ANNUAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31st DECEMBER, 1961.

To the Members of the Newhaven Port Health Authority.

Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present the Annual Port Health Report for Newhaven for the year 1961.

Passenger traffic between Newhaven and Dieppe extended from 22nd March to 31st October, 1961. During 1961 the total number of inward passengers (alien and British) which arrived at the Port was 175,866 as compared with 163,163 in 1960, whilst outward passengers numbered 170,156 as against 156,814 in 1960.

The annual numbers of inward aliens arriving at Newbaven from 1946 to 1961 are given in the following table:-

Of the 44,610 aliens who arrived at the Port in 1961, sixty-seven were refused permission to land by the Immigration Officer, 43,974 were inspected by a Medical Inspector and 699 were subjected to detailed medical examinations. Four were found to be undesirable for medical reasons.

The scheme whereby four medical inspectors are employed on rota in inspecting aliens was continued in 1961.

The total tonnage entering Newhaven Port in 1961 was 574,246 as compared with 512,037 tons in 1960. In 1961 the numbers of ships entering the Port were 713 from foreign ports and 240 coastwise.

Imports in 1961 amounted to 262,492 and were comprised chiefly of coal, building and roadmaking material, coke and patent fuel, fruit, vegetables and other foodstuffs, timber, iron and steel.

Exports in 1961 amounted to 40,929 tons and were comprised chiefly of iron, steel, vehicles and vehicle parts, machinery and building and road materials.

There were no cases of notifiable or other infectious disease on ships in 1961.

I have to thank Drs. 4lexander, Kirker and Barton for their help in the medical inspection of aliens and Mr. Harrison, the Port Health Inspector, for his very ready assistance.

Lastly I want to tender my thanks to you for your help and encouragement during the year.

MEASURES AGAINST RODENTS IN SHIPS FROM FOREIGN PORTS

1. Procedure for inspection of ships for rats.

Where possible the Port Health Inspector or the Rodent Operator examines vessels for the presence of rats. A regular inspection is made in the case of the Cross-Channel vessels and an attempt is made to inspect thoroughly all foreign going ships.

2. Arrangements for the Bacteriological or Pathological examination of rodents with special reference to rodent plague, including the number of rodents sent for examination during the year.

Arrangements exist for the examination of rodents from ships when necessary at the Public Health Laboratory, Brighton.

No specimens were sent during 1961.

3. Arrangements in the district for Deratting ships, the methods used and if done by a Commercial Contractor, the name of the Contractor,

The Port is a designated approved port for this purpose.

Trapping, poisoning and gassing are available. The Contractors carrying out this work are Associated Fumigators Limited and Ratsouris Limited.

4. Progress in the rat-proofing of ships.

Ships using the port are mainly Cross-Channel passenger and cargo vessels with a high degree of rat-proofing and little harbourage. Colliers entering the port have been found to be almost devoid of harbourage, while in the modern vessels rat-proofing is good.

If any excessive temporary harbourage is discovered the Master is required to obto same.
