FOR THE YEAR 1950TO THE HEALTH COMMITTEE OF THE URBAN DISTRICT OF MILNROW

Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour of presenting my twenty-second Annual Report of the Urban District of Milnrow, and shall commence by placing before you the General Statistics from which this report is formed.

Population.

The estimated population for 1950 is 8,596 with an acreage of 5,194 acres. The census of 1931 gave the number of inhabited houses to be 2,574, the number of families or separate occupiers 2,575 and the total population 8,623.

The rateable value of the district is £51,359 and the sum represented by the Penny Rate is £214.

The population is industrial and is occupied mainly with cotton spinning, the engineering trade and the wool trade, none of which has any peculiar influence on the public health.

Annual Report of the Sanitary Inspector for the Year 1950

To the Chairman and Members of the Health Committee of the Urban District Council.

Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have much pleasure in submitting to you my sixth Annual Report of the sanitary conditions of the district.

As I have mentioned in my previous reports the housing situation is the greatest problem.

The number of applications for a council house on the register at the end of the year was 359 made up as follows :-

- 232 two bedroom houses
- 68 three bedroom houses
- 3 four bedroom houses
- 31 bungalows
- 14 single persons flats
- 1 two bedroom flat
- 10 applications from tenants of Council houses for flats.

Of these applications there are 125 families living in lodgings.

The present allocation of houses by the Ministry for erection in this district is 25 per year.

If the allocation remains the same and progress in building remains at the same rate as at present it will be appreciated that it will take at least 6 years to provide the families in lodgings with a separate house.

Added to this will be the number of additional applications received from other families living in lodgings.

To complete the housing requirements as the housing register stands at present it will take 14 years to satisfy this demand.

In view of the need for relieving the present housing shortage it will be appreciated that the closure and demolition of many of the substandard houses cannot be considered now.

The desire of the Council is to improve the standard of housing accommodation of the district, but under the present circumstances it will be a considerable time before the closure and demolition of many substandard houses can be carried out.

SCHEME NO. 2. 16 houses have been completed and tenanted. The remaining 12 houses are roofed and now in course of completion.

FLATS, DALTON AVENUE

The Council have received permission to erect 50 flats on the Dalton Avenue site.

16 one bedroom flats.

18 single person flats.

It is hoped that tenants of council houses who are at present occupying accommodation which is larger than they require will be willing to move to flats and release the larger accommodation for families.

SCHOOLS

A special report was prepared on the Sanitary accommodation, washing and meal facilities at the schools in the district.

A copy of the report was forwarded to the separate authorities and suggestions made for improving the conditions.

It is hoped that improvements will be made in the conditions at these schools.

During the year one Demolition Order was made under Section 11, Housing Act 1936.

Three houses on which Demolition Orders had been made have been demolished.

Application was made under Section 2, Housing Act 1939 to the court for the quashing of the demolition order made on No. 19 Broad Lane on the 12th March, 1941. The application was granted and the order quashed.

ASHBINS

On the 1st April the scheme for the provision and maintenance of ashbins by the Council came into operation. The scheme has operated very satisfactorily.

FOOD.

The Council made Bye-laws under Section 15 of the Food and Drugs Act 1938 for securing the observance of sanitary and cleanly conditions and practices in connection with the handling, wrapping and delivery of food sold or intended for sale for human consumption, and in connection with the sale or exposure for sale in the open air of food intended for human consumption.

PUBLIC HEALTH ACTS

The total number of houses inspected during the year was 295, of this total 97 houses were inspected owing to the occurrence of infectious diseases. The remaining inspections were made on account of general defects, overcrowding etc.

Other inspections made are shown on Table A and nuisances abated in Table B.

There were 79 informal notices issued and 2 statutory notices served.

WATER SUPPLY

The water supply for the district is from Rochdale and Oldham Corporations and is a direct supply to the houses.

During the year strong representations were made to the Rochdale Corporation regarding the lack of pressure in certain areas of the district, also discolouration which occurs periodically.

Two meetings were held with the members of the Rochdale Corporation Waterworks Committee.

The result of these representations is that a portion of the Haugh Ward is now supplied from the Oldham Corporation supply, and the pressure has been greatly improved.

During the year 4 samples of water supplied by Rochdale Corporation have been taken.

The results of the bacteriological examination were satisfactory.

Regarding the chemical analysis the analyst was concerned regarding the high figure for free ammonia and the presence of nitrites.

This matter has been discussed with the Rochdale Waterworks Engineer and the matter investigated, alterations to the filter plant are being considered.

There are no stand pipes in the district.

Of the 3070 houses in the district 2871 are supplied from the mains. The houses not receiving mains water are those scattered throughout the district where a water main is not available, and are farms, farm cottages and small hamlets.

RATS AND MICE INFESTATIONS

This problem has received attention during the year. 107 visits have been made for rats and mice infestations.

199 ashbins have been renewed and 18 additional bins have been provided.

From the 1st April the scheme for the provision and renewal of ashbins by the local authority and charged to rate fund was put into operation.
