To The Health Committee of the Urban District of Milnrow

Gentlemen,

I have the honour of presenting my twenty ninth Annual Report of the District of Milnrow and shall commence by placing before you the General Statistics from which this report is formed:

Population

The estimated population for 1957 is 8,410, with an acreage of 5,194.

The rateable value of the district is £77,036 and the sum represented by the penny rate is £321.

The population is industrial and is occupied mainly with cotton spinning, the engineering trade and the wool trade, none of which has any peculiar influence on the public health.

Under the National Health Service Act the County is divided into 17 administrative divisions.

Milnrow is in number 13 district which is composed of Bacup, Heywood, Littleborough, Milnrow, Wardle and Whitworth.

Maternity and Child Welfare

<u>Clinic</u>	There is a Maternity and Child Welfare Clinic, (Consultation) open every Tuesday 2-0 to 4-0.p.m.
<u>Ante Natal</u>	Cases attend clinic in Rochdale by arrangement or 1, Wesley Street when the clinic is open.
<u>Midwifery</u>	Domiciliary midwifery is carried out by midwives under the control of the Lancashire County Council.

<u>Home Helps</u>	There are 7 home helps in the district
<u>Cleansing Centre</u>	Cases requiring treatment are treated at the Cleansing Centre in Rochdale.
<u>Immunisation</u>	Clinics are held monthly at the Maternity and Child Welfare on the first Wednesday in every month.
<u>Ambulance Facilities</u>	The ambulance service is administered by the Lancashire County Council and the Ambulance Station is at Littleborough.
<u>Infectious Diseases</u>	The hospitals are administered by the Regional Hospital Board.

Before closing the report, I should like to draw your attention to a few facts.

1. There has been no case of Diphtheria notified in the district since 1944. Immunisation was started at the Albert Mills during the war in 1940.
2. It is the first time since 1900 that no infant deaths (under 1 year) have occurred.
3. The Birth rate has gone up this year - first time since 1951. Death rate, still births and infantile mortality rate are all down.
4. During the year, 12 Demolition orders and 12 Closing orders were made.
5. 22 Bungalows and 5 houses were completed during the year.

Annual Report of the Public Health Inspector for the year 1957

To the Chairman and Members of the Health Committee of the Urban District Council

Gentlemen,

I have much pleasure in submitting to you my thirteenth Annual Report.

The work of slum clearance continues and during the year 12 Demolition Orders and 12 Closing Orders were made; 11 houses demolished and 73 people re-housed.

The 22 bungalows were completed and these were used for the re-housing of tenants from houses under slum clearance, either by direct movement or by re-housing council tenants and re-housing displaced slum clearance tenants into these houses.

The work of conversion of the two back to back houses, 6 Major Street and 12 Sarah Jane Street, has been completed and the houses occupied.

During the year there has been an increase in the slaughtering in the district and has necessitated more time being devoted to this work.

Owing to the continued increase in legislation and duties it is not possible to devote the amount of time to every phase of the work but every endeavour is made to try to keep all sections of the work under control according to their urgency.

A further 1,200 trees have been planted on the tip during the year.

Public Health Acts

The total number of houses inspected during the year was 99; of this total 2 were inspected owing to the occurrence of infectious diseases. The remaining inspections were made on account of general defects etc.

Water Supply

The water supply for the district is from Rochdale and Oldham Corporations and is a direct supply to the houses.

Of the 3166 houses of the district, 2977 are supplied from the mains. The houses not receiving mains water are those scattered throughout the district where a water main is not available and are farms, farm cottages and small hamlets.

There are no stand pipes in the district.

The refuse is disposed of by controlled tipping.

The meat is conveyed to the Rochdale Corporation Cleansing Department for destruction.

Of the cattle inspected, 3.96% were affected with Tuberculosis.
The grade of cattle slaughtered has been of a high grade and many are from attested herds.
