Mr. Chairman, Lady and Gentlemen,

I have the honour of presenting my thirtythird Annual Report of the District of Milnrow and shall commence by placing before you the General Statistics from which this report is formed:-

Population

The estimated population of the district for 1961 is 8110 with an acreage of 5,194.

The rateable value of the district is £102,443 and the sum represented by the penny rate is £367.

The population is industrial and is occupied mainly with cotton spinning, the engineering trade and the wool trade, none of which has any peculiar influence on the public health.

Midwifery

Domiciliary midwifery is carried out by midwives under the control of the Lancashire County Council

Home Helps

The home help service is run by the Lancashire County Council, Divisional Health No. 13.

Cleansing Centre

Cases requiring treatment are treated at the Cleansing Centre in Rochdale.

Immunisation

Clinics are held monthly at the Maternity and Child Welfare on the first Wednesday in every month.

Ambulance Facilities

The ambulance service is administered by the Lancashire County Council and the Ambulance Station is at Radcliffe.

Infectious Diseases

The hospitals are administered by the Regional Hospital Board.

for the year 1961

To the Chairman and Members of the Health Committee

Mr. Chairman, Lady & Gentlemen,

I have much pleasure in submitting to you my seventeenth Annual Report.

During the year the Council purchased 14 back to back houses and 6 through houses, two of the back to back houses have been demolished for road widening and the other 12 are being modernised and ventilated to provide one bedroom accommodation.

The six through houses are to be provided with hot water, baths, washbasins and inside Sanitary Accommodation.

In my opinion this work in the older type of suitable house is worthwhile investment and when modernised will provide suitable accommodation for many years.

The Council also have a scheme for the building of old people's accommodation with wardens house attached for older people who with some assistance will be able to live in their own accommodation and prevent them having to go into part 3 accommodation.

Incorporated in this scheme are 11 two bedroom houses and 10 two bedroom bungalows.

This method of building other accommodation with old peoples, is in my opinion, a far better method than segregating old people, in so far as they feel they are still part of the community and not of a separate community.

Lack of pressure in the water mains has resulted in a poor supply of water at Wildhouse Lane and Broad Lane. The Rochdale Corporation Waterworks Committee have now obtained permission to lay a new main from the Littleborough side to supply Wildhouse Lane and the development on Kiln Lane.

It is hoped that this work will be commenced at an early date.

Regarding the Broad Lane supply, there is building development progress in Rochdale adjoining the Milnrow boundary and the Rochdale Waterworks Department have stated that they will extend the main supplying these houses and feed the upper part of Broad Lane from this source.

Planning permission has been granted to push the existing tip towards Buckley Hill and to contour and reclaim the land.

A new Karrier "Blenheim" 11/15 cwt yard packer refuse collection vehicle has been ordered and delivery is expected early 1962.

This should make for a more effective and cleaner method of refuse collection.

I wish to express my thanks to the Chairman and Members of the Health Committee for their help and consideration in the exercise of my duties as Public Health Inspector.

To the Chairman and Members of the Health Committee

Mr. Chairman, Lady & Gentlemen,

I have much pleasure in submitting to you my report on the work of the Public Health Committee for the year 1951.

During the year the Council purchased 11 beds in houses and 6 private houses, two of the beds in houses have been requisitioned for use as a day hospital and the other 11 are being requisitioned and requisitioned to provide the necessary accommodation.

The six private houses are to be provided with hot water, heating, ventilation and lighting. Necessary accommodation.

In my opinion this work in the other type of suitable houses is worthwhile and when requisitioned will provide suitable accommodation for many years.

The Council also have a scheme for the building of old people's accommodation with suitable houses attached for other people who with some assistance will be able to live in their own accommodation and prevent them having to go into a hospital.

Investigation in this scheme and if the houses become and 10 new houses required.

This method of building other accommodation with old people, is in my opinion, a far better method than requisitioning old people, as far as the cost and the use of the community and not of a separate community.

Work on provision in the water supply has resulted in a new supply of water at 100 gallons per hour from the Council's Corporation Waterworks. Council have now obtained permission to lay a new main from the Corporation side to supply 100 gallons per hour and the development on this line.

It is hoped that this work will be completed at an early date.

Regarding the house loan supply, there is further development progress in the house loan supply and the Council's Waterworks Department have stated that they will extend the main supplying these houses and that the water from the house loan supply will be used.

Domestic gas supply has been granted to meet the existing gas supply and to provide a further 100,000 B.T.U.

A new "Electricity" 11/12 and 11/13 and 11/14 and 11/15 collection vehicle has been ordered and delivery is expected early 1952.

The Council have for a long time and of course provided of refuse collection.

I wish to express my thanks to the Chairman and Members of the Health Committee for their help and co-operation in the work of my office as Public Health Inspector.

### Water Supply

The water supply for the district is from Rochdale & Oldham Corporations. The statutory water undertaking being Rochdale. The water is from the Moorland gathering grounds. Of the 3194 houses of the district 3015 are supplied from the mains. The houses not receiving mains water are those scattered throughout the outer fringe where there are no water mains and are farm houses and small hamlets. The supplies being from private wells and springs.

### Sampling

During the year, 3 samples were taken for bacteriological examination and all these proved to be satisfactory.

There are no stand pipes in the district.

### Sewage Disposal

Most of the district is sewered and the sewage treated at the sewage works situate at Uncouth.

The number of pail closets in the district is now 155 having been reduced by demolition of unfit houses. The night soil is collected with a gully emptier fitted with night soil attachment and disposed of by discharging into the sewer for treatment at the sewage works.

Public Cleansing

Domestic Refuse

Collection

The cleansing service is operated by two 7½ cub.yard side loading refuse collection vehicles staffed by two drivers and 6 men.

The refuse is emptied from 3109 ashbins.

The collection has been a weekly collection with the exception of holiday periods.

The refuse collection vehicles covered 7430 miles and collected 1909 loads.

Disposal

The refuse is disposed of by controlled tipping. The 1909 loads of refuse were disposed of, the refuse has been levelled, covered and consolidated with the mechanical shovel and there has not been any nuisance created.

Dustbins

The providing of dustbins under the municipal bin scheme is still working very satisfactorily and during the year 147 ashbins have been renewed and 148 new ashbins provided.

Offensive Trades

There are no offensive trades in the district.

Rag Flock & Other Filling Materials Act., 1951

One factory has been granted a renewal of licence to manufacture and store rag flock.

Clean Air Act, 1956

20 visits have been made to business premises regarding the provisions of the Clean Air Act.

During the year one factory has been fitted with automatic underfed stokers. Discussions have been held with managers regarding the fitting of automatic stokers to the boiler plant.

The chimneys are kept under observation and efforts made to control the emission of smoke.

### Slaughterhouses

At the commencement of the year, there were 5 slaughterhouses licensed.

During the year, 3 slaughterhouses were discontinued and work was done on the other two to comply with the Slaughterhouse (Hygiene) Regulations, 1958 and the Slaughter of Animals (Prevention of Cruelty) Regulations, 1958.

Work was commenced on the building of a new slaughterhouse and will be completed by the end of the year.

The appointed day for the coming into operation of the Regulations is 1st January, 1962.

During the year, 500 visits were made to slaughterhouses. There has been an increase in the number of animals killed on the previous year, 1352 in 1959 - 4499 in 1961.
