# ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH FOR THE YEAR 1943.

#### EMPTYING OF CESSPITS.

A scheme for the emptying of cesspits of Council houses was commenced in December with the Council's own cesspit Emptier under the control of the Public Health Department. Owing to the shortage of labour it is only possible to carry out this work part time utilising available staff. The scheme is working satisfactorily in the light of existing circumstances.

#### RATS AND MICE (DESTRUCTION) ACT.

Consequent upon the Infestation Order, 1943, Mr. H. W. Plowman was appointed Rodent Officer and in this capacity made a survey of the district to investigate the extent of rat infestation. The survey brought to light a number of major infestations and numerous minor infestations in all parts of the district.

The necessary staff has been acquired and active steps are being taken to deal with rodent infestation as directed by the Ministry of Food.

#### HOUSING.

Work under the Housing Acts has been carried out so far as prevailing circumstances permit. Housing conditions are far from satisfactory and are deteriorating with the prolongation of the war consequent upon the shortage of labour and materials. Cases of overcrowding are being dealt with whenever practicable.

A very considerable amount of work will have to be done

in regard to housing generally in the post-war period.

#### REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL.

This work is carried out by direct labour under the control

of the Public Health Department.

The collection of refuse and salvage on alternate weeks in the parishes of Eling, Dibden, Fawley and Lyndhurst is working satisfactory. Difficulties have been experienced in maintaining vehicles due to shortage of spare parts and in obtaining the necessary labour.

The schedule however, has been maintained with some difficulty arising from the foregoing and the added work placed

upon the men in the collection of salvage.
