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To the Members of the  
Newhaven Urban District Council.

Gentlemen,

I beg to present to you my Annual Report as  
Medical Officer of Health for the year ended December  
31st 1937.

During the year 1937 the general health of the  
District was good, a notable feature of the year being  
the absence of serious infectious disease. Owing to the  
incidence of Influenza early in the year the schools were  
closed from January 25th to February 6th.

Excluding Tuberculosis only 18 cases of Infectious  
Disease were notified, during the year 1937, as compared  
with 23 in 1936.

There was a death from Whooping Cough, giving a  
Zymotic Death Rate of .14.

The Crude Death Rate was 10.3 as compared with  
11.7 in 1936. The comparability factor of .92 gives  
an adjusted death rate of 9.47.

The Senile Mortality rate was 52.8 as compared  
with 61.7 in 1936.

The chief causes of death were as follows:-  
Heart Disease 18, Cerebral Haemorrhage 13, Cancer 6,  
Influenza 6, Bronchitis 3 and Pulmonary Tuberculosis 3.

The Death Rate from Pulmonary Tuberculosis was  
.4 the same as in 1936.

The Birth Rate was 15.1 as compared with 12.6 in  
1936.

There were two illegitimate births.

There were 7 deaths of infants under one year of  
age, five of which deaths were due to congenital debility  
or premature birth. This gives an Infantile Mortality  
of 66 as compared with 22.5 in 1936.

Five cases of Infectious Disease were treated at  
the Isolation Hospital all of which made a good recovery.

My thanks are due to the Members of the Council for  
their unfailing courtesy, and also to the Officials for the  
willing aid given to me in the performance of my duties.

Gentlemen,

I beg to present to you my Annual Report as  
Medical Officer of Health for the year ended December  
31st 1937.

During the year 1937 the general health of the  
District was good, a notable feature of the year being  
the absence of serious infectious diseases. With the  
exception of influenza early in the year the notifiable  
diseases closed from January 25th to February 28th.

Including Tuberculosis only 18 cases of infectious  
diseases were notified during the year 1937 as compared  
with 23 in 1936.

There was a slight rise in the death rate giving a  
crude death rate of 11.7.

The Crude Death Rate was 10.7 as compared with  
11.7 in 1936. The notifiable factor of 92 gives  
an adjusted death rate of 9.47.

The Infant Mortality rate was 25.8 as compared  
with 21.7 in 1936.

The chief causes of death were as follows:-  
Heart Disease 15, Cancer 13, Cancer 6,  
Influenza 5, Bronchitis 3 and Pulmonary Tuberculosis 3.

The death rate from Pulmonary Tuberculosis was  
4.6 the same as in 1936.

The Birth Rate was 25.1 as compared with 25.6 in  
1936.

There were two illegitimate births.

There were 7 deaths of infants under one year of  
age, five of which deaths were due to congenital debility  
or premature birth. This gives an Infantile Mortality  
of 66 as compared with 55.5 in 1936.

Five cases of Infectious Diseases were treated at  
the Infectious Hospital, all of which made a good recovery.

My thanks are due to the Members of the Council for  
their untiring courtesy, and also to the officials for the  
willing aid given to me in the performance of my duties.

#### Causes of sickness.

There was an outbreak of Influenza early in the year which accounted for six deaths: apart from this there was no particular cause of sickness during the year.

The total number of infectious diseases notified was 18 as compared with 23 in 1936. There were no cases of Diphtheria during the year and only four of Scarlet Fever. Two cases of Enteric Fever were notified both of which were contracted outside the District.

The crude Death Rate was 10.3 as compared with 11.7 in 1936, and the adjusted Death Rate was 9.47 as compared with 10.76 in 1936. The Senile mortality was 52.8 as compared with 61.7 in 1936. The Infantile mortality was 66 as compared with 22.5 in 1936. The Birth Rate was 15.1 as compared with 12.6 in 1936. The chief causes of death were as follows:- Heart Disease 18, Cerebral Haemorrhage 13, Cancer 6, Influenza 6, Bronchitis 3 and Pulmonary Tuberculosis 3.

On the whole the health of the District was very satisfactory during the year 1937, the Death Rate showing a decline, and the Birth Rate a rise, and there being a great freedom from Infectious Disease.

#### Summary of Nursing arrangements, Hospital and other Institutions available for the District.

The Newhaven Urban & District Nursing Association supply two Queen's Nurses and one Health Visitor. One Queen's Nurse carries out the general nursing of the Urban District and part of the Rural District, and is also Midwife for such part of the Rural District. The other Queen's Nurse is Midwife for the Town and gives relief duty to the other Nurses when needed. The Health Visitor carries out the health visiting in the Urban District and parts of the Rural District. The Nursing is provided by the Local Authority assisted by a grant from the County Council. There is a Maternity and Child Welfare Centre; weekly meetings are held where Mothers can attend with their infants for instruction in their upbringing. This centre is carried on by the Health Visitor assisted by the Town Midwife.

Clinics. The Health Visitor attends the School Clinic and also the Dental and Eye Clinic, held at the Schools, under the arrangements made by the County Council.

Ambulance Facilities. A horse-drawn and a Motor Ambulance are provided by the Council for the conveyance of Infectious Diseases to the Isolation Hospital, and an up-to-date Motor Ambulance is provided by the Newhaven Urban & District Nursing Association for the removal of non-infectious and accident cases. This ambulance is available for use in the Urban District and the surrounding Districts.

