Medical Officer of Health's Report, 1938.

To the Chairman and Members of the Health Committee.

MR. CHAIRMAN, MADAM AND GENTLEMEN,

I have to submit the Annual Report for the year 1938, on the work of the Health Department.

This is an ordinary Report, as defined in the Ministry of Health Circular 1728 dated 25th October, 1938.

NATURE AND SOCIAL CONDITIONS OF THE AREA.

(a) AREA.

(c) PHYSICAL CHARACTERISTICS AND GENERAL CHARACTER OF THE DISTRICT.

The Urban District is situate on the North bank of the River Tyne and is undulating in character varying from approximately sea level to between 400 and 500 feet above ordnance datum.

The district is bisected by the main Carlisle-Newcastle road, constructed on the site of the Roman Wall of Hadrian.

(d) NUMBER OF INHABITED HOUSES.

The number of inhabited houses in the area according to the rate book at 31st March, 1939, was 5,437.

(e) RATEABLE VALUE.

The rateable value of the district at the 31st March, 1939, year was $\pounds 98,815$ and the amount produced by a penny rate $\pounds 379$.

(f) SOCIAL CONDITIONS.

The district is chiefly industrial, the majority of the adult male population being connected with the mining and engineering industries. In addition a number are employed in brickmaking and at the glassworks.

It will be seen that 224 deaths occurred, 125 were males and 99 females. This gives a crude death rate of 11.56 (as compared with 10.5 for 1937) and a standardised death rate of 13.29.

The following statement shews particulars of cases of Tuberculosis as appearing in the T.B. Register and supplied to the County Medical Officer of Health each quarter in accordance with the Regulations.

It will be seen that there was a nett increase of 9 pulmonary and 9 non-pulmonary cases during the year.

The table shews that at the 31st December, 1938, there were, according to the records of the Department, 216 cases of pulmonary and 138 cases of non-pulmonary tuberculosis resident within the district.

REPORT UPON THE CASES OF DIPHTHERIA,

JANUARY IST-MARCH 22ND, 1938.

During the month of January it became apparent that there was every possibility of an increase in the incidence of Diphtheria, and an endeavour was made to stimulate the demand for immunisation by means of posters, which were displayed in various parts of the district. Eleven notifications were received during the month of January, the patients residing in Throckley, Newburn and Lemington, their ages varying from 6 to 30 years and there was nothing in common to indicate the source of the outbreak.

In February, 24 cases were notified, the majority coming from Lemington. Whilst some of the patients suffered from a comparatively mild type of the illness, several were affected with a most severe type which unfortunately resulted in the deaths of two children from Throckley, three from Lemington and one from Bell's Close. In an endeavour to ensure early treatment of the illness, leaflets were distributed through the medium of the schools, urging parents to call in a Doctor at the first symptoms of a sore throat and the Doctors were informed of this procedure and reminded of the supply of anti-toxin available at all times.

Whilst the greatest number of cases were at Lemington there was nothing to indicate the source of the outbreak apart from the fact that 16 cases attended Newburn Hall School. Samples of the school milk were obtained and submitted to the Bacteriologist for examination for the Diphtheria Bacillus; the milk was found to be in no way connected with the outbreak. In an endeavour to trace carriers, swabs were taken from the throats of 155 children in the classes chiefly affected, and three carriers were found. These children were sent home immediately and the children contacts in the homes kept from school.

In March, to date, 13 cases including the 4 Carriers found as a result of the swabbing of school children were notified. Swabs were taken from 50 more school children and the fourth carrier found.

It is interesting to note that of the 47 cases notified 9 have been immunised, but as the Schick Test is not carried out after the innoculation it is not fair to state that the immunisation was complete in these nine cases. A notable feature is the fact that none of these immunised cases proved fatal.

The outbreak has stimulated the demand for Diphtheria Immunisation, and since January 1st, 1938, 233 children have been immunised, making a total of 1,163 immunisations since the commencement of the scheme in March, 1936.

The attached Table shows details in tabular form of the cases.

REPORT ON NEWBURN SUN-RAY CLINIC, 1937.

TO THE MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH.

Sir.

I have pleasure in submitting my report on the Sun Ray Clinic at Throckley for the year ending 31st December, 1938. The total number of attendances was 2,363; the total number of treatments was 2,879, of these general irradiations numbered 2,024 and local irradiations 855.

The results of irradiation have been most satisfactory improvement in general health has been remarkable in several patients in all groups. Same of the cases of Cervical Adentis have required prolonged patient treatment; the results fully justified the time spent in treating these patients.

Several women and one man suffering from Rheumatism expressed gratitude for the relief obtained after irradiation, but in many cases, either on account of constitutional disease, or because the rheumatism was too far advanced, no permanent benefit could be expected from irradiation.

