The Corporation owns its own water undertaking and a supplementary supply is obtained from the Tynemouth Corporation Water Works. Several samples of water were taken from stand pipes in different parts of the Town. These samples were sent to the County Laboratory at Newburn and the reports were very satisfactory.

Drainage and Sewerage.

47 new drains were inspected.

No action was found to be necessary.

Closet Accommodation.

51 new additional water closets were established during the year.

Milk Supply

There are eight Cowsheds and Dairies situated in the Borough. All have been regularly inspected.

Several samples of milk were taken during the year from the different herds in the Borough, in none of which specimens were found M.Tuberculosis. In one case a sample taken for cleanliness there was found B. Coli, due apparently to the admixture of milk from another district, for on a sample being taken at the dairy within the Borough no such contamination was detected.

Diphtheria - 6 cases were notified during the year.

Enteric Fever (including paratyphoid) - 1 case was notified.

Pneumonia - 10 cases were notified.

Puerperal Pyrexia - 4 cases were notified.

Erysipelas - 12 cases were notified.
