This provides 24 flatlets for old people and a warden's flat. This type of accommodation providing independent housing for old people with a resident warden has proved very successful in many other districts and its immediate success at Easebourne will probably lead to similar provision in other parts of the rural district.

### Housing Act, 1957.

Action was taken under Section 16 of this Act which resulted in six Undertakings being accepted, and four Closing Orders and three Demolition Orders being made.

Eight houses were demolished during the year.

# Improvement Grants. Housing (Financial Provisions) Act, 1958 - Discretionary Grants.

Under the "Discretionary" Grant Scheme grant can be obtained up to one-half of the cost of carrying out the improvements subject to a maximum of £400, the dwelling on completion of the works being brought up to a definite standard laid down. As its name implies, the giving of grant under this scheme is entirely at the discretion of the Council, but in the case of a refusal the Council must give its reasons.

During the year applications were received for the improvement of 41 dwellings. Of these, 38 were approved, and 3 were under consideration.

The number of houses reconditioned during 1962 with the aid of this grant was 52. Since the Act came into force the number of houses completed is 438.

### House Purchase and Housing Act, 1959 - Standard Grants.

Under the "Standard" Grant Scheme it is compulsory for the Council to give grants not exceeding one-half of the cost and up to a maximum of £155 for the provision of bath, water closet, wash-hand basin, hot and cold water system and larder, the maximum to be reduced by £25 if there is a bath in existence, by £40 if there is a water closet, by £5 if there is a wash-hand basin, by

### Standard Grants (contd.)

£75 if there is a hot and cold water system, and by £10 if there is a larder, subject to the dwelling in question being fit after the above amenities have been provided.

During the year applications were received in respect of 23 dwellings, and improvements have been carried out with the aid of this grant at 14 dwellings. Since the Act came into force the total number of houses completed is 35.

### Rent Act, 1957.

No applications were received during the year for Certificates of Disrepair.
