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

INTRODUCTION

There were 23,120 deaths due to accidents in England and Wales during 1962. Slightly less than one-third of these deaths were caused by road accidents and slightly more than a third by accidents in the home. The figures for 1963 have not yet been published, but there is no reason to expect that they will show any improvement on the 1962 figures, or that they will be markedly different one way or the other.

Accidents do not happen, they are <u>caused</u>, and for every fatal one hundreds more or less serious but not fatal occur in and around the house. These accidents show on no statistics and their total can only be guessed, but as every parent knows, or should know, most of them could have been prevented.

Burns to children are perhaps the most preventable injuries. All fires, whether open, gas or electric, must be guarded when there are children in the house. This is not only a commonsense precaution, it is a legal requirement on parents. Night dresses are more vulnerable to fire than pyjamas, and the latter should always be preferred for children. Scalds in the kitchen can be prevented by keeping pan handles from projecting over the edge of the cooker where inquisitive fingers can reach them. Matches must be kept away from children.

This catalogue of "do's and dont's" can be continued to cover poisoning (from medicines and household cleaning or disinfectant fluids), gas poisoning, electrocution and injuries due to falls, especially in children and old people.

The death roll on the roads is appalling and rightly the subject of nation wide propaganda and measures towards prevention, but the death roll in the home is worse and seems to cause little public concern. Almost everyone can help to prevent home accidents by a little forethought and common sense.

The detailed figures for Sussex for the 1961 Census became available early in 1964; they show how the size of the population is increasing and how its make-up in age groups is changing.

Analysis of the figures reveals clearly that in West Sussex there is a much higher proportion of "over 65°s" than there is in England and Wales as a whole.

This simple undeniable fact cannot be repeated too often to all the Authorities concerned - Welfare, Housing and Hospitals.

Comparison with other parts of the Country shows that the proportion of old people in the Midhurst district whilst it is higher than it is in the neighbouring Chichester district, is not increasing so rapidly. (The percentage in Chichester district increased from 12.6% to 15.1% between 1951 and 1961)

The emigration of retired people into Sussex is more concentrated near the sea coast than it is in this area, nevertheless any provision for accommodation for old people (be it hospital, welfare, or special housing provision) must be made on a scale well above the national scale, and in those parts of the County worst affected it must allow for an expanding expansion of the need for it.

STATISTICS AND SOCIAL CONDITIONS.

The District is an agricultural and residential one occupying the North-Western corner of West Sussex. The Counties of Hampshire and Surrey lie to the West and North respectively, Chichester Rural District to the South, and Petworth to the East.

Apart from agriculture, there are other minor industries providing employment, and holiday traffic brings a considerable amount of trade to hotels and cafes.

When dealing with a small population such as that of this District, a certain random fluctuation from year to year in birth and death rates is to be expected. This is illustrated by the figures for the last ten years shown on Page 11.

Of the total deaths recorded during 1963, 293 or 83% occurred in persons aged 65 years or over; and 235 or 66% in persons aged 75 years or over.

Nursing Homes.

Four Nursing Homes in the District are registered by the West Sussex County Council under Section 187 of the Public Health Act, 1936, providing a total accommodation for 142 patients, mostly for aged chronic cases.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA

Water Supply.

The North West Sussex Water Board supplies the southern half of the District and the Wey Valley Water Company the northern part. These two Water Undertakers provide main water to all parishes in the district, 5,380 properties having a supply within the dwellings with very few exceptions.

Private Estates supply water to 604 houses.

Details of the supplies in each of the Parishes as at 31st December, 1963, are given in the table at the end of this Section.

NORTH WEST SUSSEX WATER BOARD UNDERTAKERS

Rotherfield Bore Supply, Easebourne - to the Parishes of Bepton, Easebourne, Midhurst, Stedham, West Lavington and Woolbeding.

The number of houses supplied from this source is 1,477.

Slade Lane Bore Supply, Rogate - to the Parishes of Chithurst, Elsted, Harting, Iping, Linch, Rogate, Stedham, Treyford, Trotton and Woolbeding.

