Scabies Clinics:—Totton and Hythe. Patients residing on the boundary near Lymington are treated by the Borough of Lymington. An arrangement has been made with the Borough Council.

Sanitary Circumstances of the Area.

Water.

Fifteen samples were taken during the year, 1 was found to be fit and 14 unfit.

In two instances the premises were connected to the main water supply; three wells were thoroughly cleansed; two samples were trial samples of stream water, and in 7 cases satisfactory alternative supplies were available.

The Prevalence of, and Control over, Infectious and Other Diseases.

During the year measles and whooping cough have continued in epidemic form, measles on a reduced scale, 213 cases of measles and 135 cases of whooping cough being notified.

There has been no other epidemic.

Diphtheria. Three cases were notified, one an adult, two children, both laryngeal, neither had been immunised. All recovered.

Scarlet Fever. 26 cases, all recovered.

Cerebo-Spinal-Meningitis. 2 cases, both recovered.

Acute Polio-Myelitis. 2 cases, one death.

Pneumonia. 40 cases, 17 deaths.

Artificial Immunisation against Diphtheria.

1,130 children have been treated at School Clinics and Infant Welfare Centres. There is still a poor response, particularly in children under 5 years of age.
