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ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH FOR THE YEAR 1947

TO THE HEALTH COMMITTEE OF THE URBAN DISTRICT OF MILNROW.

Gentlemen,

I have the honour of presenting my nineteenth Annual Report of the Health of the Urban District of Milnrow, and shall commence by placing before you the General Statistics from which this report is formed.

Population

The estimated population of 1947 is 8290 with an acreage of 5,194 acres. The census of 1931 gave the number of inhabited houses to be 2,574, and the number of families or separate occupants 2,575. The census of 1931 gave the total population as 8,623.

The rateable value of the District is £49,622 and the sum represented by the Penny Rate £195.

The population is industrial and is occupied mainly with cotton spinning, the engineering trade and the wool trade, none of which has any peculiar influence on the public health.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SANITARY INSPECTOR FOR THE YEAR 1947

To the Chairman and Members of the Health Committee of the Urban District Council.

GENTLEMEN,

I have very much pleasure in submitting to you my Third Annual Report.

In reviewing the general sanitary conditions of the district I have to report that the main problems are still the housing shortage and shortage of labour and materials for the repair and improvement of existing houses.

It is regrettable that the progress of the erection of houses is proceeding very slowly and it appears that any great improvement in the general housing conditions of the people of the district will not be possible for some time.

Owing to the difficulty of labour and materials there is a gradual deterioration in the general standard of repairs of many dwellinghouses, particularly those of a substandard character. Many of the houses which should be closed and demolished are having to be kept in occupation owing to the general housing shortage and although every effort is made to keep these premises habitable and prevent serious deterioration it is impossible to improve the conditions at the present time. The only solution is the rehousing of the people occupying these dwellinghouses and the closure and demolition of the property. This cannot be done until the housing shortage has been met.

Owing to the low standard for overcrowding laid down in the Housing Act 1936 there is not a large amount of overcrowding but in many instances the occupants are greatly inconvenienced by the number of persons occupying the available accommodation.

It is hoped that as the housing accommodation improves the overcrowding standard will be amended and the permitted number based on bedroom accommodation only.

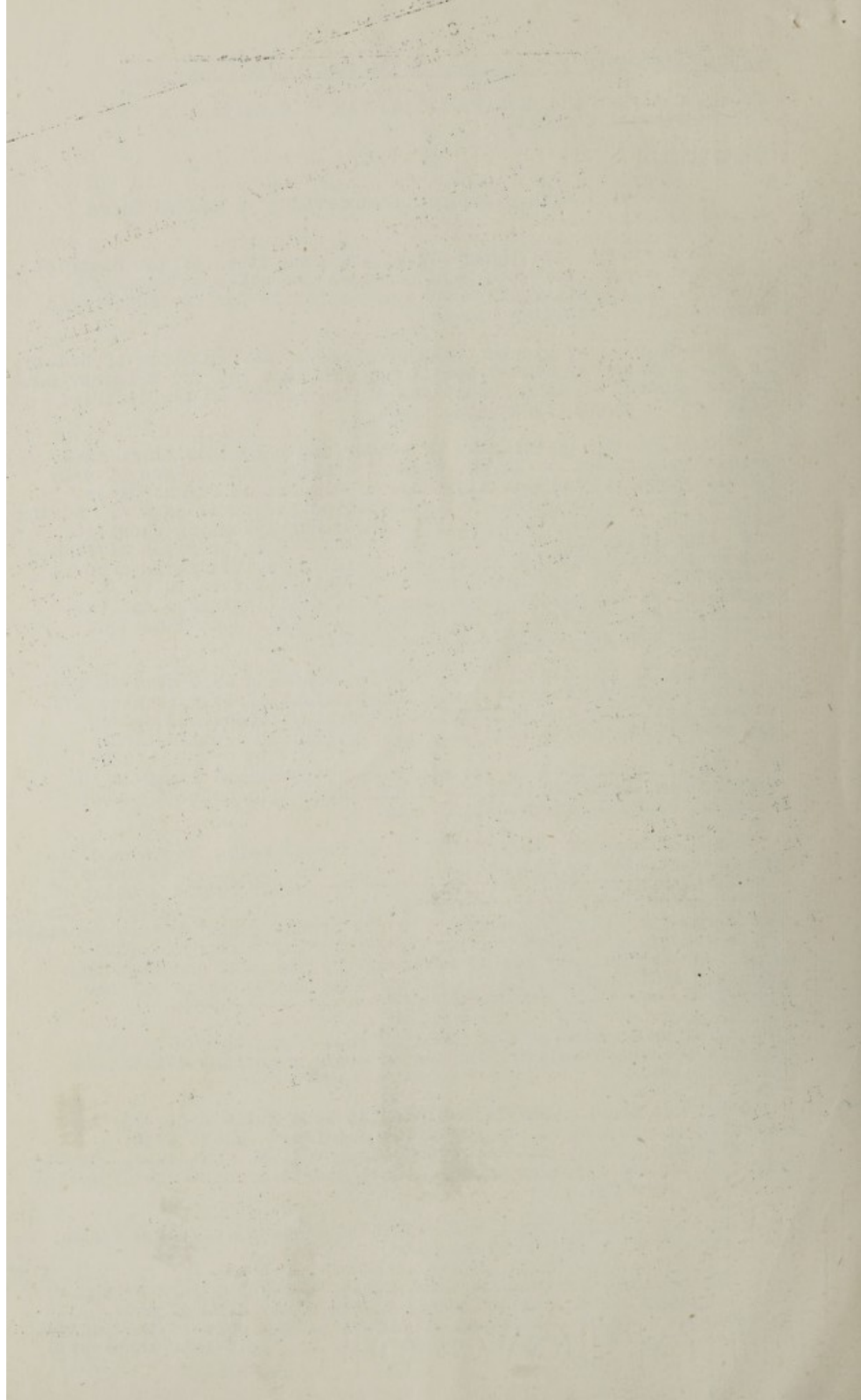
The problem of atmospheric pollution is being aggravated at the present time by the grades of fuel being supplied to industry and for domestic use. All types and grades of fuel are being burned on domestic grates which are inefficient, consequently the discharge into the atmosphere of waste products has greatly increased. It is essential that as early as possible the quality of fuel supplied particularly for domestic use be improved and that the improved solid burning fuel appliances be installed in all new houses.

