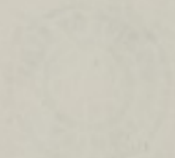

To the Health Committee of the Urban District of Milnrow

Mr. Chairman and Members,

I have the honour of presenting my thirtyfifth Annual Report of the District of Milnrow and shall commence by placing before you the General Statistics from which this report is formed:-

Population

The estimated population of the district for 1963 is 8,310 with an acreage of 5,194.

The rateable value of the district is £246,343 and the sum represented by the penny rate is £399.

The population is industrial and is occupied mainly with cotton spinning, the engineering trade and the wool trade, none of which has any peculiar influence on the public health.

- Clinic There is a maternity and Child Welfare Clinic (Consultation) open every Tuesday, 2.0. to 4.0.p.m.
- Ante-Natal Cases attend clinic in Rochdale by arrangement or 1 Wesley Street, when the clinic is open.
- Midwifery Domiciliary midwifery is carried out by midwives under the control of the Lancashire County Council.
- Home Helps The home help service is run by the Lancashire County Council, Divisional Health No. 13.
- Cleansing Centre Cases requiring treatment are treated at the Cleansing Centre in Rochdale.
- Immunisation Clinics are held monthly at the Maternity and Child Welfare on the first Wednesday in every month.
- Ambulance Facilities The ambulance service is administered by the Lancashire County Council and the Ambulance Station is at Radcliffe.
- Infectious Diseases The hospitals are administered by the Regional Hospital Board.

Annual Report of the Public Health Inspector

for the year 1963

Madam Chairman and Gentlemen,

I have much pleasure in submitting to you my nineteenth Annual Report.

Owing to the increase in meat inspection and the implementation of the Meat Inspection Regulations 1963 on the 1st October, 1963, Mr. H. Johnson was appointed as additional Public Health Inspector.

The regulations lay down the method of inspection and state that the carcass shall be marked identifying the person who made the inspection, this necessitates much more time being taken to complete meat inspection.

Although representations were made to the Minister by many bodies to allow the Local Authority to regulate the hours of slaughter, the Minister would not agree. This is to be regretted as the hours of slaughter make it necessary for inspection to be carried out at most inconvenient times and makes the times of inspection by the Public Health Inspector dependant on the whims of the trade.

It would appear that no consideration was given to the times that it may be necessary for the Public Health Inspector to carry out inspection. In view of the demand by industry for less hours it would appear that the Public Health Inspector has to work additional hours, 7 days per week.

Another feature of the regulations is the charge made for inspection, again it is quoted by the trade that they are paying for inspection, therefore the officers should inspect at their convenience.

If the meat trade, as a whole, would only organise their business, I see no reason why the hours of slaughter should not conform to the normal hours of other trades. This has been achieved in some countries.

From the 1st November, the department has taken over the administration of Standard Grants. The Council have decided to try to increase the number of Standard Grants by approaching the owners.

If the Housing Bill, now before Parliament, becomes legislation, additional powers will be given to the Local Authorities to deal with this problem.

As and from the 1st January, 1964, the department will be responsible for the inspection of all drainage work.

The Council decided to have a "Works Study" carried out on the Refuse Collection Service to investigate the best method of refuse collection and to provide an incentive bonus scheme, taking into consideration the new housing development in the district.

During the year one factory completed the electrification of the works and are now only using one boiler for heating purposes. Another factory is now using solid smokeless fuel.

I wish to express my thanks to the Chairman and Members of the Health Committee for their help and consideration in the exercise of my duties, also to Mr. Johnson for his loyal co-operation since his appointment.

Water Supply

The water supply for the district is from Rochdale & Oldham Corporations. The statutory water undertaking being Rochdale. The water is from the Moorland gathering grounds. Of the 3367 houses of the district, 3182 are supplied from the mains. The houses not receiving mains water are those scattered throughout the outer fringe where there are no water mains and are farm houses and small hamlets. The supplies being from private wells and springs.

Sampling

During the year, 1 sample was taken for bacteriological examination and proved to be satisfactory.

There are no stand pipes in the district.

Sewage Disposal

Most of the district is sewered and the sewage treated at the sewage works situate at Uncouth.

The number of pail closets in the district is now 142. The night soil is collected with a gully emptier fitted with night soil attachment and disposed of by discharging into the sewer for treatment at the sewage works.

Public Cleansing
Domestic Refuse

The cleansing service is operated by one 7½ cub.yard side loading and one 11-15 cub.yard "Bantan" Karrier packer refuse collection vehicles staffed by two drivers and 6 men.

The refuse is emptied from 3322 ashbins.

The collection has been a weekly collection with the exception of holiday periods.

The refuse collection vehicles covered 7162 miles and collected 1478 loads.

The reduction in mileage and number of loads collected is due to the new packer vehicle.

Disposal

The refuse is disposed of by controlled tipping. The 1478 loads of refuse were disposed of, the refuse has been levelled, covered and consolidated with the mechanical shovel and there has not been any nuisance created.

Dustbins

The providing of dustbins under the municipal bin scheme is still working very satisfactorily and during the year 169 ashbins have been renewed and 137 new ashbins provided.

Offensive Trades

There are no offensive trades in the district.

Rag Flock & Other Filling Materials Act, 1951

One factory has been granted a renewal of licence to manufacture and store rag flock.

Clean Air Act, 1956

16 visits have been made to business premises regarding the provision of the Clean Air Act.

The chimneys are kept under observation and efforts made to control the emission of smoke.