#### Cases of diphtheria.

There was an outbreak of diphtheria early in the year which accounted for six deaths; apart from this there was no particular cause of concern during the year.

The total number of infectious diseases notified was 18 as compared with 23 in 1930. There were no cases of diphtheria during the year and only four of scarlet fever. Two cases of scarlet fever were notified both of which were contained outside the district.

The scarlet fever rate was 10.1 as compared with 11.7 in 1930 and the diphtheria rate was 9.4 as compared with 10.7 in 1930. The total mortality was 25.2 as compared with 25.2 in 1930. The diphtheria mortality was 0.6 as compared with 0.6 in 1930. The scarlet fever rate was 12.1 as compared with 12.5 in 1930.

The other causes of death were as follows: Heart Disease 1, Cancer 1, Influenza 1, Pneumonia 1, Tuberculosis 1, and Pulmonary Tuberculosis 1.

On the whole the health of the district was very satisfactory during the year 1931, the death rate showing a decline, and the birth rate a rise, and there being a great freedom from infectious diseases.

The Newhaven Urban & District Nursing Association supply two Queen Nurses and one Health Visitor. Ambulance Station. A horse-drawn and a motor ambulance are provided by the Council for the conveyance of infectious diseases to the Hospital, and an up-to-date motor ambulance is provided by the Newhaven Urban & District Nursing Association for the removal of non-infectious and accident cases. This ambulance is available for use in the Urban District and the surrounding districts.

Hospitals. There is no hospital in the district for the treatment of Tuberculosis. The Isolation Hospital is provided for the reception of cases of infectious disease occurring in the town and Port; this Hospital receives a grant from the County Council under the condition that cases should be received from certain outlying districts should their own hospitals be full.

The Small Pox Hospital is the East Sussex Western Hospital situated at Chailey to which the Newhaven Urban District Council contributes a subsidy.

There is no Maternity nor Children's Hospital in the District, nor any institutional provision for unmarried mothers, illegitimate and homeless children.

#### Isolation Hospital.

This Hospital is in a very satisfactory condition and is efficiently staffed.

During the year 1937 Five cases were under treatment there namely, Scarlet Fever 2, Enteric Fever 2 and Diphtheria Contact 1. All of these cases made a good recovery.

#### Laboratory work.

No bacteriological or pathological examinations are undertaken locally, but arrangements are in force with the South London Hospital for the examination of all specimens, the charge for which is borne by the Newhaven Urban District Council. All Medical Practitioners in the District are supplied with Diphtheria Antitoxin free of cost.

There is no maternity nor children's hospital in the District, nor any institutional provision for unmarried mothers, illegitimate and homeless children.

### Isolation Hospital.

This hospital is in a very satisfactory condition and is efficiently staffed. During the year 1917 five cases were under treatment there, namely, Scarlet Fever 2, Enteric Fever 2 and Diphtheria 1. All of these cases made a good recovery.

### Laboratory work.

No bacteriological or pathological examinations are undertaken locally, but specimens are sent to the V.D. and South London Hospital for the examination of all specimens, the charges for which is borne by the Newhaven Urban District Council. All medical practitioners in the District are supplied with bacteriological and toxin free of cost.

1. Lodging houses.

There is only one Lodging House in the District. This is licensed for the reception of 43 people. A regular inspection of the premises is carried out.

2. Dairies and Cowsheds.

There are 7 Cowsheds in the District and 20 Registered retailers and 2 Wholesale traders for the sale of Milk.

Regular inspections of the premises are carried out and their general condition has been found satisfactory. The Sanitary Inspector has made 9 visits to the Cowsheds and given 5 informal notices.

3. Slaughterhouses.

There are 4 Slaughterhouses in the District all of which are registered. Their general condition is clean, but their structural condition cannot be considered satisfactory. The District is in need of a Public Abattoir which would facilitate the inspection of meat at the time of slaughtering: during the year 1937 about 900 animals were slaughtered.

Food.

A. Milk supply.

The premises from which and the conditions under which milk is retailed in the District receive special attention from the Authority. No samples of milk have been taken during the year, but facilities for the sampling of milk are being provided in 1938.

B. Other Foods.

All premises where food is prepared for sale are inspected regularly and their condition found satisfactory. There are 7 bakehouses in the District none of which are underground. Thirteen visits have been made by the Sanitary Inspector and 6 informal notices given.

8. The Public Health Officers of the Council consist of a Medical Officer of Health, part time, and a Sanitary Inspector, full time. The Staff of the Isolation Hospital comprises a Matron, an Assistant Nurse, a Probationer Nurse, a Cook and a Caretaker. The Medical Officer of Health is Medical Superintendent.

### Vaccination.

This is almost non existent in this District. During the year 1937 the total number of primary vaccinations of children under 14 years of age was only 14.

### Disinfection.

Premises where cases of infectious disease have occurred are disinfected with formalin. In cases of Cancer and Tuberculosis disinfection is generally carried out on the death or removal of the patient. Infected bedding and clothing are treated in the steam disinfecter at the Isolation Hospital.

### Housing.

The housing condition of the District is generally satisfactory. Seventy-two new houses were erected during the year 1937.
