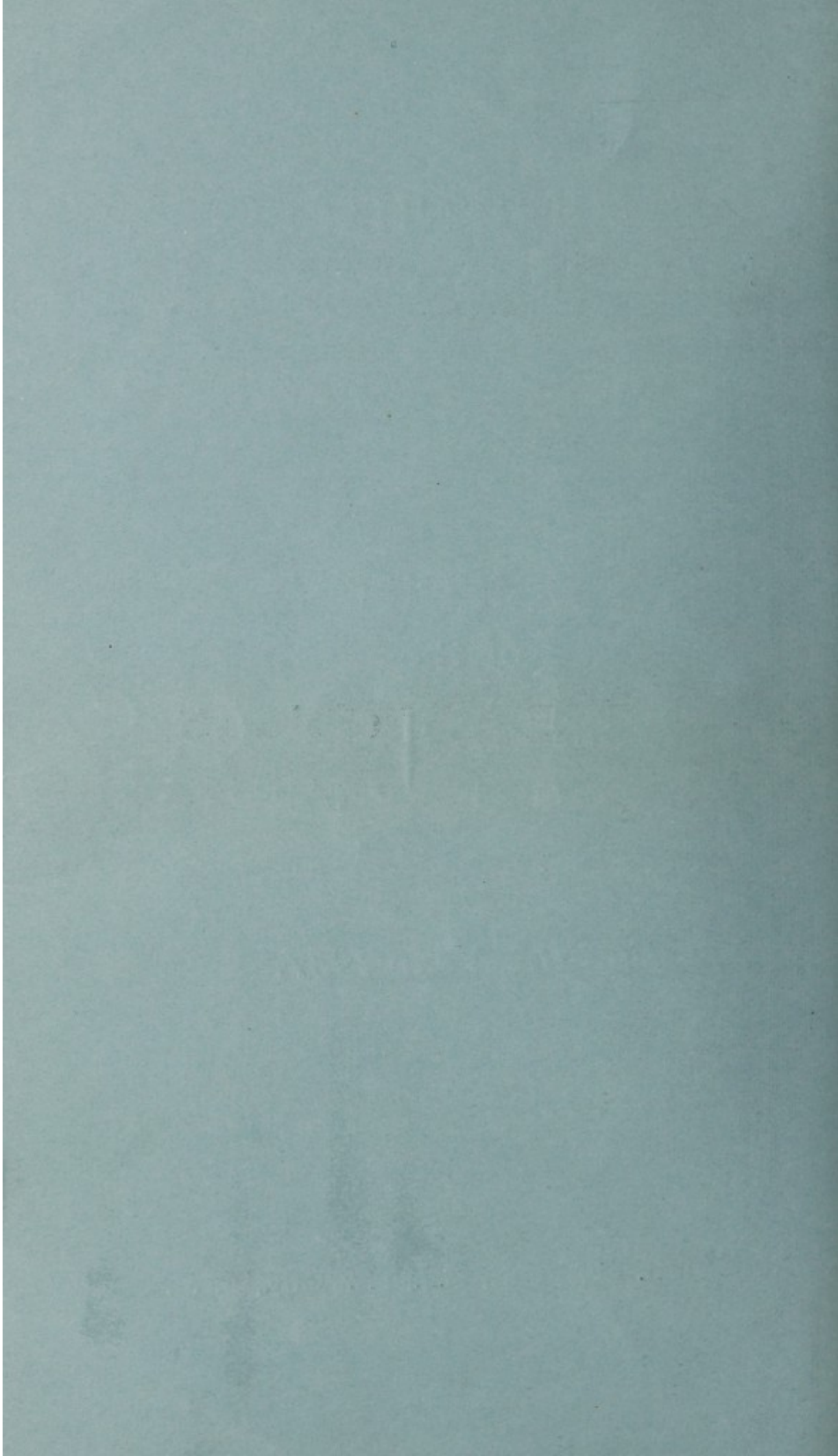

Mildenhall, an entirely rural district, is situated in the north-west of the County of West Suffolk. The north-eastern portion of the area is in the ownership of the Forestry Commission who are engaged in the afforestation of the heath land which predominates in this part. The western portion of the area is mainly fen land, intensely cultivated, the principle products being Sugar Beet, Potatoes, Fruit and Flowers. The southern portion is agricultural and contains several racing stud farms. The Royal Air Force Aerodrome at Beck Row is within the area of the Rural District.

