Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have to honour of presenting my twenty-first Annual Report of the Health of the Urban District of Milnrow, and shall commence by placing before you the General Statistics from which this report is formed.

Population

The estimated population of 1949 is 8514 with an acreage of 5,194 acres. The census of 1931 gave the number of inhabited houses to be 2,574, and the number of families or separate occupiers 2,575. The census of 1931 gave the total population as 8,623.

The rateable value of the district is £50,760 and the sum represented by the Penny Rate is £211.

The population is industrial and is occupied mainly with cotton spinning, the engineering trade and the wool trade, none of which has any peculiar influence on the public health.

Immunisation Clinics are held monthly at the Maternity and
Child Welfare Centre on the first Wednesday in
every month.

Ambulance Facilities The Ambulance service is now administered
by the Lancashire County Council and the Ambulance
Station is at Littleborough.

Infectious Diseases

The hospital functions are now administered by the
Regional Hospital Board.

Lady and Gentlemen,

I have much pleasure in submitting to you my fifth
Annual Report of the sanitary conditions of the district.

The greatest problem is still housing accommodation.

The number of applicants for Council houses at the
end of the year was 543, at the end of 1948 the number
was 549.

During the year there were 70 families rehoused in new
houses and 8 families rehoused in other council houses.

year was 84 totalling 294 people.

From the foregoing it will be seen that although
84 families involving 294 people have been rehoused the
number of applicants for Council houses has only been
reduced by 6.

During the year 5 demolition orders have been made under Section 11, Housing Act, 1936 for individual unfit houses.

In each case the house was in a dangerous condition and it was imperative that the house should be closed and the tenants removed from the danger.

The total number of dwellinghouses in the district is 3,034. This is made up of 664 Council houses, 2,370 private dwellinghouses.

The collection and disposal of domestic refuse, night soil and salvage was placed under my jurisdiction in February.

Since that date a new refuse vehicle has been ordered and delivered. The services are now operated with two vehicles for domestic refuse and night soil, a hired vehicle is used for the collection of kitchen waste.

There was joint ashbin accommodation at many dwellinghouses in the district. During the year the accommodation has been brought up to separate accommodation, 378 additional ashbins have been provided by the owners.

During the year the Council considered the question of provision and maintenance of ashbins. From 1st April, 1950 the Council will provide and maintain ashbins for the reception of house refuse, the ashbins as renewed will become part of the refuse collection equipment and will be owned by the Council.

The direction for the collection of waste paper was withdrawn on the 4th July. Owing to the collection becoming an uneconomic proposition it was decided to discontinue the service at the end of September.

A charge of 25/- per bin is now made for the collection of waste paper and trade refuse from business premises.

The Food and Drugs (Milk and Dairies) Act, 1944 came into operation on the 1st October, transferring the control of production of milk from the local authorities to the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries.

The Local Authorities are still responsible for the supervision of Heat Treatment and distribution of milk.

PUBLIC HEALTH ACTS

The total number of houses inspected during the year was 438. Of this total 167 houses were inspected owing to the occurrence of infectious diseases. The remaining inspections were made on account of general defects, overcrowding etc.

Other inspections made are shown on Table A and nuisances abated in Table B.

There were 87 informal notices issued and 16 statutory notices served.

WATER SUPPLY

The main supply is provided by Rochdale and Oldham Corporations and is a direct supply to the houses.

The water supply is still not satisfactory the discolouration at times being very bad.

The Health Committee have made representations to the Rochdale Corporation from time to time but there has not been any improvement. The supply is being kept under observation and further efforts made to obtain a satisfactory supply.

There are no stand pipes in the district.

Of the 3034 houses in the district 2846 are supplied from the mains. The houses not receiving mains water are those scattered throughout the district where a water main is not available, and are farms, farm cottages and small hamlets.

During the year a scheme for the provision of mains supply to one farm has been completed.

RATS AND MICE INFESTATIONS

This problem has received attention during the year 106 visits have been made for rats and mice infestations.

The Council tip and Sewage works are visited periodically and baiting carried out.

A test bait of the sewers was carried out, 23 manholes were baited. I am pleased to report that no bait was taken.

There were no cases of infestation of a serious nature.

20 new W.C.'s have been installed.

243 ashbins have been renewed and 378 additional bins have been provided.

Plans are in course of preparation for a scheme for the conversion of pail closets and the provision of plant to deal with the sewage at one factory.

REFUSE TIP, COLLECTION AND SALVAGE

All household refuse is collected by two refuse collection vehicles and is disposed of by controlled tipping on the Council tip.

The collection of waste paper was discontinued at the end of September, other salvage work has been continued.

Many of the Kitchen waste bins were very dilapidated and 50 have been renewed.

Kitchen waste is collected and taken to the Rochdale Corporation Cleansing Department for sterilization and manufactured into pig food.

DRAINAGE

All drainage work carried out has been inspected including drainage on the Council housing estates. 153 visits have been made.

During the year 24 visits were made to factories re sanitary accommodation, canteens and boiler plant.

FOOD PREPARING PREMISES AND FOOD SHOPS

There are 21 bakehouses and 40 visits have been made to these premises. The general standard of cleanliness is good.

The ovens at these bakehouses are heated by gas, electricity and solid fuel, 9 gas, 2 electricity and 10 solid fuel.

FOOD SHOPS

There are 15 butchers shops, 12 Fried Fish and Chip shops, 25 Grocery and provisions, 21 confectioners, 14 greengrocery and fish, 12 Ice Cream retailers and 1 Blood Pudding Manufacturer.

98 visits have been made to food preparing premises and food shops. Many shops have provided refrigerators, also many are now retailing frozen foods. A good standard of cleanliness has been maintained.

A Mobile fish and chip shops was in operation in the district for a short period during the year.

ICE CREAM

There are 12 shops retailing ice cream in the district, one one shop retails loose ice cream, the others sell pre-packed ice cream.

There is one ice cream manufacturer in the district. During the year heat treatment plant has been installed to comply with the Ice Cream (Heat Treatment) regulations. The standard of cleanliness is satisfactory.

LICENSED PREMISES

6 visits have been made to licensed premises regarding cleanliness and sanitary accommodation.

The premises were clean and satisfactory, facilities for washing glasses adequate. In many premises a detergent is used in the cleansing of glasses.

MILK

DAIRIES, COWSHEDS AND MILKSHOPS

The number of milk producers in the district is 58 Milk Distributors, 23; Milkshops, 20.

During the year 130 visits were paid to farms.

One new shippon with standing for 24 cattle has been constructed, one shippon reconstructed and two new dairies built.

The number of licences to produce "Accredited" milk is 4.