One woman suffering from Asthma and Bronchitis reported that she "had never been so well in her life" as she had been after 12 general irradiations at the Clinic.

(i) RATS AND MICE (DESTRUCTION) ACT, 1919

Continual efforts have been made to deal with nuisances arising from rats, and informal action has taken place under the above Act.

The services of a Ratcatcher were again retained by the Council for the year, and his duties include the regular and periodical inspection of the refuse tips used by the Council, and other Council property. During the year 1164 rats have been killed. The tips were fairly free of rats at the end of the year.

(j) SMOKE ABATEMENT.

The Council is represented on the Northumberland and Durham Advisory Regional Smoke Abatement Committee.

Smoke observations are taken periodically.

Classes for Stokers were held at Rutherford College, Newcastle, during the year and the attention of the firms in the area was drawn to the course of lectures and demonstrations.

(k) OFFENSIVE TRADES.

The trade of tripe boiling as carried on at the several slaughterhouses is supervised in conjunction with the routine visits thereto, and is generally satisfactory. The trades are governed by Byelaws, and the trade of fish fryer and rag and bone dealer have been added to the statutory list of offensive trades. There are in the district four tripe boilers and twelve fish fryers, all of whom conduct their business in a satisfactory manner and have been subject to periodical inspection.

(a) Bacteriological Examination of Milk.

The bacteriological examination of milk which was commenced in 1927 has been continued throughout the year Four samples are taken annually from each supply and are examined for total bacterial and bacillus coli content, and two samples examined annually for the presence of tubercle bacilli. Additional check samples are taken as and when required. The following statement shows the number of examinations carried out, viz. :---

(b) Methylene Blue Reduction Test.

To satisfy the prescribed Methylene Blue Reduction Test the sample must not decolourise Methylene Blue within $4\frac{1}{2}$ hours if the sample is taken at any time from the 1st May to the 31st October; or within $5\frac{1}{2}$ hours if the sample is taken at any time from the 1st November to the 30th April.

Of the 45 samples produced in the district 29 or 64% were satisfactory.

Of the 33 samples produced outside the district 18 or 54% were satisfactory.

(b) COLIFORM BACILLI.

The standard adopted is that the milk must not contain coliform bacillus in one-hundredth millilitre.

Of the 45 samples produced in the district, 35 or 87.5 per cent. were satisfactory.

Of the 33 samples produced outside the area, 23 or 69 per cent. were satisfactory.

To summarise, of 78 samples examined for coliform bacilli, 58 or 75% were satisfactory.

(c) TUBERCLE BACILLI.

No chilled meat was condemned during the year. The butchers of the district are to be congratulated on the quality of their purchases as is evidenced by the small percentage of meat condemned. They are always willing to co-operate at all times with your officials.

(c) OTHER FOODS.

(2) Stalls, Shops, Stores and Vehicles.

The provisions of the Regulations have been complied with in a fairly satisfactory manner. Several infringements of the Regulations have been remedied as a result of informal action. (3) Slaughterhouses.

There are in the district seven licensed slaughterhouses subject to annual licenses expiring on the 31st December of each year. Four of these have been in regular use throughout the year, and the other three have not been used during the year.

(d) SALE OF FOOD (ADULTERATION) ACT 1928.

This Act is administered by the Northumberland County Council.

PUBLIC HEALTH PROPAGANDA,

The scheme of Public Health Propaganda was continued throughout the year.

HEALTH WEEK.

A Health week was held from 9th to 14th January and the following is a brief report upon it :---

The activities during the Week were of an educational nature by means of film displays in the schools and the Maternity & Child Welfare Centres, and the distribution of literature.

In all, 15 displays were held, 10 of these were in the schools or in neighbouring halls. 2,190 Children attended the displays.

Three displays were held in the Maternity & Child Welfare Centres, and were attended by 265 mothers.

Two displays open to the Womens' Institute and the public were attended by 75 adults. The total attendance being 2,530.

It is very gratifying to be able to report that the displays have been highly successful, the Head Masters of the Schools the Children and the Mothers have expressed their appreciation in a very decisive manner. It is very pleasing to note that the Inspector of the Domestic Science Classes for Northumberland attended one of the shows for the domestic science girls and was very favourable impressed by the display of films which she considered to be of great value.

Films were shewn during the week on subjects appropriate for the audience attending, and included propaganda film advocating :—Diphtheria Immunisation, The Value of Milk, Cleanliness, Recreative and Corrective Exercises for Toddlers the feeding of babies and the care of the teeth.

I understand that this is the first attempt in the area to utilise the cinematograph for educational purposes in the schools.

Miss Foster of the National Milk Publicity Council very kindly addressed the audiences on 9 occasions.
