INTRODUCTION

Although this Report deals with the Year 1967, and the retirement of Mr. T.G. Henry did not occur until April 1968, nevertheless I feel this is the appropriate time to record something of his work for the Council over 30 years.

When he came here in 1938, there was a collision between his forthright personality and the forces of reaction which he found entrenched. He successfully met the challenge of that encounter, and from then on never compromised between what he considered a right line of action and any alternative or more expedient one.

It is interesting to read Dr. Newman's Annual Reports for 1936 and 1937, when just before Mr. Henry's arrival on the scene the Senior Sanitary Inspector also combined the posts of Waterworks and Sewage Works Manager, Manager of the Scavenging and Cleansing Department and Housing Manager. In those days the record of action taken over unfit houses makes depressing reading - a series of 'nil' returns. The demolition orders which Mr. Henry presented to the Council after his arrival were the first ever issued by the Midhurst Council and were by way of a minor revolution carried through in the face of remarkably stiff opposition.

From that auspicious start Mr. Henry's work for this Council was characterised through nearly thirty years by sheer hard work, an encyclopaedic knowledge of every part of the district and of its inhabitants, an ability to deal with people of any description or class, and a devastating native ability to call a spade a spade.

On the occasion of his retirement in April 1968, many tributes were paid to him by both Members of the Council and by his colleagues on the Staff. All were well deserved, and I would like to add my personal appreciation of a conscientious and hard working colleague, and to wish him many years of happy retirement.

Section I.

When dealing with a small population such as that of this District, a certain random fluctuation from year to year in birth and death rates is to be expected. This is illustrated by the figures for the last ten years shown on Page 10.

Of the total deaths recorded during 1967, 232 or 78% occurred in persons aged 65 years or over; and 163 or 55% in persons aged 75 years or over.

The chief causes of death in order of frequency were :

These four causes accounted for 246 or 82% of the total deaths.

During the year, deaths exceeded births by 58, and the Registrar-General's estimate of population at mid 1967 showed an increase of 420 over the 1966 estimate.

Ambulances:

The Local Health Authorities (the West Sussex County Council and the Surrey County Council) provide an ambulance service, including the hospital car service, and ambulances operate from Midhurst and Haslemere.

Home Nursing and Midwifery:

General District Nurses, Midwives, Health Visitors and School Nurses, are employed by the West Sussex County Council to serve in the Rural District.

Treatment Centres and Clinics:

- Infant Welfare Centres - held at Camelsdale, Midhurst and Petworth.
- Infant Weighing Centres - held at Cocking, Fernhurst, Graffham, Harting, Milland, Northchapel and Rogate.
- Orthopaedic Clinic - held at Chichester
- Eye Clinic - held at Chichester
- Speech Therapy Clinic - held at Chichester, Midhurst and in Schools.
- Chest Clinic - held at Aldingbourne Chest Hospital.
- Venereal Diseases Clinics - held at St. Mary's Hospital, Portsmouth; The Royal Surrey County Hospital, Guildford; and Royal West Sussex Hospital, St. Richards, Chichester.
- Dental Clinic - Mobile Dental Unit operates in the area.
- Audiology Clinic - held at Chichester.

Nursing Homes:

Five Nursing Homes in the District are registered by the West Sussex County Council under Section 187 of the Public Health Act, 1936, providing a total accommodation for 159 patients, mostly for aged chronic cases.

Section III

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA

Water Supply

The North West Sussex Water Board supplies the southern half of the district and the Wey Valley Water Company the northern part. These two Water Undertakers provide main water to all parishes in the district, 5,931 properties having a supply within the dwellings, with very few exceptions.

Private Estates supply water to 609 houses.

Details of the supplies in each of the Parishes as at 31st December, 1967, are given in the table at the end of this section.

NORTH WEST SUSSEX WATER BOARD UNDERTAKERS.

Rotherfield Bore Supply, Easebourne - to the parishes of Bepton, Easebourne, Midhurst, Stedham, West Lavington and Woolbeding.

During the year 505 yards of 4" asbestos cement main was laid at Heathfield Lodge Housing Site, Midhurst; 176 yards of 3" asbestos cement main at St. Anne's Hill, Midhurst, and 437 yards of 4" asbestos cement main at Guillards Oak, Midhurst.

The number of houses supplied from this source is 1,635.

Slade Lane Bore Supply, Rogate - to the parishes of Chithurst, Elsted, Harting, Iping, Linch, Rogate, Stedham, Treyford, Trotton and Woolbeding.

During the year 907 yards of 6" main was laid from Stedham Cross Roads to Trotton; 230 yards of 4" asbestos cement main at Stedham Housing Site, and 129 yards of 3" asbestos cement main at Terwick Rise, Rogate.

1,480 houses are supplied by this scheme.

Lodsworth Bore Supply, Lodsworth - to the parishes of Bepton, Cocking, Easebourne, East Lavington, Graffham, Heyshott, Lodsworth, Lurgashall, North Ambersham, South Ambersham and Tillington.

During the year 432 yards of 4" asbestos cement main was laid at Heyshott Housing Site.

This source supplies 1,027 houses.

All the above three sources of supply are inter-connected.

WEY VALLEY WATER COMPANY.

Water is supplied to the parishes of Fernhurst, Harting, Iping, Linchmere, North Ambersham, Rogate and Trotton. No new mains have been laid by the Company during the year.

The total number of houses supplied is 1,755.

There are still 609 houses supplied by Private Estates and most of these supplies are chlorinated.

New Drainage Scheme for Milland.

Due to building in this area and nuisances from cesspool and septic tank drainage, the Council's Engineers have been instructed to prepare a main drainage scheme and disposal plant for this area.

