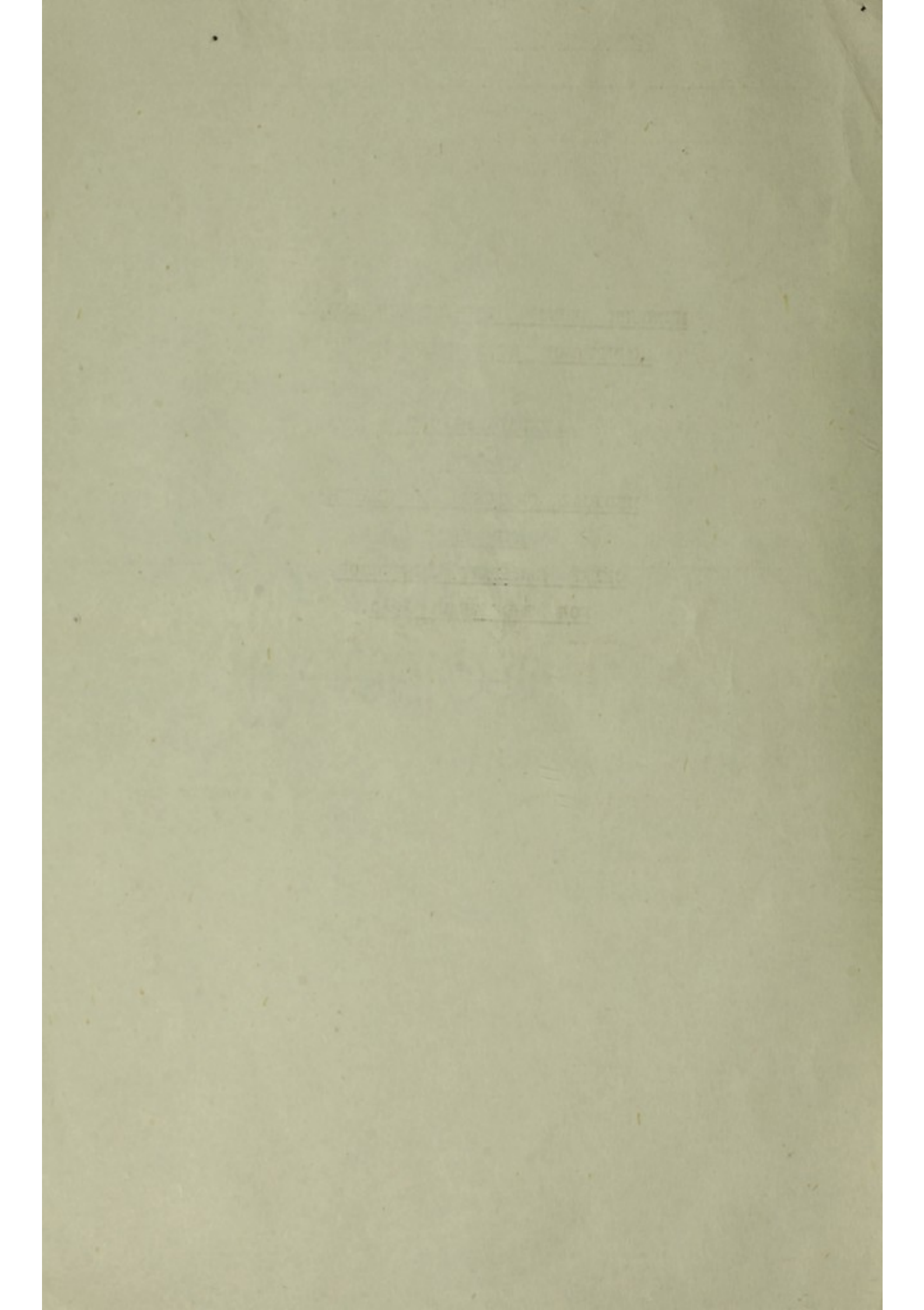

Prevalence of and control over Infectious and Other Diseases. The following table gives the numbers and age groups of the cases of Infectious Disease notified during the year. The notifications include 15 cases of Epidemic Cerebro Spinal Fever, 286 cases of Measles and 40 cases of Pneumonia.

Tuberculosis.

During the year 34 new cases have been notified, 23 pulmonary and 11 non-pulmonary.

NEWBURN URBAN DISTRICT COUNCIL.REPORT OF CHIEF SANITARY INSPECTOR, FOR THE YEAR 1940.

Dr. Francis Irvine, M.B., C.M.,

Sir,

I beg to submit to you my Annual Report for the year ending December 31st, 1940.

Housing.

Only complaints respecting housing matters were dealt with during the year. Owing to difficulties in obtaining material and labour it is extremely difficult to get the work carried out.

Water There is no change in the water supply of the district.

Drainage and Sewerage No change has been made in the drainage or sewerage systems during the year.

Closet Accommodation

The closet accommodation remains substantially the same as at the end of 1939.

Collection and Disposal of Refuse.

The refuse collection and disposal is carried out by the Surveyors Department.

Sanitary Inspection of District.

Every effort has been made to carry out the usual routine inspections but with the additional work owing to the war, the pre-war standard has not been maintained.

Meat and Food Inspection.

Apart from visits to Butchers' shops and the Central Meat Distribution Depot no meat inspection has been carried out as the animals are slaughtered and inspected in Newcastle.

The following meat has been condemned and surrendered:-

2 Beasts' Heads.
6 lb. Tin Corned Beef.
5 lbs. Bacon.

Milk Supply.

The sampling of milk was continued as far as possible. The following statement shows the number of examinations carried out:

Methylene Blue Reduction Test.

Of the 34 samples produced in the district 27 or 79% were satisfactory.
Of the 25 samples produced outside the district 18 or 72% were satisfactory.

B. Coli.

Of the 34 samples produced in the district 30 or 88% were satisfactory.
Of the 25 samples produced outside the area 19 or 76% were satisfactory.

Tubercle Bacilli.

16 samples of milk produced in the district were examined of which 2 were positive.

12 samples of milk produced outside the area were examined of which 1 was positive.

Sterilized Milk.

4 samples of sterilized milk were obtained during the year, the plates of the samples were sterile.

2 of these samples were submitted for biological examination for Tubercle Bacilli and both were negative.

Tuberculin Tested Milk.

2 samples were obtained and both conformed with the prescribed standard. Both samples gave negative results when submitted to the biological test for Tubercle Bacilli.

Pasteurised Milk.

8 samples of Pasteurised Milk were obtained and all conformed with the prescribed standard.

Eradication of Bed Bugs.

The same steps were taken as in previous years.

Public Health Propaganda.

The scheme of Public Health Propaganda was continued throughout the year.

Billeting.

This area is classed as a "Neutral Area" and during the year 158 persons have been billeted within the area.