During the year 280 yards of 4" asbestos cement main was laid at Rogate in connection with the Council's new housing site, 24 yards of 3" asbestos cement main at Mill Lane, South Harting, 120 yards of 4" asbestos cement main at Milland Cross Roads, 25 yards of 4" asbestos cement main to Burrow Farm, Milland, and 6" main at Cumberspark, Trotton.

1,304 houses are supplied by this scheme.

Lodsworth Bore Supply, Lodsworth - to the Parishes of Bepton, Cocking Easebourne, East Lavington, Graffham, Heyshott, Lodsworth, Lurgashall, North Ambersham, South Ambersham and Tillington.

During the year, the Board laid 135 yards of 4" asbestos cement main in Crypt Lane, 85 yards of 4" asbestos cement main in Church Walk, Cocking, and lengths of 4" main at the White House, Tillington.

This source supplies 953 houses.

All the above three sources of supply are inter-connected.

WEY VALLEY WATER COMPANY.

Water is supplied to the Parishes of Fernhurst, Harting, Iping, Linchmere, North Ambersham, Rogate and Trotton.

No new mains have been laid by the Company during the year apart from renewals and alterations necessitated by the County Council's road improvement schemes.

The total number of houses supplied is 1,604.

PRIVATE ESTATE WATER SUPPLIES.

As can be seen from the table at the end of this Section, there has been a big reduction in the number of houses supplied by private estates. This is due to the fact that the Cowdray Estate supplies to Bepton, Cocking, and Heyshott were discontinued and the houses connected to the North West Sussex Water Board's new mains.

In addition to the drainage schemes carried out in the Parishes mentioned in the table above, the main drainage scheme for Stedham and Iping Village was practically completed and at the time of writing this report some of the houses on the lines of the sewers were being connected thereto.

All refuse was deposited on the tip at Holmbush until the new refuse tip opened in August at Pendean in the Parish of West Lavington.

Cesspool Emptying Service

This work is carried out by the Council's own vehicle and where required four free emptyings a year are given. The number of emptyings during the year was 1,270.

Shops Act, 1950.

70 visits were made to shops and offices during the year. One sanitary convenience was repaired, washing facilities were provided in four cases, and sanitary conveniences provided in three cases.

Swimming Baths and Pools.

There are no public swimming baths or pools in the area.

Caravan Sites and Control of Development Act, 1960.

Licences were granted under this Act in respect of six sites. The sites were generally for individual caravans with the exception of one where the maximum number of caravans stationable was 150, during the summer months.

HOUSING

At the close of 1963, the Council's list of housing applicants showed 443 outstanding cases as compared with 394 in 1962.

99 new houses were completed during the year (67 private and 32 Council houses).

Housing Act, 1957.

Action was taken under Section 16 of this Act which resulted in four Undertakings being accepted, and three Closing Orders and five Demolition Orders being made.

Improvement Grants. Housing (Financial Provisions) Act, 1958 - Discretionary Grants.

Under the "Discretionary" Grant Scheme grant can be obtained up to one-half of the cost of carrying out the improvements subject to a maximum of £400, the dwelling on completion of the works being brought up to a definite standard laid down. As its name implies, the giving of grant under this scheme is entirely at the discretion of the Council, but in the case of a refusal the Council must give its reasons.

During the year applications were received for the improvement of 34 dwellings. Of these, 32 were approved, and 2 were under consideration.

The number of houses reconditioned during 1963 with the aid of this grant was 44. Since the Act came into force the number of houses completed is 482.

House Purchase and Housing Act, 1959 - Standard Grants.

Under the "Standard" Grant Scheme it is compulsory for the Council to give grants not exceeding one-half of the cost and up to a maximum of £155 for the provision of bath, water closet, wash-hand basin, hot and cold water system and larder, the maximum to be reduced by £25 if there is a bath in existence, by £40 if there is a water closet, by £5 if there is a wash-hand basin, by £75 if there is a hot and cold water system, and by £10 if there is a larder, subject to the dwelling in question being fit after the above amenities have been provided.

House Purchase and Housing Act, 1959 - Standard Grants (Contd.)

During the year applications were received in respect of 32 dwellings, and improvements have been carried out with the aid of this grant at 25 dwellings. Since the Act came into force the total number of houses completed is 60.

Rent Act, 1957.

During the year one Certificate of Disrepair was issued under the provisions of this Act.
