To the Health Committee of the Urban District of Milnrow.

Mr. Chairman and Members,

I have the honour of presenting my thirtyseventh Annual Report of the District of Milnrow and shall commence by placing before you the General Statistics from which this report is formed:-

Population

The estimated population of the district for 1965 is 8,630 with an acreage of 5,194.

The rateable value of the district is £260,008 and the sum represented by the penny rate is £1,003. 5. 8d.

The population is industrial and is occupied mainly with cotton spinning, the engineering trade and the wool trade, none of which has any peculiar influence on the public health.

Midwifery Domiciliary midwifery is carried out by midwives under the control of the Lancashire County Council.

Home Helps The home help service is run by the Lancashire County Council, Divisional Health No. 13.

Cleansing Centre Cases requiring treatment are treated at the Cleansing Centre in Rochdale.

Immunisation Clinics are held monthly at the Maternity and Child Welfare on the first Wednesday in every month.

Ambulance Facilities The ambulance service is administered by the Lancashire County Council and the Ambulance Station is at Radcliffe.

Infectious Diseases The hospitals are administered by the Regional Hospital Board.

Annual Report of the Public Health Inspector

for the year 1964

Madam Chairman, Lady and Gentlemen,

I have much pleasure in submitting to you my first Annual Report.

In October Mr. H. Nunn retired from the post of Senior Public Health Inspector after serving the Milnrow Urban District Council for a period of 19 years. I am very grateful to the Council for their decision to appoint me as Mr. Nunn's successor and would add that the help and guidance given to me by Mr. Nunn helped, in no small way, to make it possible for me to accept the appointment. Mr. R. Evans was appointed, late in the year but was not due to commence duties until January, 1965.

It will be noted that there was a marked increase in the number of visits made to slaughterhouses during 1964 (2,016 visits compared with 1,259 visits during 1963). This high number of visits was due partly to the implementation of the Meat Inspection Regulations, 1963, this being the first full year of the operation of these Regulations, partly due to the increase in the number of animals slaughtered and partly due to the unsuitable situations of three of the slaughterhouses in relation to dwelling houses.

Almost 100% meat inspection has been maintained but only with great difficulty because of the lack of control over hours of slaughter making it necessary for inspection to be carried out at times outside normal working hours.

A pleasing feature is the increase in the number of Improvement Grant works completed during the year. This increase has been achieved by the Council's policy of approaching owners and bringing to their notice benefits in relation to home improvements. While the majority of applicants have been owner-occupiers, there has been an increase in the interest shown by other owners.

A Refuse Collection Bonus Scheme was introduced in April and though difficulties have arisen, the scheme has worked satisfactorily on the whole.

I wish to express my gratitude to the Chairman and Members of the Health Committee for their help and consideration in relation to the carrying out of my duties.

I am very grateful to the Council for their decision to appoint me as Mr. Hume's successor and would add that the help and guidance given to me by Mr. Hume helped, in no small way, to make it possible for me to accept the appointment. Mr. H. Hume was appointed late in the year but was not due to resign until January, 1965.

It will be noted that there was a marked increase in the number of visits made to slaughterhouses during 1964 (2,016 visits compared with 1,259 visits during 1963). This high number of visits was due partly to the implementation of the last inspection regulations, 1963, this being the first full year of the operation of these regulations, partly due to the increase in the number of visits to slaughterhouses partly due to the maintenance of visits of the slaughterhouses in relation to building work.

Almost 1965 meat inspection has been completed but only with great difficulty because of the lack of control over hours of slaughter making it necessary for inspection to be carried out at times outside normal working hours.

A pleasing feature is the increase in the number of improvement grants made completed during the year. This increase has been achieved by the Council's policy of encouraging owners and bringing to their notice benefits in relation to house improvements. While the majority of applicants have been owner-occupiers, there has been an increase in the interest shown by other owners.

A Salmonella Collection Project Scheme was introduced in April and though difficulties have arisen, the scheme has worked satisfactorily on the whole.

I wish to express my gratitude to the Chairman and Members of the Health Committee for their help and commission in relation to the carrying out of my duties.

Water Supply

The water supply for the district is from Rochdale and Oldham Corporation. The statutory water undertaking being Rochdale. The water is from the Moorland gathering ground. Of the 3523 houses of the district, 3338 are supplied from the mains. The houses not receiving mains water are those scattered throughout the outer fringe where there are no water mains and are farm houses and small hamlets. The supplies being from private wells and springs.

Sampling - Nil

There are no stand pipes in the district.

Sewage Disposal

Most of the district is sewered and the sewage treated at the sewage works at Uncouth.

The number of pail closets in the district is now 137. The night soil collection is carried out by a gully emptier fitted with night soil attachment and disposed of by discharging into the sewer for treatment at the sewage works.

Public Cleansing
Domestic Refuse

The cleansing service is operated by one 7½ cub.yard side loading and one 11-15 cub.yard "Bantan" Karrier packer refuse collection vehicles which were staffed by two drivers and six men up to 1st April, 1964 when a bonus scheme was introduced and the team was reduced to 2 drivers and 5 men.

The refuse is emptied from 3519 ashbins.

The collection has been a weekly collection with the exception of holiday periods.

The refuse collection vehicles covered 7,200 miles and collected 1,686 loads.

In addition to the above mileage, the side loading vehicle travelled 1457 miles on the collection of night soil, a trailer type cess pit emptier was brought into use in November so dispensing with the need to use the refuse vehicle for this service.

Disposal

The refuse is disposed of by controlled tipping. The 1,686 loads of refuse were disposed of, the refuse has been levelled, covered and consolidated with the mechanical shovel and any nuisance arising has been quickly remedied.

Dustbins

The providing of dustbins under the municipal bin scheme is still working very satisfactorily and during the year 197 ashbins have been renewed and 150 new ashbins provided.

Offensive Trades

There are no offensive trades in the district.

Rag Flock & Other Milling Materials Act, 1951

One Ragflockery has been granted a renewal of licence to manufacture and store rag flock.

Clean Air Act, 1956

14 visits have been made to business premises regarding the provision of the Clean Air Act.

The chimneys are kept under observation and efforts made to control the emission of smoke.

Sampling

The Lancashire County Council are the Food and Drugs Authority and carry out this work.
