Lady and Gentlemen,

I have the honour of presenting my thirtyfirst Annual Report of the District of Milmrow and shall commence by placing before you the General Statistics from which this report is formed:-

Population

The estimated population for 1959 is 8,380 with an acreage of 5,194.

The rateable value of the district is £98,957 and the sum represented by the penny rate is £384.

The population is industrial and is occupied mainly with cotton spinning, the engineering trade and the wool trade, none of which has any peculiar influence on the public health.

Maternity and Child Welfare.

Clinic There is a Maternity and Child Welfare Clinic, (Consultation) open every Tuesday 2-0 to 4-0 p.m.

Ante Natal Cases attend clinic in Rochdale by arrangement or 1, Wesley Street, when the clinic is open.

Midwifery Domiciliary midwifery is carried out by midwives under the control of the Lancashire County Council.

Home Helps There are 10 home helps in the district.

Cleansing Cases requiring treatment are treated at the Centre Cleansing Centre in Rochdale.

Immunisation Clinics are held monthly at the Maternity and Child Welfare on the first Wednesday in every month.

Ambulance The ambulance service is administered by the Lancashire County Council and the Ambulance Station is at Radcliffe.

<u>Discases</u>

The hospitals are administered by the Regional Hospital Board.

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Annual Report of the Public Health Inspector for the year, 1959

To the Chairman and Members of the Health Committee of the Urban District Council

Lady and Gentlemen.

I have much pleasure in submitting to you my fifteenth Annual Report.

The basic needs of Public Health always remain the

same:

Clean Air, Pure Water supply, Safe and wholesome food, Suitable and sufficient housing.

Owing to the ever changing mode of living and the advance of science, the problems of general environmental conditions are constantly changing and the method of dealing with the problems requires a reorientation from time to time.

One of the changes at the present time is in the retailing of food.

In the self-service type of shop, all articles are pre-packed, many of them cooked, only requiring re-heating; also there is the deep freeze foods.

The method of pre-packing has many advantages from the hygenic point of view, but there are several factors which I am of the opinion should receive further consideration:-

(a) Are all foods suitable for pre-packing,

(b) Is there a loss of nutritive value and palatability.

(c) Are we using the right packing materials,

(d) Should there be a definite time limit from packing to sale.

Regarding Frozen Foods

- (1) Are frozen foods defrosted a sufficient length of time before cooking and re-heating.
- (2) Are these frozen foods which are cooked and require re-heating, re-heated to a sufficient temperature,

Another feature which is receiving attention is Atmospheric Pollution, Although many smoke control areas are being created and visible smoke being practically eliminated, further consideration should be given to eliminate the sulphur and other gases which are products of combustion.

There is also the products from the internal combustion engine. With the increase of motor vehicles (petrol and diesel) is the concentration of waste gases from these vehicles where congestion of traffic occurs, sufficient to cause harmful effects to the individual in the vicinity. I am of the opinion that much useful information could be obtained by sampling the air in areas in cities and towns where there is traffic congestion.

The amount of pollution from industrial sources in the district is reducing as a reults of redundancy and closing of mills, and the electrification of mills.

There are three cotton mills and one woollen mill which have recently closed down.

Of the remainder, 11 new only generate steam for heating and processing, the driving being done by electricity.

This leaves only 7 which use steam for driving.

Also, many bakehouses have changed from solid fuel to gas or electricity and there are now only 3 using solid fuel.

Owing to the amount of prepacking and where smokeless fuels are burned, the contents of refuse is changing and controlled tipping is becoming a problem. With the amount of paper, cartons and other pre-packing materials, and a reduction of the ash content of refuse, the difficulty in consolidating and providing sufficient covering material to carry out controlled tipping is becoming increasingly difficult and it would appear that further investigation should be carried out to ascertain the most useful, hygenic and best method of refuse disposal.
