I beg to hand you my Report on the Sanitary  
Condition of the Town for the year 1909.

- I. BIRTHS.- There were 203 births registered in the District,  
105 being males and 103 females ; this gives a birth rate of  
17.5 per thousand of the Estimated population, or 19.46 per  
thousand if calculated on the population at Census of 1901.  
In 1904 the birth rate was 24.6 ; in 1905, 22.00 ; in 1906,  
21.48 ; in 1907, 17.5 and in 1908, 20.09. This shows a  
steadily declining birth rate.
- II. DEATHS.- The total number of deaths registered in the  
District was 139. Of these 39 did not belong to the district,  
leaving a total of 100 for Newmarket which is equivalent to  
a death rate of 8.43 per thousand. In 1905, the death rate

I. STATE - There were 1,000,000 persons in the State of New York

100,000 males and 100,000 females. This gives a birth rate of

17.5 per thousand of the total population, or 17.5 per

thousand in 1902, 17.5 in 1901, and 17.5 in 1900.

In 1902 the birth rate was 17.5; in 1901, 17.5; in 1900, 17.5.

slightly declining birth rate.

II. STATE - The total number of persons registered in the

State of New York was 1,000,000 in 1902, 1,000,000 in 1901,

and 1,000,000 in 1900. This shows a

birth rate of 17.5 per thousand. In 1902, the birth rate



was 9.9 ; in 1906, 10.2 ; in 1907, 9.8 and in 1908, 9.06. This year's death rate is the lowest in the last ten years. Of these deaths, there were 30 in Exning, 31 in St. Mary's and 39 in All Saints'. 38 deaths were certified as due to Old Age.

INFANTILE MORTALITY.- Ten children died under the age of one year - this gives a mortality rate of 48.07 per thousand births, an extremely low rate. The Infantile death rate in 1900 was 200 per thousand births, and there has been a steady decline since that year. Of the 10 infants who died, five died of debility, two from Congenital defects, one from premature birth, one from Whooping Cough and one from Convulsions. One of the infants was illegitimate.

The average death rate per thousand at all ages for the last ten years - 1899 to 1909 - is 11.5.

THE PRINCIPAL ZYMOTIC DISEASES were responsible for two deaths, one from Whooping Cough and one Enteric Fever. One death was due to Influenza, and one to Diarrhoea.

Eight deaths were due to Phthisis, against 6 in 1908, and 14 in 1907. The death rate from Phthisis is small in the district, due, no doubt, to the good housing of the Working classes, and also to their occupation which is largely an out-door life. Only one pauper notification was received this year.

I should like the Council to consider the advisability of Notifying all cases of this disease, so that those suffering from it could be kept under observation and rooms occupied by them disinfected from time to time. Leaflets might also be distributed with instructions as to disposal of all expectoration, and the advantage of fresh air and thorough ventilation in this disease. Cheap pocket spittoons might also be procured and distributed to those unable to afford to buy them themselves ; by these means Patients would be less a source of danger to their neighbours and the spread

was 0.9 : in 1900, 10.2 : in 1907, 9.8 and in 1908, 9.00. This year's death rate is the lowest in the last ten years. Of these deaths, there were 50 in England, 51 in St. Mary's and 30 in All Saints. 58 deaths were certified as due to Old Age.

**INFANTILE MORTALITY.**— Ten children died under the age of one year—this gives a mortality rate of 48.00 per thousand births, an extremely low rate. The infantile death rate in 1900 was 200 per thousand births, and there has been a steady decline since the year. Of the 10 infants who died, five died of diphtheria, two from congenital defects, one from premature birth, one from whooping cough and one from convulsions. One of the infants was illegitimate. The average death rate per thousand at all ages for the last ten years—1899 to 1909—is 11.5.

**THE FETTERED EXOTIC DISEASES** were responsible for two deaths—one from whooping cough and one from Typhoid Fever. One death was due to Influenza, and one to Diphtheria.

Eight deaths were due to Phthisis, six in 1908, and 14 in 1907. The death rate from Phthisis is small in the district, due, no doubt, to the good housing of the working classes, and as to their occupation which is largely an out-door life. Only one funeral notification was received this year.

I should like the Council to consider the advisability of notifying all cases of this disease, so that those suffering from it could be kept under observation and rooms occupied by them disinfectant from time to time. Deaths might also be distributed with instructions as to disposal of all expectoration, and the removal of sputum and thorough ventilation in this disease. Cases passed up to the Council might also be processed and distributed to those unable to afford to buy their own disinfectant : by these means I should be less a source of danger to their neighbours and the rate



of the disease, in a great measure, checked. There is no special hospital for the treatment of Consumption in the district ; some cases are treated on the open-air principal at the Union Infirmary.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES NOTIFICATION ACT.- 44 Cases were notified during the year - 3 of Diphtheria, 3 of Erysipelas, 3 of Enteric Fever and 35 of Scarlet Fever.