Another feature of the types of fuel being burned is the greatly increased amount of domestic waste requiring collection and disposal.

The new refuse vehicle has not yet been delivered, and the existing one is constantly requiring repairs. These factors are slowing up the collection of domestic refuse, but every effort is being made to prevent inconvenience and to maintain an efficient cleansing service.

It will be noted that the amount of salvage collected during the year is less than the previous year.

The reasons for this are that during the early part of the year it was impossible to collect owing to the heavy fall of snow, also there appears to be a relaxing of effort on the part of the public. In view of the urgent need for salvage it is hoped that there will



be a renewed effort to improve the amount of salvage, particularly in connection with waste paper.

PUBLIC HEALTH ACTS.

The total number of houses inspected during the year was 344. Of this total 90 houses were inspected owing to the occurrence of infectious diseases. The remaining 254 inspections were made on account of general defects, overcrowding etc.

Other inspections made are shown on Table A and nuisances abated in Table B2.

There were 155 informal notices issued and 3 statutory notices served.

WATER SUPPLY.

The main supply is provided by Rochdale and Oldham Corporations and is a direct supply to the houses.

In certain areas of the District there is an insufficient pressure during the peak period also the water at times has been discoloured. Representations have been made to Rochdale Corporation Waterworks department who have promised to investigate these matters.

During the year 6 cottages were connected to the mains.

There are no stand pipes in the District.

Of the 2930 houses in the District 2729 are supplied from the mains. The houses not receiving mains water are those scattered throughout the District where a water main is not available, and are farms, farm cottages and small hamlets.

Owing to the exceptional dry summer many of the sources of supply to the outlying farms dried up and water had to be carried for a period.

The scheme for the provision of a piped water supply to Lowhouse Farms has been approved for grant by the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries and the contract let. It is expected that the work will be commenced in the near future.

Negotiations are proceeding for the provision of a supply from the mains to other farms.

RATS AND MICE INFESTATIONS.

This problem has received attention during the year. 126 visits have been made for rats and mice infestations.

The Council tip and sewage works are visited periodically and baiting carried out. In the majority of cases baiting has been successfully carried out.

A test baiting of the sewers was carried out during the summer. 17 manholes were baited. The result was negative, no bait being taken.

VERMIN INFESTATIONS.

There were 3 complaints of vermin infestation and these were dealt with by the use of "D. D. T."

One pail closet was converted to W.C. and twelve new W.C's. installed.

During the year work was commenced on the conversion of pail closets at a factory which is below the level of the sewer, plant to deal with the sewage is being installed.