The Death Rates above are estimated on the Registrar General's figures which are almost identical with those prepared locally. An additional Male Death appears in the local figures as shown in the tables following. This would cause a very slight change in the Death Rates.

It will be noted that our population increased by 80 during the year; that the number of births in 1937 exceeded by 44 the 1936 figure, and the total deaths were 9 less than in 1936, although 12 more males died than in that year.



The Birth Rate in our district is 18.4, the Rate for England and Wales is 14.69.

The Death Rate of England and Wales is 12.4, so our Crude Death Rate of 13.3 is above that of the whole country. The Corrected Death Rate of 10.9 gives a more reliable impression of the state of the District. Both these rates are an improvement on those of 1936, then 14.2 and 11.7 respectively, and would have been better if our Infantile Mortality Rate had kept to the usual level. There were 14 Deaths of Children under one year of age, (6 male and 8 female) as opposed to 8 in 1936. The Infant Mortality Rate is therefore 61.4 which is considerably in excess of that recorded last year 43.5 and compares unfavourably with that for England and Wales, 58. It should be noted that two of the male children were quadruplets, and two of the female children twins. The mortality in children from multiple births is of course high, and four such children have materially affected our rate. Six children died in the first day of life, a further four in the first week, two more by the end of one month, one at two months, and the other at six months. Marked improvement in the Infantile Mortality Rate can only occur if the children who die in the first few days of life, indeed in the first few hours, can be saved. This is equivalent to saying that only by Ante-natal care and an effective Midwifery Service can such improvement be obtained. The recent additions to the County Maternity Services show that this fact is appreciated and that every effort is being made in the County to cause such a reduction.

There were 21 Deaths from Cancer, twelve male (of which nine were cancer of the digestive tract, two of skin, and one prostate) and nine females (six cancer-of reproductive organs, two digestive tract and one skin.)

SECTION B.GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA.LABORATORY FACILITIES.

As in the previous year use has been made of the East Suffolk County Laboratory, Ipswich, for bacteriological examinations. The bacteriologist is H.M. Cade, Esq., M.R.C.S., L.R.C.P., D.P.H.

AMBULANCE FACILITIES.

An Ambulance at Newmarket, and two at Bury St. Edmund's all owned by the Red Cross Society, are available to persons in our area.

The Newmarket Rural District, to whose hospital our infectious cases are admitted, provide an ambulance which is stationed at their Infectious Diseases Hospital.

NURSING IN THE HOME.

This work is carried out by Voluntary Nursing Associations. Their Nurses also undertake Midwifery, Health Visiting and Public Assistance Work. Every parish in the Mildenhall District has nursing facilities available for its inhabitants, the nurses reside in the parishes of Brandon, Elveden, Icklingham, Lakenheath, Mildenhall and Moulton.

CLINICS AND HOSPITALS.

The West Suffolk County Council hold monthly Clinics at Brandon, Infant Welfare and School Children, and Lakenheath, Infant Welfare. A similar Infant Welfare Clinic will be commenced at Mildenhall in the early part of 1938.

The only other Clinic in our area is that maintained by the Alice Dix Charity who provide a dispensary in the Parish of Icklingham.



The West Suffolk General Hospital at Bury St. Edmund's serves our population.

As in previous years our Infectious Disease Cases have been treated at the Newmarket Rural District Council's Isolation Hospital.

Considerable progress has been made by the County Council in the preliminary work necessary before commencing to build their Isolation Hospital, which will serve the whole of West Suffolk with the exception of the Newmarket Urban District.