I. ENTERIC FEVER.- The first case notified was in February at

Exning, a year previously a case had been notified at the same house ; the sanitary arrangements were found defective, a midden privy being used then had probably contaminated the well. The two other cases were brother and sister, these also occurred in Exning, in August and September, - the well water was found to be contaminated from the privy, this was closed and a new well dug. All these cases were removed to the Infectious Disease Hospital, and the rooms and bedding disinfected.

II. DIPHTHERIA.- Three cases were notified, one in February and two in May, the last being two sisters ; no cause of infection could be discovered. The first case was treated at home - the room bedding and hangings and clothing, being disinfected, the first by Formaline Vapour, and the latter in the Council's Steam Disinfecter. Antitoxin Serum was provided in all cases.

III. SCARLET FEVER.- 35 Cases were notified - 7 in January, 5 in February, 7 in April, 8 in May, 4 in August, 3 in September and 1 in December.





The first series of cases were a continuation of a case ending 1908, then there was a pause of a month and a fresh outbreak, then isolated cases during the year. It was thought that probably a mild unrecognised case was the cause of the infection, and the Schools were visited, without result. All the cases were extremely mild. They were all - with the exception of 3 - removed to the Hospital. In all cases, the rooms occupied, and bedding, clothing, &c., used, were disinfected by Formaline Vapour and Steam.

IV. MEASLES.- A few cases occurred ; these were promptly notified by the Heads of the Schools, and were excluded from school attendance together with other children in affected families. This checked the outbreak.

V. MUMPS.- A somewhat severe epidemic occurred in the beginning of the year and lasted three or four months.

PHYSICAL FEATURES & GENERAL CHARACTER OF DISTRICT.- The Urban District is, at its lowest level, viz:- at Exning, about 50 feet above sea level - the lowest point of the town proper, viz:- at the Post Office, High Street, is 90 feet above sea level - its highest point being about 120 feet. The character of the sub-soil generally is chalk, and the town is wholly residential. The surrounding country is open and flat.

The chief occupation of the inhabitants is connected with horse-racing, a great number of them being employed in Racing stables. The occupation of the stableman is particularly healthy, the greater part of his life being spent in the open air.

HOUSE ACCOMODATION.- The Working classes, mainly consisting of Stablemen, are housed in brick cottages of 5 or 7 rooms, costing from £120 to £200 to erect and commanding a rental of six to 7 shillings a week ; these are now built under Bye-laws

It was thought that probably a mild unrecognized case was the cause of the infection, and the hospital was visited, without result. All the cases were extremely mild. They were all - with the exception of 2 - removed to the hospital. In all cases, the rooms occupied, and bedding, clothing, etc., used, were disinfected by formaline vapour and steam.

IV. MEASLES. - A few cases occurred; these were properly notified by the Health of the District, and were isolated from school attendance together with other children in affected families. This checked the outbreak.

V. MEASLES. - A somewhat severe epidemic occurred in the beginning of the year and lasted three or four months.

PHYSICAL FEATURES & GENERAL CHARACTER OF DISTRICT. - The Urban District is, at its lowest level, 41m - at Reading, about 50 feet above sea level - the lowest point of the town proper, 41m - at the Post Office, High Street, is 50 feet above sea level - its highest point being about 120 feet. The character of the sub-soil generally is chalk, and the town is wholly residential. The surrounding country is open and flat.

The chief occupation of the inhabitants is connected with home-trading, a great number of them being employed in Reading shops. The occupation of the tradesman is particularly noteworthy, the greater part of his life being spent in the open air. HOUSE ACCOMMODATION. - The working classes, mainly consisting of tradesmen, are housed in brick cottages of 2 or 3 rooms, each having from 120 to 150 sq yards and commanding a view of the sea. At 7 o'clock a week, there are now built under bye-laws

similar to those of the Model Bye-laws of the Local Government Board. The older part of the town - known as "The Rookery" - consists of chalk-flint houses (back to back), lath and plaster and brick ; these were erected prior to the formation of the old Local Board of Health, and consequently little or no provision was made for open space round the buildings.

