

## To the Health Committee of the Urban District of Milnrow

Mrs. Stott and Gentlemen,

I have the honour of presenting my twenty-seventh Annual Report of the District of Milnrow and shall commence by placing before you the General Statistics from which this report is forme?.

## Population

The estimated population for 1955 is 8,500 which an acreage of 5,194.

The rateable value of the district is £54,057 and the sum represented by the penny rate is £212.

The population is industrial and is occupied mainly with cotton spinning, the engineering trade and the wool trade, none of which has any peculiar influences on the public health.

Annual Report of the Sanitary Inspector for the year 1955

To the Chairman and Members of the Health Connittee of the Urban District Council.

Mrs. Stott and Gentlemen,

I have much pleasure in submitting to you my eleventh Annual Report of the sanitary conditions of the district.

During the year I had 3 months sick leave and the report shows a reduction in the number of visits owing to this.

I wish to acknowledge the assistance of my colleagues from Rochdale who carried out the work of meat and foods inspection during this period.

The work of reconditioning and modernising the houses in Major Street is still proceeding.

During the year 5 houses were reconditioned and modernised, the account dation now being 3 bedrooms, bathroom, hall, 2 living rooms and kitchen.

Another house was purchased by the Council and this has been reconditioned and modernised providing 2 bedrooms, bathroom and 2 living rooms.

The slun clearance programe for the next 5 years has been submitted and approved by the Ministry of Housing and Local Government.

Denolition Orders have been made on two houses and Closing Orders on two.

It will be noted from the report that the work of meat inspection has increased and more time is having to be given to this work.

The work of reclaiming the older part of the tip has been commenced, the top has been levelled and sludge from the sewage works tipped ready for spreading. It is hoped that this portion of the tip will be under cultivation next year, also the first phase of the tree planting scheme has been completed and 3,500 trees planted.

## Public Health Acts

The total number of houses inspected during the year was 72, of this total 37 were inspected owing to the occurence of infectious diseases. The remaining inspections were made on account of general defects etc.

Other inspections made are shown in Table 'A' and Muisances abated in Table 'B'.

#### Water Supply

The water supply for the district is from Rochdale and Oldham Corporations and is a direct supply to the houses.

Of the 3,137 houses of the district, 2,948 are supplied from the mains. The houses not receiving mains water are those scattered throughout the district where a water main is not available and are farms, farm cottages and small hanlets.

There are no stand pipes in the district.

## Domestic Refuse

The Cleansing service is operated by two refuse collection vehicles and 8 men, and collect domestic refuse, nightsoil and offal.

The refuse is disposed of by controlled tipping.

The vehicles travelled 9,052 miles and collected 1,589 loads of refuse, nightsoil and offal.

#### Salvage

13 tons 14 curts of tins have been salvaged and sold to Rochdale Corporation for baling. Also 9 tons 18 cut of ferrou metals have been sold.

### Tip

During the year the top of the tip has been levelled and it is intended during the next year to bring this part into cultivation.

The first part of the tree planting scheme has been completed and 1,200 Grey Alder, 1,150 Beech and 1,150 Sycamore trees have been planted.
