

ANNUAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31st December, 1964.

To the Members of the Newhaven Port Health Authority

Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present the Annual Port Health Report for Newhaven for the year 1964.

The year saw the introduction of the car ferry service to Dieppe on 1st June and for the first time for several years, the service was continued during the winter period. This increase in the service caused problems in regard to the medical inspection of Aliens and Commonwealth Immigrants. To cover the car ferries at the peak of the season, temporary appointments of Medical Inspectors were made and an 'on call' system adopted. Apart from a few teething troubles the system worked well with the regular Inspectors attending the arrival of the daily passenger boat on which the bulk of the aliens were crossing. Certain difficulties are anticipated in 1965 when the two new French car ferries, Villandry and Valencay are added to the service. The three car ferries will provide a round-the-clock service in the peak season.

Passenger traffic between Newhaven and Dieppe extended from 19th March to 31st December. During the year the total number of inward passengers (Alien, Commonwealth Immigrants and British) which arrived at the port was 194.974 (186,566 in 1963) whilst outward passengers numbered 200,549 (190,244 in 1963)

A total of 75,684 Aliens arrived during 1964 compared with 68,207 in 1963 and of these 51 were refused permission to land by the Immigration Officer, 75,342 were seen by a Medical Inspector and 291 were subjected to detailed medical inspection. One Alien was refused permission to land on medical grounds.

Of the 5070 Commonwealth Immigrants who arrived at the Port in 1963 one was refused permission to land by the Immigration Officer, 5062 were seen by a Medical Inspector and 7 were subjected to a detailed medical inspection. None were refused permission to land on medical grounds.

The total tonnage entering Newhaven Port in 1964 was 814,715 as compared with 620,659 tons in 1963. In 1964 the numbers of ships entering the Port were 1,116 from foreign ports and 486 coastwise.

Imports in 1964 amounted to 328,548 tons and were comprised chiefly of coal, building and roadmaking material, coke and patent cuel, fruit, vegetables and other foodstuffs, timber, iron and steel. The increase of 29,610 tons over the 1963 total of 298,938 tons was entirely due to the increase in the amount of building and roadmaking material imported.

Exports in 1964 amounted to 73,747 tons and were comprised chieff of iron, steel, vehicles and vehicle parts, machinery and building at road materials.

No cases of infectious disease involving ships were notified during the year.

I have to thank all the doctors who helped in the medical inspection of Aliens and Mr. Harrison, the Port Health Inspector, fo their help and assistance. My thanks are also use to H.M. Customs and Immigration Authorities and all other Departments associated wit the work of the Port Health Authority for their co-operation and assistance throughout the year.

Finally, I want to tender my thanks to you for your help and encouragement during the year.

Where possible the Port Health Inspector or the Rodent Operator amines vessels for the presence of rats. A regular inspection is de in the case of the Cross-Channel vessels and an attempt is made inspect throughly all foreign going ships.

2. Arrangements for the Bacteriological or Pathological examination of rodents with special reference to rodent plague, including the number of rodents sent for examination during the year.

Arrangements exist for the examination of rodents from ships when necessary at the Public Health Laboratory, Brighton.

No specimens were sent during 1964.

3. Arrangements in the district for Deratting ships, the methods used and if done by a Commercial Contractor, the name of the Contractor.

The port is a designated approved port for this purpose.

Trapping, poisoning and gassing are available. The Contractors carrying out this work are Associated Fumigators Limited and Ratsouri: Limited.

4. Progress in the rat-proofing of ships.

Ships using the port are mainly Cross-Channel passenger and cargo vessels with a high degree of rat-proofing and little harbourage. Colliers entering the port have been found to be almost devoid of harbourage, while in the modern vessels rat-proofing is good.

If any excessive temporary harbourage is discovered the Master is required to abate same.
