# Annual Report of the Medical Officer of Health

for the Year ended December 31st, 1947

To the Chairman and Members of the Newburn Urban District Council.

MADAM CHAIRMAN, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

I have to submit my Sixth Annual Report for the year 1947 on the work of the Health Department, in accordance with Circular 170/47 issued by the Ministry of Health. Again I have to say that the General Health of the district has been exceptionally good.

### DIPHTHERIA.

There were only 9 cases.

### SCARLET FEVER.

There were 14 cases.

### WHOOPING COUGH.

There were 71 cases; there has been a slight outbreak going on all the time.

### MEASLES.

There has been quite a lot of Measles-313 cases.

### TYPHOID OR DYSENTERY.

1 case

There have only been 2 deaths from all this Infectious Disease, one being a case of Whooping Cough and the other a case of Measles.

### ACUTE POLIOMYELITIS.

We were fortunate in this area to have only 9 cases notified of which four were finally diagnosed in Hospital as suffering from Poliomyelitis. There was one case of Polio Encephalitis which, unfortunately, resulted in death.

### IMMUNISATION.

We are still carrying this out regularly at the Welfare Clinics and the Schools, and there is no question we are now feeling the benefit of it.

#### ANTE NATAL.

Arrangements are the same as before and the patients now do not need much persuasion to attend. During the year there were 357 new patients, and a total of 1,812 visits to the Ante Natal Clinics were made.

### POST NATAL.

There were 11 patients attended for Post Natal treatment. Although notices have been sent out to quite 30 people we only got about a third of them to attend. I suppose they feel quite better and do not bother to come.

### DILSTON PATIENTS.

I would mention that 754 patients attended the Clinic held by Dr. Hart at Throckley.

### ILLEGITIMATE CHILDREN.

There were 15 births during the year, a decrease of 5 on the previous year.

### HOME VISITS.

There were 2,364 visits made by the Health Visitors.

#### SCABIES.

There were 24 cases of Scabies, which have been of a slight nature.

### VERMINOUS PERSONS AND PREMISES.

As usual we have had a few under our care but I think the fact that they are visited by Mr. Corney and Mr. Whittaker, of the N.S.P.C.C., has kept it down.

#### HOME HELPS.

After several attempts to get this good service going we have now definitely succeeded, and the number of Home Helps on the books has been between four and five, which we have been able to keep fairly well employed. It has been much appreciated by the general public.

### CONDITIONS OF STREETS.

I have been greatly struck in the last two or three years when I have been on holiday in Scotland, by the great difference there is in the streets of this area and Newcastle and Durham, compared with those in Scotland. How remarkably clean they are kept there. You know that dirt and filth spread disease. I think our Council try to do their best to keep the streets right up to scratch, but could not the public be educated a little bit more in this matter, and help us?

### VIGILANCE COMMITTEE.

A Vigilance Committee was formed in Glasgow a few years ago in order to try and provide children with playing fields. Children, even between 4 and 5 years of age, are allowed to roam the streets at 11 o'clock at night when they should have been in bed not later than 7 p.m. I am still certain that something can be done in this matter. I am sure the increase in crime, &c., we read of and know about is a lot due to this cause. Another cause is children seeing films at the Picture House which they ought not to see.

# Annual Report of the Senior Sanitary Inspector (JOHN CORNEY)

for the Year ended December 31st, 1947

To Dr. Guy B. Picton, M.B., B.S. Sir,

I beg to submit to you my Annual Report for the year ended December 31st, 1947.

I wish to comment again on staffing of the department and to record that Mr. Simpson was with us for only three months, and for the remainder of the year except from November 17th, when Mr. Oxley was appointed, I was without the assistance of an Additional Inspector. This is reflected in the smaller total number of inspections carried out throughout the year as compared with 1946. I trust Mr. Oxley will stay with us longer than previous Additional Inspectors, as too frequent changes tend to impair the efficient working of the department.

### HOUSING.

Although difficulties in both the labour and supply positions continue to restrict our activities, steady progress has been maintained in effecting essential repairs to property. Satisfaction is gained from the knowledge that we are able to mitigate to some extent the effects of unsatisfactory housing conditions.

### WATER SUPPLY.

Water is supplied to the district by the Newcastle and Gateshead Water Co., and has at all times been satisfactory as regards quality and quantity.

All the houses in the area, with the exception of 13, have pipe supplies, the occupants of these 13 houses drawing their supply from stand-pipes.

### DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE.

No major changes have been made in the drainage or sewerage system during the year except where necessary in connection with development of new housing estates.

#### CLOSET ACCOMMODATION.

At the close of the year there were 6,464 water closets, 23 pail closets, and 41 privies in use in this district.

### COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL OF REFUSE.

The refuse collection and disposal is carried out by the Surveyor's Department.

### MILK SUPPLY.

The following statement shows the number and result of examinations carried out:—

Methylene Blue Reduction Test.

Of the 56 samples produced in the district 33, or 58.9 per cent. were satisfactory.

Of the 34 samples produced outside the district, 23 or 67:65 were satisfactory.

Of the 90 samples obtained for testing 56, or 62.22 per cent., were satisfactory.

Tubercle Bacilli.

Fifteen samples were submitted for examination for the presence of B. Tubercle, 11 were satisfactory, 1 was found to be positive, and 3 inconclusive reports.

### RODENT CONTROL.

During the year two further maintenance treatments for destruction of rats in sewers were carried out, and in addition to routine treatment of refuse tips and Council-owned property, surface treatment as recommended by the Ministry of Food was continued.

### ERADICATION OF BED-BUGS, COCKROACHES, &c.

D.D.T. powder and liquid were again used successfully in the eradication of bed-bugs. In co-operation with the Housing Manager we arranged for applicants for Council Houses, whose tenancy was deferred for verminous conditions, to be supplied with D.D.T. and spray and instructed in the best method of ridding their premises of vermin. A considerable number of complaints of the presence of cockroaches was received and difficulty in eradicating this pest was experienced.

### PUBLIC HEALTH PROPAGANDA.

The scheme of Public Health Propaganda was continued throughout the year.

### AMBULANCE SERVICE.

During the year the number of patients carried was 2,744, of which 81 were accidents.

On behalf of Northumberland County Council, 132 cases were carried, covering a mileage of 5,950 miles.
