Gentlemen,

I have the honour of presenting my fifteenth Annual Report of the Health of the Urban District of Milnrow, and shall commence by placing before you the General Statistics from which this Report is formed.

The estimated population of 1943 is 7520 with an acreage of 5194 acres. The census of 1931 gave the total population as 8,623. This census showed the number of inhabited houses to be 2,574, and the number of families or separate occupiers 2,575.

The Population is industrial and is occupied mainly with cotton spinning, the engineering trade and the wool trade, none of which has any peculiar influence on the public health.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SANITARY INSPECTOR FOR 1943.

To the Chairman and Members of the Health Committee of the Urban District Council of Milnrow.

Gentlemen,

I herewith present to you my Thirtieth Annual Report of the sanitary circumstances of the District. Owing to the exigences of war there is more delay in the repair of housing defects and to facilitate this work only severe cases of defects such as defective roofs, defective window frames and conditions causing dampness are receiving attention.

PUBLIC HEALTH ACTS.

The number of houses inspected were 195, one hundred and twenty-seven were inspected owing to the occurrence of infectious disease; twenty-one were inspected under the Housing Regulations and forty-seven were ordinary inspections. Other inspections made are shown in Table "A" and nuisances abated in Table "B". There were three hundred and twenty-six informal notices and one statutory notice were issued. Five hundred and forty time of meat, fish, etc., four and one-half pounds of rancid butter, eight pounds of decayed onions and seventeen bottles of salad creme, were condemned as unfit for human food and disposed of. It is usual for a Sanitary Inspector to give evidence in prosecutions that meat is unfit for human consumption, on the 4th August, 1943, I had to give evidence in a case of illicit slaughtering that the beef in question was sound and fit for human consumption, fines to the value of £160 and costs were imposed. Twenty-two pigs were killed and inspected at the farms and found to be fit for human consumption. A caravan dweller was prosecuted for occupying a caravan without proper sanitary conveniences and an Order was made for it to cease being used as a dwelling, and he had to pay the costs of the prosecution.

DAIRIES, COWSHEDS AND MILKSHOPS.

There were three hundred and seventy visits paid to the farms. There are eighty-four dairy farms. Fourteen samples of milk were taken for examination for Tubercle Bacilli, all were mixed samples from a total of two hundred and eighty-five cows. All the samples were negative. Notice had to be served on one farmer for keeping a pig in the shippon where milk beasts were and another had to be served with a notice for dirty conditions of shippon and dairy. Twelve samples of milk were taken for quality by the County Sanitary Inspector and myself, one sample was found to contain added water, prosecution ensued and a fine was imposed. There are three supplies of Accredited milk in this District.

FACTORIES AND WORKSHOPS.

One hundred and forty-six visits were paid to Bakehouses and sixty-eight visits were paid to Workshops and Factories. Four pail closets were converted to fresh water closets and a lavatory basin was fixed at the Harbour Lane Mill Co. Ltd. Twenty-three trough water closets with automatic flushing at the Ellenroad Ring Mill, Ltd. were converted to single water closets with independent flushing.

INFECTION AND DISINFECTION.

There were one hundred and twenty-seven cases of infectious disease notified during the year. There were fifty-four cases of Scarlet Fever and four cases of Diphtheria. The percentage of removals to the Isolation Hospital was as follows:-

Scarlet Fever. 88.8% Diphtheria. 100.0%

Disinfection was carried out at sixty-seven houses with formaldehyde vapour.
