Mr. Chairman, Lady and Gentlemen,

I have the honour of presenting my thirtyfourth Annual Report of the District of Milnrow and shall commence by placing before you the General Statistics from which this report is formed:-

Population

The estimated population of the district for 1962 is 7,819 with an acreage of 5,194.

The rateable value of the district is £127,746 and the sum represented by the penny rate is £376.

The population is industrial and is occupied mainly with cotton spinning, the engineering trade and the wool trade, none of which has any peculiar influence on the public health.

Maternity and Child Welfare

Clinic There is a Maternity and Child Welfare Clinic (Consultation) open every Tuesday, 2.0. to 4.0. p.m.

Ante-Natal Cases attend clinic in Rochdale by arrangement or 1 Wesley Street, when the clinic is open.

Midwifery Domiciliary midwifery is carried out by midwives under the control of the Lancashire County Council.

Home Helps The home help service is run by the Lancashire County Council, Divisional Health No. 13.

Cleansing Cases requiring troatment are treated at the Centre Cleansing Centre in Rochdale.

Immunisation Clinics are held monthly at the Maternity and Child Welfare on the first Wednesday in every month.

Ambulance The ambulance service is administered by the Lancashire Facilities County Council and the Ambulance Station is at Radcliffe.

Infectious The hospitals are administered by the Regional Diseases Hospital Board.

for the year 1962

Madam Chairman and Gentlemen,

I have much pleasure in submitting to you my eighteenth Annual Report.

The Karrier Bantam 11/15 cu.yd. packer refuse collection vehicle was delivered at the beginning of the year and has proved to be satisfactory making a cleaner collection and saving time.

Tipping ceased on the tip facing Stanneybrook Park and has been contoured into the existing countryside, soiling and reseeding have yet to be carried out.

Planning permission has been received for the new tip at Uncouth.

The appointed day for the slaughterhouse regulations was the 1st January, 1962.

At that date two slaughterhouses had carried out the necessary work and building was still being carried out on the new slaughterhouse.

There are now 3 slaughterhouses in operation and two of these are being used by wholesale slaughtermen.

Slaughtering at one slaughterhouse commenced on the 1st April and another at the beginning of July.

It will be appreciated that the amount of meat inspected has greatly increased and is expected to increase further during the coming year.

During the period of fog the number of deaths was again very high and although the burning of smokeless fuels has removed such of the smoke from the atmosphere the other waste gasses are still being discharged into the air.

It would appear that further research is still necessary to try to eliminate the waste gasses from the fuel.

At the present time many bungalows are being built with the resulting low chimney outlet, the weste from the fires are being discharged at a low level with little chance of being properly diffused and in my opinion is aggravating the position.

Water Supply

The water supply for the district is from Rochdale & Oldham
Corporations. The statutory water undertaking being Rochdale. The
water is from the Moorland gathering grounds. Of the 3258 houses of the
district, 3073 are supplied from the mains. The houses not receiving
mains water are those scattered throughout the outer fringe where there are
no water mains and are farm houses and small hamlets. The supplies being
from private wells and springs.

Sampling

During the year, I sample was taken for bacteriological examination and proved to be satisfactory.

There are no stand pipes in the district.

Sewage Disposal

Most of the district is sewered and the sewage treated at the sewage works situate at Uncouth.

The number of pail closets in the district is now 150 having been reduced by demolition of unfit houses. The night soil is collected with a gully emptier fitted with night soil attachment and disposed of by discharging into the sever for treatment at the sewage works.

Public Cleansing Domestic Refuse

The cleansing service is operated by one $7\frac{1}{2}$ cub.yard side loading and one 11 - 15 cub. yard "Bantam" Karrier packer refuse collection vehicles staffed by two drivers and 6 men.

The refuse is emptied from 3187 ashbins.

The collection has been a weekly collection with the exception of holiday periods.

The refuse collection vehicles covered 7089 miles and collected 1414 loads.

The reduction in mileage and number of loads collected is due to the new packer vehicle.

Disposal

The refuse is disposed of by controlled tipping. The 1414 loads of refuse were disposed of, the refuse has been levelled, covered and consolidated with the mechanical shovel and there has not been any nuisance created.

Dustbins

The providing of dustbins under the municipal bin scheme is still working very satisfactorily and during the year 160 ashbins have been renewed and 91 new ashbins provided.

There are no offensive trades in the district.

From the statistics it will be seen that the number of animals killed has greatly increased and the inspection of meat is taking the greater part of my time, but further time should be spent at the slaughterhouses to ensure that all the regulations are complied with.

It will be appreciated that practically the whole of the meat from these slaughterhouses is exported to other districts.

During the year 465 visits have been made to slaughterhouses.