### SECTION C.

#### SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

##### 1. WATER.

A Public Inquiry into application by the Rural District Council for sanction to loan for the purposes of a piped supply was held during the year by The Ministry of Health.

Sanction has been given and steps are therefore being taken to provide a piped supply of water to ten parishes.

The Council are very mindful of their responsibility to safeguard public water supplies and to ensure that all water supplied by them is pure and wholesome. To this end it is their policy to have all Public supplies bacteriologically and chemically examined frequently. A further protection is available in that the Medical Officer is instructed to take additional samples when he has reason to believe that such additional sampling is urgently required.

##### 2. DRAINAGE AND SEWAGE.

During the year 14 houses have been provided with cesspool drainage as the result of informal action.

An open sewer in the parish of Lakenheath, which has been a constant nuisance, is now disused owing to the operation



of a Clearance Order. Sewerage schemes would be a great convenience and a Public Health benefit in our larger villages, but until such time as Exchequer Aid is available the prospect of introducing such schemes is most remote.

Parishes have already been surveyed in order that sewerage schemes might be adopted as and when Exchequer Aid becomes available for such undertakings.

### 3. RIVERS AND STREAMS.

The Ouse and Cam Fishing Board, (Clerk - G.H. Lewis, Esq., 7, Downing Street, Cambridge) with their Water Bailiffs, and members of the Lark Angling Preservation Society Board, (Hon. General Secretary - R.W. Neve, Esq., Mables Hall, Mildenhall,) constantly survey the River Lark.

During the past year the Board have inspected the Bury St. Edmund's Beet Sugar Factory and met representatives of the Sugar Beet Corporation regarding the treatment and disposal of effluent. They took samples of the river and watched carefully the effects of the Sugar Beet Effluent and of the outfall from Bury St. Edmund's Sewage Disposal Works at Stow.

The Lark Angling Society in conjunction with the Ouse and Cam Fishing Board restocked the River Lark with Trout and Coarse Fish. The present state of the river is satisfactory.

### 4. (i) CLOSET ACCOMMODATION.

During 1937 public scavenging schemes have been continued in the parishes of Brandon, Lakenheath and part of Mildenhall, where for the most part the type of closet has been converted to pail system.

The general standard of closet accommodation throughout the area is unsatisfactory. In some parishes as many as 50% are of the privy vault type.

The advent of piped water supplies will hasten the improvement of this accommodation when Governmental Sewerage Grants are available.

(ii) PUBLIC CLEANSING.

Complete schemes embodying the collection of house refuse and the contents of closet pails are in operation in the parishes of Brandon, and the main parts of the parishes of Lakenheath and Mildenhall. There is a monthly collection of unburnable refuse in the parish of Higham.

A Regional Scheme was given consideration, but owing to existing contracts it was decided that this matter be further considered in 1938 at the time when the question of the advisability of renewing contracts comes up for discussion.

The present pit used for refuse disposal in Mildenhall did not readily lend itself to Controlled Tipping owing to the absence of covering material. This difficulty has been carefully considered and arrangements have been made to provide the necessary material for the use of the Contractor.

(iv) SHOPS.

The requirements of the Shops' Act, 1934, regarding temperature, ventilation and sanitary conveniences have been brought to the notice of shop owners in the district.

(v) SMOKE ABATEMENT.

All premises in the area have been conducted during the year without smoke nuisance.

(vi) SWIMMING BATHS AND POOLS.

There are no public or privately owned Swimming Baths open to the public within the area.

(vii) ERADICATION OF BED BUGS.

No complaints of Bed Bugs in Council or Other houses have been received.

5. SCHOOLS.

The schools in the area have been inspected in 25 visits. The obsolete type schools will shortly be re-organised by the County Council and concentrated into larger centralised buildings. Essential improvements in sanitary arrangements are carried out as required but there is no doubt that the new schools will provide more satisfactory offices. The new piped water supplies are certain to be a great benefit to schools in the area.