Houses Drained to the Council's Sewers (continued)

New Drainage Disposal Plant for the parishes of Midhurst, Easebourne and West Lavington with provision for taking the drainage of Bepton, Lodsworth, and possibly the parishes of Graffham and Heyshott.

Due to the overloading of the existing Midhurst drainage disposal plant and pumping mains, the Council's Consulting Engineers have prepared plans for the siting of a new drainage disposal plant at South Ambersham to take the drainage from the above sources. These plans have been approved by the Council and Planning Authority and are now before the Ministry of Housing and Local Government.

This new plant is urgently required as serious nuisances from cesspool and septic tank drainage will continue to occur in the Church Lane and Selham Road areas of West Lavington until it is completed.

In addition to the parishes mentioned above, main drainage schemes are required for Elsted and the Hill Brow and Rake areas of Rogate.

Public Cleansing

Refuse Collection

The refuse collection service provided by the Council is as follows:

ONCE WEEKLY: Midhurst; Easebourne (Lutener Road, Easebourne Street - Post Office to School only, and Dodsley); West Lavington (Chichester Road - South Pond to Station only).

FORTNIGHTLY: Bepton; Chithurst; Cocking; Easebourne (except Lutener Road, Easebourne Street - Post Office to School, and Dodsley); East Lavington; Elsted; Fernhurst; Graffham; Harting; Heyshott; Iping; Linch; Linchmere; Lodsworth; Lurgashall; North Ambersham; Rogate; South Ambersham; Stedham; Tillington; Treyford; Trotton; West Lavington - (except Chichester Road - South Pond to Station); and Woolbeding.

All refuse is deposited on the tip at Pendean in the parish of West Lavington.

Cesspool Emptying Service

This work is carried out by the Council's own vehicle and where required four free emptyings a year are given. The number of emptyings during the year was 1,358.

Swimming Baths and Pools

There are no public swimming baths or pools in the area.

Caravan Sites and Control of Development Act, 1960

Licences were granted under this Act in respect of eight sites. The sites were for individual caravans with the exception of one where the maximum number of caravans stationable was 150 during the summer months.

Section IV

HOUSING

At the close of 1967 the Council's list of housing applicants showed 435 outstanding cases as compared with 426 for 1966.

153 new houses were completed during the year (114 private and 39 Council houses).

Housing Act, 1957.

Action was taken under Section 16 of this Act which resulted in five Undertakings being accepted, and two Closing Orders and four Demolition Orders being made.

Improvement Grants.

Housing (Financial Provisions) Act, 1958 - Discretionary Grants.

House Purchase and Housing Act, 1949 - Standard Grants.

Housing Act, 1964.

The amount of grant payable under the standard grant scheme remains at one half of the cost subject to a maximum of £155. in respect of the provision of water closet, bath, wash-hand basin, hot and cold water system to bath, basin and sink, and food store. This limit, however, can be increased to £350. under certain circumstances, namely, where septic tank drainage has to be installed, and where a bathroom cannot be provided otherwise than by adding to the existing structure or converting an outbuilding for this purpose. Also, where piped water is laid on into a dwelling for the first time. Under this scheme the dwelling in question must be reasonably fit after the above-mentioned amenities have been provided.

The discretionary grant scheme also continues to remain in force and in this case the dwellings have to be brought up to a definite standard. The maximum grant obtainable is £400. or half the cost, whichever is less. The giving of grant under this scheme is entirely at the discretion of the Council but in the case of refusal the Council must give its reasons. The standard grant is, of course, compulsory. The conditions governing all grants apply for three years.

During the year, applications for discretionary grants were received for the improvement of 19 dwellings, all of which were approved. The number of houses reconditioned during 1967 with the aid of this grant was 13, and since the Act came into force the number of houses completed is 592.

Improvement Grants (continued)

Applications for standard grant were received during the year in respect of 22 dwellings, and improvements have been carried out with the aid of this grant to 29 dwellings. Since the Act came into force the total number of houses completed is 163.

Rent Act, 1957.

No Certificates of Disrepair were issued during the year under the provisions of this Act.

Seventy-three samples of milk taken from distributors during the year were submitted for examination for cleanliness by the Methlene Blue Test, and of these seventy-one were reported as satisfactory.

Fifty-three samples of Pasteurised Milk were taken and submitted to the Phosphatase test, all of which were satisfactory.

Five samples of milk taken from farms whose milk is retailed in the district were submitted for biological examination and reported upon as free from Tubercle Bacilli. Five samples of milk were also tested for Brucella Abortus, all of which were negative.

Meat and Other Foods

Most of the meat consumed in the district is slaughtered elsewhere, supplies being delivered mainly from Chichester, Petersfield, Haslemere and London.

Bakehouses

As a trend of the times, in 1938 there were some 20 bakehouses in the district, now for the first time there are none. This can be attributed to the intense competition that takes place; the small man has little chance against the big companies. Whilst these larger firms produce their foodstuffs in more or less perfectly hygienic conditions, we still get trouble from the 'human element' and in this district during the past few years, rope and metallic objects have been discovered in bread sold for human consumption.

In many ways it is a great pity that the old-fashioned baker with the personal touch has gone out of business. Similar remarks can also be applied to a point in connection with retail milk. In 1938 there were some 50 retail milk distributors in the district, whereas now there are only 12.

Vaccination against Poliomyelitis is available to everyone up to 40 years of age. Application forms are available at the Council Offices; at the County Health Department, Metropolitan House, Northgate, Chichester, and from Health Centres and Welfare Clinics.

Tuberculosis

Eight cases were added to the Register - 5 primary notifications; 1 patient restored to the Register and 2 patients who moved into the district as transfers from other areas. No cases were removed from the Register.

No deaths were registered as due to Tuberculosis during the year (nil in 1966). The death rate for the Administrative County is 0.03 per 1,000 population.