Plans have been submitted and approved for the conversion of pail closets at another factory and plant to deal with the sewage is being installed. In this instance no sewer is available.

Work is at present proceeding on the installation of additional sanitary accomodation at another works.

208 ashbins have been renewed and 10 additional ashbins provided.

DRAINAGE.

It will be noticed that the number of inspections of drainage work is much greater than in previous years. This is due to the inspection of all new drainage work in connection with the Council houses and the building by private enterprise.

TIP COLLECTION SALVAGE.

All household refuse is collected by our refuse collecting vehicle, and is disposed of by controlled tipping on Council tip.

The Council are still awaiting delivery of the new refuse collecting vehicle to replace the existing one, and it is hoped that when the new vehicle is in service collection of household refuse will be improved.

FOOD PREPARING PREMISES AND FOOD SHOPS.

There are 21 bakehouses and 50 visits have been made to these premises. The general standard of cleanliness is good.

The ovens at the 21 bakehouses are heated by gas, electricity and solid fuel; 6 by gas, 2 by electricity and 13 by solid fuel.

FOOD SHOPS.

There are 15 Butchers shops, 10 Fried Fish and Chip shops, 25 Grocery and Provisions, 21 Confectioners, 12 Greengrocery and Fish, 1 Ice Cream manufacturer, 3 Ice Cream retailers and 1 Blood Pudding manufacturer.

116 visits have been made to food preparing premises and food shops. Several improvements have been carried out at these premises. A good standard of cleanliness has been maintained.

ICE CREAM.

The premises used for the manufacture of Ice Cream have been visited regularly and the premises maintained in a clean condition.

Since the Ice Cream (Heat Treatment etc) Regulations, 1947, came into operation the major portion of the ice cream is being manufactured outside the District at premises installing heat treatment plant. The local premises are only used for storage and occasionally a cold mix is prepared.

The 3 retail premises have refrigerators supplied by the makers and sell wrapped ice cream.

CANTEENS.

5 inspections have been made to factory canteens. The premises were clean and satisfactory, the storage and handling of the food satisfactory.

LICENSED PREMISES.

15 visits have been made to licensed premises regarding cleanliness and sanitary accommodation. The premises were clean and satisfactory, facilities for washing of glasses adequate. In many of these premises a detergent is used in the cleaning of glasses.

MILK.

There are 84 cowkeepers in the District, of these 54 are dairy farmers.

During the year 274 visits were paid to farms.

One new shippon has been constructed with tubular fittings and water bowls, a new dairy is to be constructed.

Plans are in course of preparation for a new shippon and dairy at another farm.

Investigations were made into the unsatisfactory methylene blue and coliform tests. After discussions with the farmers concerned further samples were taken which proved to be satisfactory.

The reason for the small number of samples for T.B. being taken during the year is that the laboratory were unable to conduct examinations owing to lack of Guinea Pigs.

SCHOOLS MILK.

In my last report I stated that the method of serving milk in schools was not satisfactory and an effort was being made to improve the method of handling. This has now been remedied, the milk being delivered to the schools and supplied to the children in sealed $\frac{3}{4}$ pint bottles, straws being used for drinking. Since this method was introduced the quantity of milk consumed by the school children has greatly increased.

FOOD AND DRUGS.

During the year the County Sampling officer took 19 samples of milk for quality and 2 informal samples of "Pasteurised" milk for quality and the Phosphates test. 4 "Appeal to the Cow" samples were taken. Of the milk samples taken, 1 contained 8% extraneous water, one 11.2% extraneous water and one 46.6% deficient in fat.

Court proceedings were instituted, the farmer concerned with the milk containing 8% extraneous water was fined £2.2.0, £3.3.0 Advocates fee and £2.2.0 Analysts fee; the farmer concerned with the milk containing 11.2% extraneous water was fined £5.0.0, £3.3.0 Advocates fee and £1.1.0 Analysts fee and in the case of the farmer concerned with the milk being 46.6% deficient in fats the fine was £2.2.0, £3.3.0 Advocates fee and £2.2.0 Analysts fee.

SMOKE ABATEMENT.

The industrial chimneys are kept under constant observation. 6 visits have been made to boiler plants.

Two boiler plants have had part of their boilers fitted with crude oil burning apparatus.

Generally the firemen are making every effort to prevent the emission of large quantities of smoke but the grades of coal being used make the work more difficult.


Of the 23 cases of Scarlet Fever 19 were removed to hospital. One case of Diphtheria was notified but this proved negative and the notification was withdrawn.