**WATER SUPPLY.-** The water supply is derived from deep wells sunk in the chalk and is at present in the hands of a private company - it is a high pressure supply. The water, although somewhat hard, is of exceptional purity. Samples from wells in the district have been analysed, the water was found to be impure, therefore the wells were closed and the town supply laid on. There are still a few private wells, but these are condemned when pollution is detected.

**MILK SUPPLY.-** The supply of the town is good, as shown by analysis, for access to the analyses I am indebted to the Inspector under the Food and Drugs Act.

**DAIRIES & COWSHEDS** have been regularly visited and found clean and well kept. In one of the Cowsheds visited the ventilation was found to be inadequate, this has been remedied. There was no overcrowding of animals. The interiors of the sheds are lime-washed twice yearly.

**COMMON LODGING HOUSES** are clean and well kept. No complaint has been made against their owners.

**SEWERAGE & SEWAGE DISPOSAL.-** Some of the Bacteria beds having become choked it was thought advisable to construct a new circular bed with a revolving spray, the results obtained up to the present are good and will no doubt be much better when the bed has been worked a little longer ; a new and larger sedimentation tank has also been added. There are still some privy middens at Exning, and a few house drains to be connected to

**COMMON HOUSES.** are clean and well kept. No complaint has

been made against their owners.

**SEWERAGE & DRAINAGE SYSTEM.** - Some of the Backery beds having be-

come choked it was thought advisable to construct a new drain-

age bed with a revolving pump. The results obtained up to the

present are good and will no doubt be much better when the bed

has been worked a little longer; a new and larger mechanical

iron tank has also been added. There are still some beds

situated at Ealing, and a few house drains to be connected to

the Sewer, it is hoped to do away with the former before long and have the whole of the district connected to the sewer.

**HOUSE REFUSE.-** This is collected by the Council's Carts weekly and destroyed in the Council's Destructor. The total number of loads destroyed during the year being 2,249 of House refuse and 173 loads of Trade, shop, and old refuse heaps, making a total of 2,422 loads.

The Steam Disinfector is being constantly used, for disinfecting articles of bedding, clothing, etc., from houses where infectious disease has taken place, with very good results. 35 Lots were disinfected during the year.

**THE FOOD & DRUGS ACT.-** The administration of this Act is in the hands of the Police, who take samples for analysis and prosecute when adulterations are found.

The Meat Supply of Newmarket is good, no carcass or parts of carcasses have been condemned during the year.

**EDUCATION ACT.-** The Urban District Council take no part in the administration of this Act, it is in the hands of the County Council who have appointed their own Medical Inspector.

**SCHOOLS.-** The Public Elementary Schools have been frequently visited and arrangements found satisfactory.

**FACTORIES & WORKSHOP ACTS.-** Among these the Dairies, Ice-cream & Sweet Shops, Bakehouses, and other food purveying shops have been visited, the sanitary conditions investigated and found good. Various Laundries have been visited, but no alteration has been found necessary. In the workshops for makers of wearing apparel, no outwork is given with the exception of a few odd jobs at busy times. There is only one underground Bakehouse in the district, as this is kept clean and well ventilated it is recommended that it shall be registered for a further period of twelve months. The Bakehouses, which have been regularly visited are clean and well kept.

only when adulterations are found.  
The Meat Supply of the district is good, no excess or part  
of carcasses have been found during the year.  
EDUCATION ACT - The Urban Sanitary Council take no part in the  
administration of this Act, it is in the hands of the County  
Council who have appointed their own Medical Inspector.  
SCHOOLS - The Public Elementary Schools have been frequently  
visited and arrangements found satisfactory.  
FACILITIES & WORKING ACT - Among these the Baiters, Ice-cream &  
Sweet shops, Refreshment, and other food purveyors who have  
been visited, the sanitary conditions investigated and found  
good. Various laundries have been visited, but no alterations  
have been found necessary. In the workshops for makers of  
wearing apparel, no effort is given with the exception of a  
few odd jobs at busy times. There is one one undertaker  
business in the district, as this is kept clean and well ven-  
tilated it is recommended that it shall be regulated for a  
further period of twelve months. The Refreshment, which have  
been regularly visited are clean and well kept.

SLAUGHTERHOUSES.- These have been regularly visited and found on the whole clean and well kept. Lime-washing and cleansing has been carried out at frequent intervals according to instructions.

182 Sanitary Inspections were made during the year.

The Council have now under consideration the advisability of adopting the Infectious Disease Prevention Act, 1890. and parts of the Public Health Act, 1907.

The Council have decided to fit up a small Laboratory at the Sewage Farm, for the analysis of water and sewage.

# RECAPITULATION
