INTRODUCTION

Writing of the Year 1971 in the middle of 1972, it is difficult to escape from thoughts of reorganisation. This Council has only twenty months of existence left, and from the first of April, 1974, it will be replaced by a larger district council combining Midhurst, Petworth, Chichester City and 30 Parishes of the Chichester Rural District.

So far it is by no means clear how Public Health affairs are to be organised in the new districts. There is to be a concurrent reorganisation of the National Health Service, the main objective of which is to bring the three, at present, separately organised parts of Medical Care - that is Hospitals, General Practice and Public Health - together within one organisation.

There will be no Medical Officer of Health in the future, but there will be a Community Physician responsible for some of the previous Medical Officer's duties. He will not be employed by the local authority but some arrangement will probably be made so that his advice is available to the Council concerned.

The exact division of duties and responsibilities between the new District Councils and the new County Councils is still being decided in the Local Government Bill, but as far as Public Health is concerned no dramatic transfer of responsibility seems likely and a Public Health Department under the Chief Public Health Inspector will clearly be needed.

It is important to remember that modern Local Government owes its very existence to the "Sanitary Idea" and "The Inspector of Nuisances" originally employed by the Poor Law Union had the District Council formed round him. Such Councils were in fact known as local Sanitary Authorities and employed Surveyors to carry out necessary sanitary works.

The sweeping reorganisation at all levels is being carried through to a tight schedule. Once the boundaries of the new districts have been confirmed, the next step will be the election of the new Councillors in June, 1973. This will leave just nine months during which staff will be appointed, decisions made as to siting of offices, departments organised, and the necessary legal and financial arrangements made for the transfer of functions from the old constituent authorities to the new District Council.

Introduction (contd.)

Evidently there is a busy year ahead for all concerned, and it is to be hoped that the new organisations will be able to give a better service to the public. This is, after all, the main object of the exercise.

During 1971, the year under review, there were no remarkable incidents. Infectious disease has over the years been driven out of its place as the chief preoccupation of the Medical Officer of Health. There remain, however, a few conditions which have still to be effectively controlled. Food poisoning occurs far too often in spite of the fact that both its causation and prevention are well understood. It is not oversimplifying the case to say that every incident of food poisoning is caused by a mistake on somebody's part. Occasionally, the caterer is guilty of errors of technique in preparation, cooking and serving of food, and similar errors are not unknown in the domestic kitchen.

Meat products (now, very often, poultry) are incriminated as the vehicles of infection in the great majority of outbreaks usually because the people concerned have not followed the simple rules for hygienic handling and cooking of meat.

Butchers' meat is seldom found to cause food poisoning because it is usually sterilised at the first cooking. "Left-overs" however must be handled with care because the "heating-up" process seldom provides the necessary time/temperature combination for re-sterilisation. Indeed the warming-up of once-used meat often provides ideal conditions for incubation and proliferation of food poisoning organisms.

Meat, once cooked, should be refrigerated as soon as practicable and never left overnight in the warm atmosphere of the kitchen. The second cooking should be adequate otherwise the risk of trouble is always present.

Poultry is in danger of undercooking in the first instance, particularly where large birds such as turkeys are concerned. This danger is increased by stuffing large carcases before cooking thus effectively insulating parts of the bird from the oven's heat.

STATISTICS AND SOCIAL CONDITIONS

The District is an agricultural and residential one occupying the North-Western corner of West Sussex. The Counties of Hampshire and Surrey lie to the West and North respectively, Chichester Rural District to the South, and Petworth to the East.

Apart from agriculture, there are other minor industries providing employment, and holiday traffic brings a considerable amount of trade to hotels and cafes.

When dealing with a small population such as that of this District, a certain random fluctuation from year to year in Birth and Death Rates is to be expected. This is illustrated by the figures for the last ten years on Page 11.

Of the total deaths recorded during 1971, 243 or 85% occurred in persons aged 65 years or over, and of these, 188 or 65% occurred in persons aged 75 years or over. The chief causes of death in order of frequency were:

These four causes accounted for 248 or 86% of the total deaths. The tables on pages 9 and 10 show the age, sex distribution and causes of death in 1971.

During the year deaths exceeded births by 100, and the Registrar-General's estimate of population at mid 1971 (19,430) showed a decrease of 480 over the 1970 estimate (19,910). The 1971 Census population has since been recorded as 19.074.

(c) Lodsworth Bore Supply, Lodsworth - the Parishes of Bepton, Cocking, Easebourne, East Lavington, Graffham, Heyshott, Lodsworth, Lurgashall, North Ambersham, South Ambersham and Tillington.

During the year 2,260 yards of 4" PVC main extension was laid from Selham Priory to South Ambersham; and 119 yards of 3" PVC main extension at Manor Farm, Lodsworth.

1,084 houses are supplied from this source.

The above three sources of supply are inter-connected.

242 houses are supplied from this source.

Further remedial works were carried out by the North West Sussex Water Board during the year to eliminate the cause of the unsatisfactory results which were all obtained from the Henley Village area.

A programme of sampling individual private supplies was commenced towards the end of 1971, and it is intended that all private supplies will be sampled in due course.

DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE

The Council's new sewage works at South Ambersham was completed during the year and formally opened by Lord Cowdray on the 6th December. The most ambitious project ever undertaken by the Midhurst Rural District Council, the works cost £320,695 and now serve Midhurst, Easebourne, Cocking Causeway and North Bepton.

The sewering of West Lavington commenced during the year and the new works will serve this area also. It is expected that ultimately Cocking, Heyshott, Graffham, East Lavington and Lodsworth will also be drained to the new works which have been designed to allow for extension.

The relief sewer to eliminate problems of surcharging and flooding in the North Mill area of Easebourne was completed in September.

The Public Health (Fees for Notifications of Infectious Disease) Order, 1968.

This Order, in operation on the 1st October, 1968, requires the local authority to pay the medical practitioner a fee of five shillings for each certificate of notification, except a certificate sent by a medical practitioner serving in the Forces.

Cancer

Deaths attributed to Cancer in 1971 numbered 41 (18 males, 23 females) (56 deaths during the previous year).

The Cancer Death Rate is 2.1 per 1,000 of the estimated home population (2.8 in 1970). The corresponding Rate for the Administrative County is 3.0 per 1,000 population.

Diphtheria

- (a) Notifications. No cases of Diphtheria were notified in 1971, nor were any deaths registered as due to this cause. No confirmed cases have occurred in the District since 1945.
- (b) Immunisation. Immunisation against Diphtheria is carried out either at the Maternity and Child Welfare Clinics or by the General Practitioners, and set out below are details of injections of all types recorded by the County Health Department during 1971:

Poliomyelitis

No cases were notified during 1971. No confirmed cases have occurred in the District since 1957.

Vaccination against poliomyelitis can be arranged through the County Health Department, Metropolitan House, Northgate, Chichester (Telephone - Chichester 85100), and at Health Centres and Welfare Clinics.

Infective Jaundice

This disease has been notifiable since June, 1968. One case only was notified during the year.

Smallpox

In July 1971, the Secretary of State accepted the advice of the Joint Committee on Vaccination and Immunisation that smallpox vaccination need no longer be given to children as a routine, because the risk of serious complications from vaccination now outweighed the risk of the British public being exposed to smallpox. Smallpox vaccination was therefore immediately deleted from the County Council's current immunisation schedule, and as a result, no statistics for smallpox vaccination and re-vaccinations are included for 1971.

Tuberculosis

No cases were notified during the year, nor were any deaths registered as due to this cause. The death rate from Tuberculosis for the Administrative County is 0.02 per 1000 of the estimated population.
